The Creed of this movement was called Neo-Plasticism, which was Characterized by the total rejection of representation and strict limitation of the expressive elements of painting to the straight line, the right angle, and the three primary colors used with the non-colors black, white, and gray. This movement heavily influenced architecture in Europe and America. Can you name it?
