Answer: Andre Norton

The serfs held by Sparta, who were owned by the State, were known as Helots. But can you tell me the term used for those people of Sparta, who were free, but not citizens ? For ten points, give this term which means literally, "Dwellers-round."

Answer: Perioeci

His wife wrote such poems as "The Collossus" and "Mushrooms", as well as The Bell Jar. He is famous as a poet in his own right, and he wrote the story which was the basis for Pete Townshend's album, The Iron Man. For ten points name him.

Answer: Ted Hughes

The name of this book of poetry by Allen Ginsberg which deals with the death of his mother takes its name from the five-verse Hebrew prayer which is said three times daily for a period of eleven months of mourning for a deceased close relative. For ten points name it.

Answer: Kaddish

Although this union was founded in 1853, it did not earn the right for collective bargaining in any of the until 1959, and did not have its first strike until almost ten years later. For ten points, name this largest union in the United States which is completely independant of any other union.

Answer: The National Education Association or NEA

#### Beloit College Bonus Questions (for Illinois 1993)

The book Fifteen Great Battles details the fifteen battles from Marathon to Waterloo, which had the greatest effect on history (according to the authors). In only one battle listed did American troops take part. For ten points apiece give the name and year of this battle of the American Revolution.

Answer: The Battle of Saratoga, in 1777.

You'll get thirty points for naming this american leader on the first clue, twenty on the second and ten if you need all three.

30: From 1971-1978 she was on the board of directors of UNICEF

20: She was born on July 8, 1943, and she recently left her position as President of a national health group to pursue a career as a television talk show host.

10: In 1978 she was nominated the first woman and the first black to serve as President of Planned Parenthood.

20: She was born in 1874 in Massachusetts and died in 1925.

10: She founded the 'Imagism' school and published "Sword Blades and Poppy Seed" in 1914.

Name this book for twenty points, all or nothing. If you can name the main character to Edward Abbey's eco-terrorist handbook, The Monkey Wrench Gang, then you are halfway to naming the title of his last book, published in 1990, shortly after his death.

Answer: Hayduke Lives!
