

**Terrapin Invitational Tournament 1994**  
**Toss-ups by Georgetown II and Lord High Tournament Directors**

1. Simon Kerslake, Raymond Gould, and Charles Hampton are three members of parliament who rise from the backbenches of the House of Commons to leadership positions within their parties. They ultimately battle for Ten Downing Street until, in a surprise ending, King Charles III invites the Conservative Kerslake to be his first Prime Minister. The 1986 television adaptation of this novel featured four MPs and the ultimate victory of Labourite Raymond Gould. FTP, name this 1984 work by former conservative MP Jeffrey Archer.

Answer: First Among Equals

2. An essay by Jose Enrique Rodo and a collection of poems by Sylvia Plath share their name with this character. Invisible at will, all light and spirit, he seems to symbolize man's imagination and is eventually set free by his master Prospero. FTP who is this character in Shakespeare's The Tempest who also shares his name with Disney's Little Mermaid?

Answer: Ariel

3. First described in 1842, the extent of the change depends on the velocity of a body's motion with respect to the observer. Instrumental in astronomy and the study of wave phenomena, it produces a change in frequency. FTP, identify this effect named for an Austrian physicist.

A: Doppler Effect

4. His first ministry was too short to be of much consequence and in his third, twelve years later, he was a spent force. But in his second administration from 1924 to 1929, this Tory leader acted on his commitment to industrial conciliation and social harmony. He took the lead in ending the General Strike and helped rebuild the British economy after World War I. FTP name this Prime Minister instrumental in forcing the abdication of Edward VIII.

Answer: Stanley Baldwin

5. Medical drug research and development depends on the experimentation of several vegetable and animal substances. Among the most widely used is the commercial form of a fatty-brown compound found in the bile, sex hormones or cholesterol of oxen. FTP, name this hydroxy acid, which is derived from b-complex vitamins.

Answer: Cholic Acid

6. As an actor, this black Briton is best known for his role as "Victoria," the enigmatic squatter from the 1987 British movie "Sammy and Rosie Get Laid," a film whose plot features exactly what the title suggests. Yet, he gained his name recognition mostly by singing for a group whose 1988 album, The Raw and The Cooked, was its first successful release. FTP, name this lead vocalist for the

Fine Young Cannibals.

Answer: Roland Gift

7. The author of this work only became active in feminist politics in the early 1970s. In 1949, however, she had written a book in which she argued that neither liberalism, nor marxism could adequately address the concerns of women. Women, therefore, were to mobilize and become politically aware in order to make modern ideologies, particularly marxism, responsive to their grievances. FTP, name this book, which Simone de Beauvoir wrote while co-editing the leftist magazine Les Temps Modernes with her lifelong companion Jean-Paul Sartre.

Answer: The Second Sex

8. Violin virtuoso Joseph Joachim spent the summer of 1878 in the Austrian village of Pfoerstsach. There, Joachim waited for a good friend to finish composing a violin piece which he wanted to play. The piece, known for its gypsy-inspired third movement, is considered one of the most difficult for any violinist. Great soloists like Ytzhak Perlman or Nigel Kennedy usually play their own cadenza at the end of the first movement. FTP, name this work.

Answer: Brahms Violin Concerto

9. The youngest son of Drusus, he was overshadowed by the strong personality of his elder brother Germanicus and was hampered by a weak constitution as well as continual illness. Consul to his nephew, his proclamation as emperor was largely accidental. His wife, Messalina, was notorious for her marital infidelity. FTP identify this fourth Roman emperor chosen by the Praetorian Guard upon the assassination of Caligula.

Answer: Claudius

10. On October 1, 1994 the South Pacific Commonwealth of Palau gained independence from the United States. Palau was the last territory to be administered by a foreign power under a mandate from the United Nations. Independence will prepare the dissolution, FTP, of what division of the UN, which handled the oversight and transition to independence of several such territories?

Answer: UN Trusteeship Council

11. The 1994 Nobel Prize in economics was awarded to a German, Reinhard Selten, and two Americans, John Harsanyi and John Nash. The three scholars received the prize for developing a theory which focuses on the strategic interactions between, and give and take among "players," be they businesses or individuals. A player gains the advantage as he/she acquires more information than the other actors. FTP, what theory did Nash, Selten, and Harsanyi popularize?

