- 2. If you asked him, "Who are you?," he might reply "Bond. James Bond." --as he is entitled to do. Then, you might ask him, "Why are you here?" FTP, identify this war hero and vice-presidential candidate, whose first two names are indeed "James Bond". (Adm. James B. Stockdale)
- 3. It was a primarily Italian artistic movement of the late 19th century, which aimed at realistic representation of life among ordinary people. The movement is best remembered for its operas-for bloody, melodramatic works such as Leoncavallo's <u>I Pagliacci</u> and Puccini's <u>Tosca</u>. FTP, identify this movement, whose name is the Italian for "realism".

- 4. As yet, it is unknown if a conspiracy was involved in his October 1992 death. - 5. He appears to be the last Democrat who the news media will concede lost to a Republican in a debate. Born in Brandon, VT, he represented Illinois for eighteen years in Congress. A believer in Squatter Sovereignty, his view that the citizens of the territories should decide the issue of slavery for themselves cost him the Southern vote--and very likely the Presidency. FTP, identify this Presidential candidate. (Stephen Douglas)
- 6. On it lie Richmond VA, Washington DC, Trenton NJ, and Augusta GA. It occurs where rivers pass from areas of harder rock to softer rock, and generally marks the head of navigation of the river. FTP, what is this geographic feature, which determined the location of many early Colonial settlements? (The fall line)
- 7. The 1992 election saw a political version of "Trading Places"-as a governor was elected to Congress, while the incumbent
 Congressman was elected Governor. FTP, in what state did
 Congressman Thomas Carper and Governor Michael Castle accomplish
 this switch?
 (Delaware)

- 8. A pediatric neurologist's diagnosis--kidney disease. This, he says, explains this fictional character's expected death, short stature, weakness, and his need for a crutch. Additionally, it explains the character's rapid recovery--nineteenth century medical science could have treated the disease once he gained a benefactor willing to pay for his medical treatment. FTP, identify the Dickensian character subjected to this rather late diagnosis. (Timothy Cratchit. Accept "Tiny Tim")
- 9. While Ross Perot won nearly 20% of the vote, he earned no electoral votes. In only one state did he even finish second. FTP, identify this western state, which elected Robert Bennett to the Senate while giving George Bush his largest margin. (Utah)
- 10. In June 1992, Justice Gerard Brennan of this nation's High Court wrote, "[t]he common law of this country would perpetuate injustice if it were to continue to embrace the enlarged notion of terra nullius and to persist in characterizing the indigenous inhabitants . . . as people too low in the scale of social organization to be acknowledged as possessing rights . . . in land." The Court's decision gave the Miriam people of Murray Island in the Torres Strait title to the land they live on. FTP, in what country?

- 11. The sixteen names on it include M.L. "Sonny" Carter, Theodore C. Freeman, Michael J. Adams, Michael J. Smith, Gregory B. Jarvis, Edward J. White II, and Judith A. Resnick. It was dedicated May 9, 1991 "To Those Who Gave Their Lives To Bring The Stars A Little Closer." FTP, identify this black granite monument, which is moved by motors for maximum illumination by the sun. (The Astronauts' Memorial. Accept "Space Mirror")
- 12. The Austrians under General Melas attacked the French under Napoleon, and, with their stronger numbers, forced the French from the field. General Zach was supposed to pursue the French, but instead permitted them to regroup, and additional French troops arrived. The French then defeated the Austrians. FTP, identify this battle, which took place June 14, 1800 in Northern Italy. (Battle of Marengo)
- 13. President Bush's pardons of twenty-four people, including six Iran-Contra defendants, were the first Christmastime pardons since 1921. Then, President Harding pardoned twenty-five people, including an inmate at the Federal Penitentiary in Atlanta whom Harding invited to stop in at the White House on his way home to Terre Haute, Indiana. There, they might have discussed the 1920 election—the convict had received over 900,000 votes. FTP, identify this Socialist leader, imprisoned under the Espionage Act.

(Eugene Debs)

- 14. Recent biographies debunk his childhood illnesses, ascribing them to a desire for attention and overly credulous parents. "The sea breezes at Long Branch do not suffice, so off he is taken to Saratoga. Visits to Philadelphia are arranged . . . [o]r summers in the country. Or a year in Europe." But when this President went off to Harvard, his illnesses magically disappeared—long before the exercise, boxing, and ranching which he credited for the cure. FTP, identify this President, who always sought to be the center of attention. (Theodore Roosevelt)
- 15. Forest Lawn is LA's most famous cemetery, while Pere Lachaise is Paris's. FTP, show that you are in dead earnest in this grave matter--by spelling cemetery.

 (cemetery)
- 16. In the early 1970's, the University of California Medical School at Davis decided to set aside a third of the entering class for minorities, who would compete for the slots only among themselves. A white student with higher qualifications, having twice been rejected for admission, sued. The Supreme Court ordered his admission and struck down the admissions system, but watered down the decision by allowing race to be used as a factor in admission decisions. FTP, identify this 1978 case, which prompted more friend-of-the-court briefs than any other non-abortion case. (Regents of the University of California v. Allen Bakke) (Reader should be allow credit on such answers as University of California v. Bakke, Bakke v. California, etc., so long as no wrong information is given)
- 17. The January 8, 1993 release of the Elvis stamp was perhaps the most eagerly awaited stamp in U.S. history. Five hundred million stamps are being printed. Yet, despite news reports to the contrary, it is not the largest printing for any U.S. commemorative stamp—the two cent stamp issued January 1, 1932 saw a much larger printing. FTP, that stamp was issued in honor of the bicentennial of whose birth?

- 18. - 3. (30 pts.) Composer Giuseppe Verdi was an Italian patriot, who served in the Italian Parliament after independence. His views are reflected in his operas. FTP each, identify the operas by the description.

Set mostly in ancient Babylon, where the Israelites were enslaved, this opera caused riots in Austrian-occupied Venice. The title is a shortened form of the name of a Babylonian king. (Nabucco)

This opera was banned in Franco's Spain. After all, it teaches that one can defy the King of Spain -- and get away with it. The title character is the son of Philip II. (Don Carlo. Accept "Don Carlos")

Verdi intended to set this opera in Stockholm, where the historical event occurred, but was forced by a royal assassination attempt to move it to Boston. In either case, the tyrant is killed by his rival while both are disquised at the event mentioned in the (Un Ballo in Maschera, or A Masked Ball) title.
