4. "The best safety of the frontier settlements will be secured by the total annihilation of the few remaining Indians." Ironically, these words were written by--for ten points--what children's books author, best known for The Wonderful Wizard of Oz ?

ANSWER: L(YMAN) FRANK **BAUM**

5. Ukase (YOO-CASE), tovarishch, pogrom, babushka, do svidanya, and perestroika are words and phrases associated--for ten points--with what language?

ANSWER: **RUSSIAN**

6. He likely would have lived and died in obscurity, had he not suffered for what some debate to be lead and mercury poisoning, which he probably contracted through the compounds in the paints he used. This changed his personality, as reflected in some of his works--Bobabilicon , and The Third of May, 1808 . For ten points, name this 18th- and 19th-century Spanish artist.

ANSWER: FRANCISCO JOSE DE **GOYA** Y LUCIENTES

7. The name's the same: the world's largest hotel, the legendary weapon of Uther Pendragon. For ten points, name this sword of King Arthur's.

ANSWER: **EXCALIBUR**

8. It is the only organization to display a constitutional amendment in

the lobby of its headquarters--the second amendment, to be exact. For ten points, name this organization, abiding by the philosophy that "the right of the people to keep and bear arms shall not be infringed."

ANSWER: NATIONAL RIFLE ASSOCIATION (NRA)

9. His counterparts include Pierre Trudeau, John Turner, and John MacDonald. Sure, they were all Canadian prime ministers, but only he won the 1957 Nobel Peace Prize. For ten points, name him.

ANSWER: LESTER PEARSON

10. This All-Big-Ten Basketball player at Michigan State went on to play professional football with the Dallas Cowboys. For ten points, name this novelist, the author of North Dallas Forty.

ANSWER: PETER GENT

11. Gina Shock was the drummer, Kathy Valentine and Jane Wiedlin played guitars. For ten points, name this all-girl rock group headed by Belinda Carlisle.

ANSWER: THE GO-GO'S

12. The true moniker for the future of our interstate travel is now Intelligent Transportation Systems. For ten points, identify what the current term for our interstate travel is?

ANSWER: INTELLIGENT VEHICLE HIGHWAY SYSTEMS or I.V.H.S.

13. Many agree that Ronald Reagan basically spent eight years reading scripts while in the White House. One of his scriptwriters wrote a bestseller about her job, called What I Saw At The Revolution: A Political Life In The Reagan Era. For ten points, name her.

ANSWER: PEGGY NOONAN

14. The book Kaffir Boy gives a look at life in Alexandra, one of Apartheid-South Africa's black townships. For ten points, who wrote this memoir?

ANSWER: MARK MATHABANE

15. Not Glenn Robinson, but this other Purdue product became the #1 overall pick in the NBA draft, only to become a major bust. For ten points, name this player derisively nicknamed Joe Barely Cares.

ANSWER: JOE BARRY CARROLL

16. Everyone recognizes Ottawa as Canada's capital. But for a quick ten points, Ottawa was formerly known by what other lesser-known name?

ANSWER: **BYTOWN**

17. On January 13, 1995, he will stand trial, along with McKinley Lee and Sean Smith, for the August 1993 shooting death of Philip Waldemarian. For ten points, give me the pseudonym of Calvin Broadus, the rapper who gave us the song Murder Is The Case.

ANSWER: **SNOOP DOGGY DOGG**

18. He stressed an emphasis on local unions, and restructured the Cigar Makers International Union, along with the Federation of Organized Trades & Labor Unions to that effect. For ten points, name this first president of the AFL-CIO.

ANSWER: SAMUEL **GOMPERS**

19. An insurance salesman from Porlock reputedly interrupted this opium-addict in 1797 while he was writing a poem after getting inspiration from a dream. Afterwards, though, he couldn't continue writing the poem, which he later titled Kubla Khan. For ten points, name him.

ANSWER: SAMUEL TAYLOR **COLERIDGE**

20. Although he was a vegetarian, a nonsmoker, a student of art, and once studied for the priesthood, that didn't prevent him from having aspirations of world domination. For ten points, name this leader of the Third Reich.

ANSWER: ADOLF **HITLER**

21. He died in 1851 at the ripe old age of 57. You'd think he'd live a lot longer, considering the then-revolutionary ideas he touted like daily bathing and eating plenty of fruits and vegetables. For ten points, who was this lecturer and early nutritionist whom we know best from his crackers?

ANSWER: SYLVESTER **GRAHAM**

22. Carrots, celery, beets, parsley, lettuce, watercress, spinach, and tomato are the main ingredients in--for ten points--what Campbell's beverage?

ANSWER: **V-8**

23. For a quick ten points, what is the name of the type of long, tall, silken, usually black hat, usually associated with Abraham Lincoln?

ANSWER: **STOVEPIPE HAT**

24. At 46 years, he was the world's longest-serving ruler, until his death on July 8, 1994. For ten points, name this recently-deceased leader of North Korea.

ANSWER: **KIM IL SUNG**

25. "Thanks for the poor security," read the note left behind at the National Art Museum in Oslo, Norway on February 12, 1994. For ten points, name the famed Edvard Munch painting that was stolen that day and recovered three months later.

ANSWER: **THE SCREAM**

26. The supposed discovery of cold fusion led to increased demand in this metal--one of the platinum metals in Group VIII, used extensively in "white-gold" jewelry, and in contacts for low-voltage electrical connections. For ten points, name this metal, number 4c on the periodic table, and synonymous with the New York dance club which was home to Club MTV.

27. Born in 1907, he is known for his fantastic, dreamlike painting style, and odd-colored, unnaturally-bent people and objects. For ten points, name this Russian painter, known for the works I And The Village and The White Crucifixion.

28. It is defined as a suspension of one liquid within another liquid, with prime examples being milk and mayonnaise. For ten points, name this eight-letter word.

ANSWER: **EMULSION**

29. It merged in 1938 with, and has since become the political wing of, the Irish Republican Army. For ten points, name this party.

30. For a quick ten points, the names of our days of the week derive their origin from deities of what mythology?