Answer: Game Theory

12. French President Patrice de McMahon is reputed to have said: "I know what this disease is. I've had it. Either you die, or you remain an idiot." Whether it strikes heads of state or not, this illness, indigenous to warm, tropical climates, is transmitted by the mosquito *Aedes Aegypti*, and characterized by jaundice, vomiting and hemorrhages. FTP, name this disease, for which Walter Reed developed a vaccine.

Answer: Yellow Fever

13. In order to teach Hebrew pronunciation and grammar, rabbinical schools traditionally accept a series of comments and explanatory notes on the Old Testament as authoritative. Compiled between the seventh and tenth centuries, these texts are also used as interpretive notes on the Talmud. FTP, name these Hebrew-language commentaries.

Answer: Masorah

14. The name's the same. A 1610 canvas by El Greco and a Hellenistic sculpture unearthed in Rome's Esquiline Hill in 1506. The subject, whose name means "very perceptive" was a mythical Trojan priest who hurled a spear at the Trojan Horse in order to prove that it was hollow. FTP who is this tragic figure who was strangled by snakes sent by Apollo?

Answer: Laocoon

15. Commissioned by the d'Este family, his bust of Francesco d'Este demonstrates the unparalleled virtuosity in stone. Other works like the 1623 David feature vigorous diagonals emboldened by his contrapasto stance. He is perhaps better known for the Throne of St. Peter intended for the Vatican and the orgasmic Ecstasy of St. Theresa. FTP name this leading exponent of Baroque sculpture.

Answer: Gianlorenzo Bernini

16. Born near Huntington, Long Island, of mixed Dutch and English ancestry, he learned the printing trade and worked in Brookland and Manhattan. In 1842, however, he tried his hand at writing and produced the novel Franklin Evans. By 1846, he had become editor of the Brooklyn Eagle, but would later lose this position because of his support for the Free Soil Party. But his greatest fame came through his poetry, especially moving pieces such as "Crossing Brooklyn Ferry" and "Out of the Cradle Endlessly Rocking". FTP who is this American poet who commemorated the death of Lincoln in his "When Lilacs Last in the Dooryard Bloom'd" and also penned Leaves of Grass?

Answer: Walt Whitman

17. Trained in law and educated in international affairs, he held diplomatic posts under three presidents. He negotiated a 1819 treaty with Spain defining the western boundary of the United States and helped to a strict British influence to the north of the forty-ninth parallel as far west as the Rockies. FTP identify the first American ambassador to Russia who helped to negotiate the

Treaty of Ghent after the War of 1812, th only ex-president to sit in the House of Representatives.

Answer: John Quincy Adams

18. Concerned with the tendency of the human mind to organize perceptions into wholes, its major proponents were Wertheimer, Koffka, and Kohler. They maintained that psychological study hinged in the ability of the mind to complete patterns from limited available stimuli. FTP identify this German school of psychology.

Answer: Gestalt

19. It is roughly rectangular in shape and extends 133 miles east-west and 41 miles north-south. The Cordillera Central gives way to foothills, valleys, and a fertile coastal plain. With Operation Bootstrap the economy was converted to one based on manufacturing rather than agriculture. FTP identify this island discovered by Columbus in 1493 that was ceded to the U.S. as a result of the Spanish-American War.

Answer: Puerto Rico

20. Evangelist comes, warns Christian to flee, and tells him to journey to the Wicket-Gate beneath the shining light in the distance. Christian wanders into the Slough of Despond, from which he cannot escape because the weight of the burden of the sin on his back, until at last he is rescued by Help. Such begins the dream vision of this prose allegory published in two parts, the first in 1678. FTP what was this magnum opus of John Bunyan?

Answer: Pilgrim's Progress

21. Astronomy, geography, geology and cosmology are all parts of a science which describes and maps the main features of the heavens and the earth. FTP, name this discipline which also studies the development, and represents the main physical features of the universe.

Answer: Cosmography

22. Born in 1929, this German political theorist received his doctorate at the University of Bonn in 1954, and worked with Theodor Adorno and Max Horkheimer at Frankfurt's Institute for Social Research in the 1960s. Though best known for his attempts to reconcile marxism and Western liberal democracy, he also earned a following among Western scholars for his "Theory of Communicative Action" and "Consensus Theory of Truth." FTP, name this scholar and political commentator who is considered the last great thinker of the well-known "Frankfurt School."

