1. For a quick ten points, who probably had the Presidency stolen from him in 1876 by Rutherford B. Hayes?

ANSWER: Samuel Tilden

2. An American economist, his theories were ignored as much for his own difficult personality as for their severe anti-capitalistic bent. In Higher Learning in America, he attacks the willingness of U.S. universities to be influenced by business. And in his essay "Pecuniary Emulation," he compares the business tycoons of his day to predatory animals. But he is probably best known for the catchphrase "conspicuous consumption" which he develops in his 1899 book, The Theory of the Leisure Class. For ten points, name this Scandinavian American.

ANSWER: Thorstein Veblen

- 3. This twentieth-century American novelist and short storyist did it: he actually wrote The Great American Novel, where he highlights, in his usual manner, both the grotesque as well as the poignant features of Judeo-American culture. But you might know this man better for his typical Jewish hero Nathan Zuckerman or for such acclaimed works as The Anatomy Lesson, Portnoy's Complaint, and Goodbye, Columbus. For ten points, name this National Book Award-winning Jewish American author. ANSWER: Philip Roth
- 4. It was shown by Robert Koch in 1876 to be caused by a rod-shaped bacterium; Pasteur produced a vaccine for it in 1881. What disease, both the first to be conclusively shown to be caused by a microorganism and the first to be prevented by a vaccine, is fatal within 24 hours of the first symptoms in cattle, sheep, and horses, and which later lent its name to a rock group?

 ANSWER: Anthrax
- 5. It consisted of three horizontal stripes_red above white above red_and a blue upper quadrant filled with white stars. It was replaced officially, in part, because it resembled Liberia's flag and was seldom carried into battle because it resembled the U.S. flag. In the west, a blue flag with a central white circle replaced it, and in the east, the familiar star-filled St. Andrew's cross on an orange background took its place. For ten points, name this first official flag of the Confederacy, often confused with the battle flag of Virginia.

ANSWER: The Stars and Bars

- 6. Also, known in his own day for work in astronomy, this man, with 53 London churches to his credit, has become perhaps the most famous English Baroque architect. For ten points, name this architect responsible for the Sheldonian Theater at Oxford and St. Paul's Cathedral at London.

 ANSWER: Sir Christopher Wren
- 7. While a fiery guard with the San Antonio Spurs, he took on most of the Nets in a fight later known as the "Easter Massacre." In 1984, he became the youngest coach in the NBA, leading Cleveland to the playoffs after a 2 and 19 start. In 1991, after being demoted to the CBA, his Albany Patroons earned the best record ever attained by a pro basketball team of 50 and 6. He quickly re-signed with the NBA, and his team now holds the NBA's highest winning percentage. For ten points, name this current coach of the Seattle Supersonics.

ANSWER: George Karl

8. Consider two 10 Farad capacitors. For ten points, if you linked these capacitors in series, what would be their total capacitance?

ANSWER: 5 Farads

9. A teacher at lowa State University, this contemporary author has penned such works as The Age of Grief, The Greenlanders, and Ordinary Love and Good Will. She is perhaps better known, however, for the book that won her the 1992 Pulitzer Prize in Literature, A Thousand Acres, a modern-day version of Shakespeare's King Lear. For ten points, name this award-winning American novelist.

ANSWER: Jane Smilev

10. The word's the same (though the pronunciation is different): It can name a state of Brazil bordering on Peru and Bolivia, a city in northern Israel on a bay of the same name, or a unit of land area equal to 4,810 square yards. For ten points, what is the word?

11. Atomic number 45, this rare metal boils at 6741 degrees Fahrenheit and melts at 3571 degrees Fahrenheit. Discovered in 1803, by William Hyde Wollaston, it takes its name from the Greek word for rose, which refers to the red color of its salts. For ten points, name this element.

ANSWER: Rhodium

12. An ophthalmologist, sometimes called an oculist, must have an M.D. and between three to fives years of specialized medical training in a hospital to treat and diagnose eye diseases. But now knowing all this, for ten points, can you spell ophthalmologist?

ANSWER: O-P-H-T-H-A-L-M-O-L-O-G-I-S-T

- 13. Living from 1754 to 1827, this Englishman became the foremost potter of his day and even gained a royal appointment in 1806. He perfected the standard hybrid bone china body and was able to popularize this type of translucent china because it met the prevailing preference for Orient-inspired porcelain. For ten points, name this English potter whose name still continues on in china today. ANSWER: Josiah Spode II
- 14. Living during the third and second centuries B.C., this Indian emperor secured an empire that embraced two-thirds of the Indian subcontinent. Converting to Buddhism, however, he proclaimed the Buddhist code and prohibited murder. Though he tolerated religious freedom, the Brahman opposition to his Buddhist tenets helped overthrow his dynasty within 50 years of his death. For ten points, name this Indian leader of the Mauryan Dynasty.

 ANSWER: Asoka [ah-SHO-kah]

15. Case is a former cyberspace cowboy who is just trying to get the mycotoxin out of his brain. Molly Millions is a Street Samurai who would love best to flick the razors from her fingernails and kill the vat-grown Chiba ninja who assassinated her old lover. And Wintermute is half of a schizophrenic artificial intelligence that is trying to use Case and Molly to free itself from human control. This is a description of, for ten points, what William Gibson novel which was followed by Count Zero and Mona Lisa Overdrive?

ANSWER: Neuromancer

16. For a quick ten points, what Greek god gave the golden touch to king Midas so that everything he touched (even his wine) would turn to gold?

ANSWER: Dionysus

17. This nation is bordered by Algeria to the north and the Ivory Coast to the south. In ancient times, from this area the Songhai Empire dominated the Niger Basin, indeed, much of North Africa until the Moroccans sacked Timbuktu in 1591. As this nation modernized, Timbuktu declined in importance, and Bamako became the country's principal urban center and current capital. For ten points, name this African nation.

ANSWER: Mali

18. This American physicist received his Master's from Oberlin College in 1893, went on to earn a Ph.D. from Columbia, and finally received a position at the newly opened Ryerson laboratory at the University of Chicago. While working at the University of Chicago, he did a series of experiments using drops of mineral oil and became the first to measure the charge on an electron--work for which he received the Nobel prize in 1923. For ten points, name him.

ANSWER: Robert A. Millikan

- 19. This French novelist, playwright, and essayist won the Nobel Prize in Literature in 1957, three years before his death in a motor accident. His type of existentialism is expounded in such works as The Misunderstood, Caligula, and The Fall. But perhaps you remember him for such works as The Plague and The Stranger. For ten points, name this Algerian-French author.

 ANSWER: Albert Camus [cuh-MOO]
- 20. It centers around Marie, a girl who was found on a battlefield by a French military unit. When she falls in love with Tonio, a local peasant who subsequently enlists, her long lost aunt claims her and commands her to marry someone else. In the end, the aunt turns out to be Marie's mother and allows her to marry Tonio, and everyone lives happily ever after. For ten points, name this Donizetti opera from which Kathleen Battle was recently fired.

 ANSWER: Daughter of the Regiment
