She is more famous, though, for her stories and novels of horror and the occult, set against realistic, everyday backgrounds. FTP, name the author of The Haunting of Hill House (1959) and The Lottery. \par

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2. This battle of the American Revolution was fought on June 28, 1778, near a courthouse of the same name in New Jersey. During an attack on the British, Gen. Charles Lee suddenly ordered a retreat. Only the arrival of Gen. Washington and Baron von Steuben prevented an American rout, and the British escaped. FTP, name this battle.\par

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Battle of MONMOUTH\par

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3. This large insect of order Homoptera has protruding eyes and two pair s of membranous wings. Females are mute, while males have platelike membranes on the thorax, which they vibrate to produce a loud, shrill sound. A certain genus has the longest life cycles known of any insect, 13 years in one species, and 17 in another.

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4. This mental disorder is characterized by such symptoms as hallucinations, delusions, severe mood deviations, inappropriate emotional responses, and severe distortions of judgment. This disorder can b

e classified as organic, ie associated with actual brain damage such as advanced syphilis or senility or as functional, ie there is no brain damage, including schizophrenia and manic-depression. FTP, name this disorder, a more severe condition than neurosis.

PSYCHOSIS

5. Jacopo, Gentile, and Giovanni were all members of this illustrious family of Venetian painters of the Renaissance. Jacopo was the father who taught two of his sons, Gentile and Giovanni. Two of his notebooks deal with problems of perspective, landscapes, and antiquity. Gentile painted contemporary Venetian life. Giovanni became the teacher of Titian and Giorgione. His works include St. Job and St. Francis in Ecstasy. FTP, name this family.

BELLINI

6. Born in 1882, this English novelist was an innovative influence on the 20th century novel. With her husband Leonard, she set up the Hogarth Press in 1917. In her novels such as *Jacob's Room*, *The Waves*, and *Between the Acts*, she concentrated on the flow of ordinary experience through the stream of consciousness technique. FTP name this author of *A Room of One's Own*, *Mrs. Dalloway*, and *To the Lighthouse*.

7. St. Albans, Northampton, Wakefield, Second St. Albans, Mortimer

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11. This is the production of a magnetic field in a piece of unmagnetized iron when another ferromagnetic substance is brought near it. The magnet causes the individual particles of iron, which act like tiny magnets, to line up so that the sample as a whole becomes magnetized. FTP, name this phenomenon.\par

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MAGNETIC INDUCTION\par

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12. The Red Army of China undertook this journey of about 6,000 miles in 1934-35. Escaping from Nationalist forces in Jiangxi province, some 90,000 men and women marched west to Guizhou province. Led by Mao-Tse Tung, they pushed on to Shanxi province in

the north, despite natural obstacles and harassment by Nationalist troops. FTP, name this incredible year long trek in which more than half the marchers were lost.\par

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LONG MARCH\par

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13. His only comedy was The Litigants, satirizing the law courts of France. This French dramatist was a prime exemplar of French classicism. He established himself as France's leading tragic dramatist after his third play, and his next six tragedies, Britannicus, Bérénice, Bajazet, Mithridate, Iphigénie en Aulide, and Phèdre were all considered masterpieces. FTP name this dramatist who displaced Corneille and earned the patronage of Louis XIV.

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Jean RACINE

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14. A professor at Princeton University, this African-American author's works include Tar Baby, Sulla, The Bluest Eye, and Beloved. For a quick ten points, name this year's (1993) winner of the Nobel Prize in Literature.

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Toni MORRISON

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15. This blind Norse god was a son of Odin and Frigg. He is probably best remembered for being tricked by Loki into shooting an arrow made of mistletoe at his brother Baldur, thus killing him. FTP, name this god whose name is also that of a container for coal.

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HOD or HODUR

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16. This deep red mineral is mined in Spain, Italy, and California. Its chemical formula is Hg S. Used as a pigment, it is principally a source of the metal mercury. FTP, name this substance.

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CINNABAR

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17. Comprising the provinces of Heilongjian, Jilin, and Lianoning and part of the Inner Mongolian Autonomous Region, this province of China is bordered by the USSR, North Korea, and Mongolia. This area has been the traditional home of peoples that have invaded and sometimes ruled N China. It has been controlled successively in the 20th cent by Russia, Chinese warlords, Japan, and the Soviet Union. FTP, name this area that was occupied by the Communists in 1948 and is now an important strategic region.

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18. This plant of the Mulberry family contains more than 600 species of vines, shrubs, and trees. These plants bear hundreds of tiny female flowers inside a fleshy receptacle; which ripens into a soft, pear-shaped fruit containing masses of tiny seeds. The most common is this plant is native to the Mediterranean region and has been cultivated from early times for its commercially valuable fruit. FTP name this fruit, probably best known for being the filling of newton cookies.\par

The grand-daughter of Eleanor of Aquitaine and the wife of King Louis VIII of France and mother of Louis IX, she was one of the most powerful women of the 13th century. FT

C) Founded in 1954 in the city of Rhode Island whose name the festival bears, it was held there until 1971, then held in New York City. George Wein is the director, and it is the best known of jazz festivals. Held in July at Lincoln Center and other sites. In 1981 it combined with Kool Jazz Festivals.

Newport Jazz Festivals

D) Founded in 1957, it gives a summer season near its namesake city in New Mexico in an outdoor theater. It presents half a dozen operas yearly, including many world and US premiers. John Crosby is its founder and director.