Answer: Juergen Habermas

23. The Tustara, or Sphenoon is found exclusively in New Zealand. It is distinguished by its three eyes, one of which is called the pineal eye because of its location on the top of the head, where the pineal gland is normally found in mammals. More importantly, it is the sole surviving species of a family of lizard-like reptiles. FTP, name the family to which the Tustara belongs.

Answer: Rhynchocephalia

24. Paper and pencil ready? On a business trip, you treat yourself and four colleagues to a 12-dollar dinner special at your hotel's restaurant. Assume that the special includes everything from appetizer to dessert and drinks, and that you will pay 9% tax in addition to the subtotal. If you add 20% tip, tell me, for ten points and within 10 cents of the grand total, how much your bill will amount to.

Answer: \$78.08 [Accept 77.98 to 78.18]

25. In 1935, a 30 year-old Russian efficiency expert developed a method for increasing industrial production, based on material rewards for individual initiative. Eventually, it was adopted by, and implemented in, all Socialist countries, and was thought instrumental in the creation of the "New Socialist Man." The creative Russian expert lent his name not only to his method, but also to an adjective designating Soviet workers who regularly surpassed their production quotas. FTP, name this Soviet civil servant.

Answer: A.G. Stakhanov

26. Over an eight-year span, India reached the Davis Cup final twice, but never won it. In 1966, her team lost to Australia 4 games to 1. In 1974, however, the Indians defaulted rather than play, FTP, against what country?

Answer: South Africa

27. The West Indies won this sport's first two World Cups in 1975 and 1979. India prevailed in 1983, followed by Australia four years later. Pakistan beat England in the 1992 final 249-227, and retired all 10 English batsmen in 49.2 overs. FTP, name this sport, whose recent greats include Imran Khan, Graham Gooch, and Ian Botham.

Answer: Cricket

28. As we all know, George Washington first took the Presidential oath on April 30, 1789 in New York City. Beginning in 1793, presidential inaugurations began to take place on March 4, a practice which lasted well into this century, when the date was moved up six weeks. FTP, name the first year to witness a presidential inaugural on January 20.



Answer: 1937

29. One of this film director's most recent works is "Homo Faber," the adaptation of a novel by Swiss novelist Max Fritsch. 12 years earlier, he had made a name for himself with a movie version of Gunter Grass' "Tin Drum," which won the Golden Palm at the 1979 Cannes Festival. In 1989, he produced his first American feature when he adapted Margaret Atwood's "The Handmaid's Tale" to the screen, with Natasha Richardson in the starring role. FTP, name this German director.

Answer: Volker Schlöndorff

30. One would hardly expect an economist with a Ph.D. from the London School of Economics to express dislike towards the English-speaking world. In fact, this 62 year-old politician and statesman would deny any such thoughts. Rather, he would argue that the interests of English-speaking Canada and of French-speaking Quebec are different, and that logic dictates a political separation, but continued economic association between the two. FTP, name this Parti Quebecois leader, who became Prime Minister of Quebec in late September.

Answer: Jacques Parizeau

31. In October, 1994, this venerable British periodical shocked its readership by coming out for the abolition of the British monarchy. The new position contrasts sharply with that of Walter Bagehot, one of this publication's legendary editors this century, whose support for the monarchy almost equalled that for the Manchester School. Indeed, the journal has also been known for its support of classical liberal ideas ever since its creation in 1843. FTP, name this magazine, famous for its Intelligence Unit and Country Reports.

Answer: The Economist

32. This recently deceased author was born in a Bulgarian Jewish family in 1905, but spoke German at home. During World War II, he moved to London, where he acquired a British passport and lived for several years before moving on to Zurich. However, he continued to write stories and essays in German during his entire career. FTP, name this true world citizen and author of Conscience of Words, The Human Province, Voices of Marrakesh, and Crowds and Power.

Answer: Elias Canetti

33. This woman wrote the first original book of poetry in British North America. In 1630, she had settled in the Massachusetts Bay colony after leaving England with her parents. FTP, name this author of The Tenth Muse Lately Sprung Up in America.

A: Anne Bradstreet

34. In 1992, a not very good year for the Republican Party, Bill Clinton carried the state of California. For a quick ten points, name the last democrat to do so before Clinton.

A: Lyndon Baines Johnson (prompt if "Johnson" is answered)
