1) The United States, Great Britain, and the USSR wrote this treaty in 1968. Despite its recent action, North Korea has also signed this treaty. FTP name this treaty which prohibits the wider dissemination of nuclear weapons.

2) (30) Everyone knows about the Bill of Rights, which included the first ten amendments to the Constitution of the United States. However, some of the less important ones are not so popularly known. For ten points each name the amendment after I give a short description of it.

- a) The amendment that allow Congress to tax incomes. 16th
- b) The amendment that repealed Prohibition 21st
- c) The amendment that prohibited poll tax 24th

3) (30) Let's test your knowledge of history. Given the names of 6 famous people from history, arrange them in chronological order from earliest to latest. You will get 5 points for each correct answer. They are Frederick Barbarossa, Pepin the Short, Ivan the Great, Kublai Khan, William the Conqueror, and Joan of Arc.

From that position the knight has only two moves. For 15 points apiece, name the only two elements that the knight could move onto.

7) (30) The Pinta, the Niña, and the Santa Maria were the ships that Columbus used to go on his quest to sail to the Orient. Well, everyone knows that he never quite made it to China due to that bit of land called the Americas. Years later English colonists landed at Jamestown. For 10 points apiece, name the three ships that brought the colonists to Jamestown.

9) (20) Odysseus was the King of Ithaca and one of the foremost of the Greek chiefs in the Trojan War. His ten years of wandering and hardship encountered on the way home from the war are described in *The Odyssey*. One of the challenges he faced was the one-eyed Cyclops which he escaped by courageous trickery. For 20 points, what was the name of this optically-challenged individual?

10) (30) Looking for a state.

- d) WHO World Health Organization

15) (30-20-10) Who am I?

- b) I was crown prince of Austria, and the only son of Franz Joseph. I would have inherited the dual monarchy from my father if he ever died.
- c) Although it is spelled differently, I share my name with a more famous red-nosed reindeer.

16) (35) The life of author C.S. Lewis is the subject of the film "Shadowlands", starring Anthony Hopkins, but how much do you know about his works? You can earn 35 points on this bonus if you give me the seven books in the Narnia series in order. You'll earn 5 points per book, but be careful, a miss stops you.

20) (20) Both the House of Representatives and the Senate did not officially meet until 1789. This places them far too late to have been the first democratically elected legislative bodies to meet in the New World. For 20 points give the name of the group that captured that distinction in 1619.

21) (20) The sum of the series $1/n$ as "n" approaches infinity is also infinity. For 20 points give the special name of this sweet-sounding series.

22) (25) The Federalist Papers were a great help in the effort to get the Constitution ratified by the States. These papers by Hamilton, Jay, Madison, and others have also helped the Supreme Court to interpret the Constitution. For 25 points exactly, 15 points for within five, and 5 points for within ten, give the number of the Federalist papers that were written.
