Toss-Ups

1. The fur of this animal is mostly dark brown, but the bare face and buttocks are patterned in colors that are particularly striking in the adult male. FTP name this relative of the baboon that is found in the forests of central West Africa.

2. It was built between 1973 and 1981, and its total length is 7,283 feet. FTP, name this English bridge which is the longest single-span suspension bridge in the world.

3. Gamma Andromadae, Beta Cyni, and Alpha Canis Majoris are examples of a kind of star system in which two components orbit around a common center of gravity. For ten points, what name is given to these stars?

4. This fresh water monster is theorized to live in a large lake. The lake is 79 miles long, 2\_ miles wide, and 800 feet deep with an average temperature of 34 °F. People claim that this creature has humps and some claim that the creature is a descendant of the dinosaur Plesiosaurus. FTP name this inhabitant of Okanagan Lake.

dentist who takes up drinking and finally murders his wife. FTP, name this muckraker whose proposed trilogy Epic of the Wheat was left unfinished.

8. In his biography published in 1791, Samuel Johnson is quoted as saying, "Sir, a woman preaching is like a dog's walking on his hind legs. It is not done well; but you are surprised to find it done at all." For 10 points, identify the Englishman who not only wrote this biography, but also his own version of the Dictionary of the English Language.
