ANS: Orion

2. He was prisoner number 24601. His crime, stealing a loaf of bread. For 10 pts., name this hero of Victor Hugo's novel Les Miserables.

ANS: Jean Valjean

3. Even Princeton University wasn't around 350 years ago, but the New Jersey school does have a long and distinguished history. The most recent chapter was written recently when a Princeton professor solved a 350 year old riddle. FTP, for what famous mathematical theorem did this Princeton prof recently offer a 200-page proof?

ANS: Fermat's Last Theorem

4. Name the year, for ten points. The BINAC computer went into operation; Rick Springfield and Bruce Springsteen were born; Tokyo Rose was sentenced on a treason conviction; All the King's Men, which won Best Picture, Actor, and Supporting Actress, is released; Germany was divided; NATO was founded; Harry Truman began his second term.

ANS: 1949

5. The first was built in Hempstead, New York from 1947-51. The second was built near Philadelphia and the 3rd in New Jersey. Sociologist Herbert Gans wrote a study of life in these suburban developments. For 10 pts., identify these housing developments named for the company which constructed them.

ANS. Levittowns or Arthur Levitt or Levitt and Sons

6. She was revered in ancient times as the goddess of all witchcraft. She was the only one of the Titans to retain her power under the rule of Zeus. You'll earn ten points if you can name this queen of the witches in Shakespeare's Macbeth.

ANS: Hecate

7. Autodesk, an early player in the CAD/CAM industry, has taken on research into a new technology. Two other frontrunners in researching the technology include W Industries, Ltd. and VPL Research. FTP, what is this technology, which many people had their first exposure to in the movie The Lawnmower Man?

ANS: Virtual Reality or VR

8. When asked about appropriate careers for women, she replied "Let them be sea captains." She served as editor of the transcendentalist publication The Dial and rubbed shoulders with the likes of Emerson and Thoreau. FTP, name this author of Woman in the 19th Century.

ANS. Margaret Fuller

9. One of my favorite dinosaurs from the book Jurassic Park was not carried over to the movie. It's a roughly two foot high scavenger, who is quite happy to dine on dinosaur droppings. FTP, supply the name or nickname of this creature.

Her works, while lost from the canon, have still been a great influence on later African-American women writers like Alice Walker. For 10 pts., name this author of Their Eyes Were Watching God.

13. First performed at the Fenice theater in Venice, in 1851, it was based on Victor Hugo's The King Amuses Himself and featured distinctive departures from traditional opera. The most famous melody of the piece is "Woman's a fickle jade" or "*La donna e mobile*". For 10 pts., name this Verdi opera.

15. It is the sum of the products of every mass particle of a body multiplied by the square of its respective distance from the axis of rotation. It is also that property of a body by virtue of which its angular acceleration is proportional to the net torque acting upon it. For 10 pts., what is this property of a body, which is analogous to mass.

ANS. moment of inertia

16. After the Saracen conquest of Akko, they took Rhodes in 1310, and defended it against the Ottoman sultan Muhammad II until forced to yield it to Sulyman I in 1522. Emperor Charles V gave them Malta in 1530 which they held until Napoleon seized it in 1798. For 10 pts., name this military religious order.

c. Water was the predominant theme in his work. Many of his paintings depicted people in small boats or large seascapes. Several paintings were made of him in his studio boat. His series of paintings of "La Gare St-Lazare" is well known.
