5) J.D. Salinger's "Catcher in the Rye" and John Steinbeck's "Of Mice and Men" both took their titles from the lines of this Scottish poet. For ten points, name the poet whose words are traditionally sung at the stroke of midnight, January 1st.

14) This is the unit of heat required to raise the temperature of one pound of water by one degree at sea level, and it is equivalent to 104.5 Joules.

For ten points, give the full name of this measure of energy.

Answer: BRITISH THERMAL UNIT (Prompt if BTU is given)

15) He invented the partial differential equation that is basic to quantum mechanics, left Germany in 1933 in protest of the treatment of Jews, and made his cat famous. For ten points, identify this Nobel prize winning physicist.

Answer: Erwin SCHRODINGER

16) Darius, Cyrus, Cambyses, and Xerxes were all emperors of the same ancient kingdom. For ten points, name the ancient empire which these men ruled.

Answer: PERSIA or PERSIAN EMPIRE

17) This actress has come out in support of legal prostitution after revealing that she had been a prostitute in Colorado in her youth. For ten points, name this comedienne.

Answer: Roseanne ARNOLD or ROSEANNE

18) This man won more Pulitzer Prizes for drama than any other. He won four prizes in all from 1920 to 1957. For ten points, name this author of "Anna Christie"

Answer: Eugene O'NEILL

19) He attended seminaries at Adelberg and Maulbronn before studying theology, philosophy, and mathematics at the University of Turbingen and in 1600 he was invited to be the assistant to Tycho Brahe in Prague. His works include "Cosmographic Mystery," "New Astronomy," and "Harmonies of the World." For ten points name this first strong supporter of the heliocentric theory of Copernicus and the discoverer of the three laws of planetary motion.

20) Derived from an italian word meaning "little song," it is a form of poetry, written in iambic pentameter. For a quick ten points, name this 14 line poetic form.

21) He lived from 1483 to 1546 and he even spent some time as an Augustinian Friar. However, after reading the Pauline letter to the Romans, he believed

that the proper relationship with God was based on faith and trust. For ten points, name this reformer who reduced the number of sacraments from seven to two and hammered the 95 theses on the door of the church in Whittenburg.

22) Born in 1548, he gave up his job as a clerk in the exchange brokerage in Paris in order to became a professional painter and produced such works as the Yellow Christ and Jacob Wrestling with an Angel. For ten points, name this artist who rejected the complexity of European life in favor of the simpler life of the South Sea Islands.

Finally, in February 1943, the Japanese were forced to evacuate and a major Allied base was established. For ten points, name this former British protectorate which became self-governing in 1976.
