(1) Born in Maryland in 1777, he was first attorney general and then secretary of the treasury under Jackson. In the latter capacity, he helped Jackson destroy the Second Bank of the United States. In 1836 Jackson appointed him Chief Justice of the Supreme Court. FTP name this man who presided over the Dred Scott case.

Answer: Roger Taney

(2) Born in 1562, he wrote his first play as a peasant boy of 12. He went on to write nearly 1800 plays, of which nearly 500 have survived. His life included many scandals and service in the Spanish Armada. He deliberately flouted Aristotelian rules to win popular success. His works include *The Greatest Alcade* and *Peribanez*. FTP name this man who is considered the founder of modern drama.

Answer: Felix Lope de Vega

(3) This American worked on the atomic bomb and chaired the Atomic Energy Commission from 1961 to 1971. He helped discover plutonium, americium, curium, berkelium, californium, einsteinium, fermium, mendelevium, and nobelium. FTP name this man who shared the 1951 Nobel Prize in chemistry.

Answer: Glenn Seaborg

(4) Born Margaret Hookham, she studied in London and performed with the Royal Ballet, where her roles included *Sleeping Beauty* and *The Firebird*. After 1962 she was the partner of Rudolf Nureyev. FTP name this English ballerina.

Answer: Margot Fonteyn

- (5) He challenged the idea of the divine right of kings by stating that a sovereign's power derived from the people. His 1651 work coined the term "social contract" for his ideas about the relationship between a state and its citizens. FTP name this author of *Leviathan*. **Answer:** Thomas <u>Hobbes</u>
- (6) The northernmost point is the Ungava Peninsula, which is separated from Baffin Island by the Hudson Strait. It is also bounded by Hudson Bay, James Bay and the St. Lawrence River. It touches Newfoundland on the east and Ontario on the west. FTP name this Canadian province.

Answer: Quebec

(7) Die Rauber in 1781 brought him fame. He married Charlotte von Lengefeld and taught at the University of Jena. He wrote a history of the Thirty Years' War and other plays such as Mary Stuart, Wilhelm Tell and the trilogy Wallenstein. FTP name this man who wrote "Ode to Joy".

(8) Born in 1772, he was of Dutch-Jewish parentage. He believed that wages tend to stabilize around the the subsistence level and that the value of a good is a function of the labor needed to produce it. FTP name this economist who wrote *The Principles of Political Economy and Taxation*.

Answer: David Ricardo

(9) Born in Pennsylvania, he wrote lyrical and tonal music such as *Adagio for Strings, Knoxville: Summer of 1915*, and the 1956 Pulitzer Prize winning opera *Vanessa*. FTP name this American who died in 1981.

Answer: Samuel Barber

(10) We all know the story about Abner Doubleday inventing baseball is a myth. If anyone could be said to have invented baseball, it was this man. He organized the New York Knickerbockers in the early 1840's and wrote most of the modern rules of baseball. He also sketched a diamond playing field. In 1846 his club played the first real baseball game in Hoboken, New Jersy. FTP name this man who has only a small plaque at Cooperstown in his honor.

(11) Born in Michigan, he was governor of New York from 1943 to 1955. During this time he was the GOP nominee for president on two occasions. Both times he lost, even though pollsters had predicted a victory for him in 1948. FTP name this man who lost to both Roosevelt and Truman.

Answer: Thomas <u>Dewey</u>

(12) He fought in the Spanish and Chinese civil wars and wrote 2 novels based on these experiences. He served in the French Resistance during WWII and also wrote *The Voices of Silence* and *The Metamorphosis of the Gods*. FTP name this Prix Goncourt-winning French author of *The Human Condition*, *Man's Fate* and *Man's Hope*.

Answer: Andre Malraux

(13) He invented a hydrostatic balance, discovered the principle of isochromism, and wrote a treatise on gravity. In 1609 he constructed the first astronomical telescope and discovered the four largest moons of Jupiter. FTP name this author of *Dialogue Concerning the Two Chief World Systems*.

Answer: Galileo Galilei

(14) During his lifetime, he was considered the greatest artist in North Italy outside of Venice. His works include the St. Luke altarpiece in Milan, *Parnassus*, and *Triumph of Virtue*. He is also noted for his drawings and engravings. FTP identify this Paduan painter of *San Sebastian* and the San Zeno altarpiece.

Answer: Andrea Mantegna

(15) His writings examine the individual as a responsible but lonely being, adrift in a meaningless universe with freedom of choice. He wrote *The Family Idiot, The Respectful Prostitute, Being and Nothingness, The Flies, Nausea, No Exit* and *The Age of Reason*. FTP name this existentialist.

Answer: Jean-Paul Sartre

(16) It is bordered by Senegal, Guinea, Ivory Coast, Burkina Faso, Niger, Algeria and Mauritania. The Niger river runs through it. FTP name this nation whose capital is Bamako, which includes the ancient city of Timbuktu.

(17) Born in 1862, she lived in France after 1913. She is known for her stories about turn-of-the-century New York society. Her novels include *The Valley of Decision, The Custom of the Country, The House of Mirth, The Age of Innocence* and *Ethan Frome*. FTP name this American novelist.

(18) This American lived from 1868 to 1953. He taught at the University of Chicago and at Cal-Tech. In 1912, he conducted an experiment by injecting oil droplets between two charged plates. He adjusted the charge on the plates to hold the droplets suspended. He thus measured the charge of the electron. FTP name this man who won the 1923 Nobel Prize in physics.

Answer: Robert Millikan

- (19) Born in 1714, his first serious opera, *Iphegenia en Aulide* was produced in Paris in 1774. His emphasis on dramatic impact and musical simplicity became incorporated into French operatic tradition. FTP name this German who composed *Orfeo et Euridice*. **Answer:** Christoph Gluck
- (20) Born in 1561 he was favored politically by the Earl of Essex, whom he helped to prosecute after the latter's rebellion in 1601. Under James I he advanced to become lord chancellor in 1618. His career ended in 1621 when he pled guilty to taking bribes. He died after catching pnuemonia while trying to experiment with freezing a chicken. FTP name this author of *Novum Organum* and *Essays*. **Answer:** Francis Bacon

(21) He lived in the 15th century and was one of the foremost painters of the early Renaissance. He may have studied under Masaccio. FTP name this painter of *Virgin Adoring the Christ Child* and *Madonna with Saints*.

Answer: Fra Filippo Lippi
