As he had also made a suborbital flight four years earlier in the Mercury program's Liberty Bell 7, this made him the first American to have made two space flights. He lost his life along with astronauts White and Chafee in the tragic 1967 Apollo I fire. FTP, who was this space pioneer nicknamed "Gus"?

4. It is an approximately 4,000 square mile area that was the site of military operations in the late 1830s against Osceola and the Seminole. Its ecosystems were severely disrupted by Hurricane Andrew in 1992, and recovery is expected to take several years. FTP, what is this marshy tropical savanna area of southern Florida?

ANSWER: _EVERGLADES_
5. In 1910 he caught a chill and died at the railroad stationmaster's house in Astapovo. His first published books were an autobiographical trilogy, "Childhood", "Boyhood", and "Youth". FTP, who was this novelist born in 1828 on his parents' estate at Yasnaya Polyana?

6. This independent record label recently signed a distribution deal with Atlantic Records and is run by former Village Voice rock critic Gerard Cosloy. Their roster of artists includes Pavement, Liz Phair, and The Jon Spencer Blues Explosion. FTP, name this label which shares its name with a familiar Spanish word meaning "killer."

7. Do you ever get a GUT feeling that a number of things usually viewed as separate could in fact be treated as different manifestations of a single entity? 9. He won a competition with his "Expulsion of the Moriscos by Philip III", a painting that has since been lost. His famous "Venus and Cupid", known as the "Rokeby Venus", is one of the few nudes in Spanish painting. FTP, who was this master whose other works include "Los Borrachos", "The Tapestry Weavers," "Surrender at Breda," portrait of the "Infanta Maria Theresa", and of course "Las Meninas"?

ANSWER: Diego de Silva y _VELAZQUEZ_
10. He was the son of a Polish-Jewish musician and an English mother, but was born and died in Paris. In 1891 he married a cousin of Marcel Proust. One of his key ideas was the distinction between duration, or time as it is actually experienced, and the mechanized clock time of scientists, which he regarded as a convenient fiction. FTP, identify this French philosopher awarded the 1928 Nobel Prize for Literature.

ANSWER: Henri Louis _BERGSON_
11. His Harvard Ph.D. was in entomology, and he studied gall wasps until 1937 when Indiana University asked him to teach a course in the area of sex education. Finding that little of any use was available on the subject in libraries, he began to conduct his own interviews, and over the next 19 years he and his colleagues collected some 17,500 sexual case histories. 13. Many people were upset when Yasir Arafat, once the world's "chief exporter of international terrorism," as some put it, was awarded a Nobel Peace Prize this year. But it was not the first time that a former terrorist was given the peace prize. FTP, what 1978 recipient was chief during the 1940s of an anti-British terrorist organization in Palestine?

14. Many rapids interrupt this river's flow, making it unsuitable for navigation, but it has great hydroelectrc potential. FTP, identify this surname also shared by television actress sisters Sara and Melissa.
