5. A company may give certain shareholders the right to redeem their stock at a good price in the event of the company's being taken over, incurring extra cost to the acquirer. What two-word term—for ten points—describes this tactic to deter hostile takeovers?

6. One of the best-selling recording artists in the history of jazz, she mastered the "scat" technique and was widely imitated in the 1950's and 1960's. Celebrated for her smooth interpretations of Gershwin and Cole Porter songs, who—for ten points—is this American jazz singer?
