2. His troubles began in June when Mary Stansel, his former administrative assistant, sued him for sexual harassment. He offered her a \$332,400 settlement without informing the executive board of the NAACP. For ten points, name this former executive director of the NAACP, ousted for this episode.

Benjamin Chavis Jr.

3. He became the editor of the *Economic Journal* in 1912 and lectured at Cambridge from 1908 to 1948. For ten points, name this man who was a member of the Bloomsbury Group and was influential in the planning of the World Bank.

John Maynard Keynes

4. On April 19, he rowed past the HMS Somerset without it noticing, but he and his borrowed horse were later captured on the road. Fortunately his recruitment of Dr. Samuel Prescott prevented General Gage's troops from surprising the colonists at Concord. For ten points name this silversmith of Longfellow fame.

Paul Revere

5. Give the real name of the rapper who was convicted of breaking the jaw of a man outside his girlfriend's house last year. He was sentenced to 8 months in jail for leading police on a high speed chase through Beverly Hills in his Ferrari. For ten points, who is known for the raps *Let Me Ride* and *Nuthin But a G Thang*.

- (a) (30) In 191 B.C. the Aetolian Greeks with the help of Antiochus III of the Seleucid Empire declared war on Rome. The Roman army caught up with Antiochus at this battle and smashed the Greek-Persian army, which resulted in the subjugation of all Greece under the Roman Empire.
- (b) (20) In 278 B.C. the Gauls, led by Brennus, invaded Greece and were met by Athenians and the Aetolians at this battle. Several Greek traitors showed the Gauls a secret path that allowed them to outflank the Athenians, forcing them to withdraw, and allowing the Gauls to attack the oracle at Delphi.
- (c) (10) In July of 480 B.C. Xerxes and 200,000 Persians met Leonidas and 7,000 Greeks at this pass and was unable to dislodge the Spartans until a traitor showed the Persians a secret passage by which they were able to sneak up behind and annihilate the Greeks.
