TOSS-UPS

1. Its most salient theses are: There is no ultimate purpose to the world; that persons find themselves in a world which is vaguely hostile; that not to choose is to choose not to choose. FTP, name this philosophical movement that has influenced the field of psychoanalysis through Rollo May and the literature of Dostoevsky and Camus.

Existentialism

2. This 2-word term was used prior to WWII and during the Cold War by many US citizens to describe an isolationism from international developments, especially those in Europe. The view was held to be sustainable because of the relative isolation of the American continents. There was, however, support for an increased level of armaments to deter attacks on mainland US, hence the first word of this label. FTP, what is this term?

Fortress America

3. The greatest painter in this style was considered to be Watteau. It followed the late Baroque in European art and design, it flourished from 1700–1750. Characterized by a charm and delicacy, FTP, name this period in art history, that derives its name from the French word rocaille—rock work.

Rococo

4. His controversial views on religion and political theory led him in 1794 to leave England for America in fear of his life. He wrote on English grammar, education and politics. In 1767 he took up the study of chemistry. FTP, name this British chemist who is most famous for his discovery of oxygen.

Joseph Priestly

5. Fruits of the Earth and The Counterfeiters were among the most famous of his 50 works of fiction. He received the Nobel Prize for literature in 1949. For 10 pts. name this French writer who died in Paris in 1951.

6. FTP, does Isometric, Isotonic, Eccentric, or Isokinetic best describe a type of muscular contraction during which the tension developed by the muscle while shortening at constant speed is maximal over the full range of motion?

7. Born in England in 1825 he is credited with coining the word —agnosticism...He became a staunch advocate of Darwin's theory of evolution by natural selection. He would debate Bishop Samuel Wilberforce in 1860 at a gathering sponsored by the British Association for the Advancement of Science. For 10pts. name this proponent of Darwin, nicknamed —Darwiſs Bulldog....

8. This 20th century English novelist was a professional champion steeplechase jockey, who used his knowledge of the horse-racing world into many successful mysteries including Blood Sport, High Stakes, Whip Hand, and Twice Shy. FTP, who is he?

9. Name the ancient Celtic site on Lake Neuchatel, Switzerland, which gives its name to cultures of the late Iron Age. The cultures date from the 6th century to late 5th century B.C. Another important site of this period includes Lake Dwellings at Glastonburg in South England. FTP, what is the name of the Swiss site?

La Tene

10. This gem was the sapphire of the Ancients when it was used for jewelry and ornamentation. It was the original pigment for Ultra-marine and is usually found in massive form in metamorphosed limestones. It is composed of lazurite and other minerals in shades of blue. For 10 points, what is it?

Lapis Lazuli

11. For 20 points, name this president of S. Korea who ruled from 1963 to 1979. Taking part in military camp in 1961, he was 3 times elected president. His rule became increasingly dictatorial, in 1972, he declared martial law. In 1979 he was assassinated by Kim Jae Kyu, head of the Korean Central Intelligence Agency. FTP, who was he?

Park Chung Hee

12. For 10 points, identify the group of people brought to Egypt by Fatimid Caliphs in the 10th century A.D. and who soon rose to become the warrior caste who were the dominant Egyptian power class from the 1200's until 1811.

Mamelukes or Mamluks

13. A student of Verocchio, this Italian painter of the early renaissance became the teacher of Raphael. Many of his works have been destroyed. Of his surviving works, some are in the Sistine Chapel where exists perhaps his most famous painting – Christ Giving the Keys to St. Peter. FTP, who is he?

14. The name is the same for these two northern and southern American rivers. The southern flows into the Mississippi and was the scene of a Civil War battle at the Sabine crossroads. The northern river flows northward through the U.S. into Canada where it empties into Lake Winnipeg. FTP, what is it?

1. 25pts. This US actor was born in Philadelphia in 1806. He moved to London and had several successful seasons from 1834–1837. In 1845 trouble began for the actor when his Macbeth was hissed by the audience; revenge caused him to hiss his rival, William Macready, a British actor, in Edinburgh during his Macbeth. It destroyed his reputation in England and he returned to the U.S. in 1848. Yet it was this actor's sympathizers that caused the most trouble. In 1849 following a performance of Macbeth in New York, they ignited a riot that killed 22 people. For 25pts. name the —hissed.actor.

2. 20 pt bonus. Name that body part. It lies in the upper part of the chest, in proximity to the heart of most vertebrates, its shape and size is determined by the surrounding structures. In humans its size shows great individual variation at any given age. It is present at birth and grows until puberty (avg. weight is 37g) after which it gradually reduces in size. Its presence is essential to the newborn for the development of lymphoid tissue and immunological competence. Name this lymphoid gland of vertebrates responsible for lymphocyte maturation.

4. 30pt. Bonus. I'll describe a type of football, not the NFL, and you give me the official name of the football associated with each description.

- 1. It's a mixture of rugby and soccer, played with 15 people on a side. Its field is rectangular, 84yd wide and 160 yd long. The object is to score points by either putting the ball into a goal net, worth three points or over a crossbar worth one point. Gaelic Football
- 2. Eleven players per side on a field 130yd long and 50–100yd wide. The object is to put the ball into the goal at the end of the playing field by using the feet or head. The first World Cup for this type of football was held in Uruguay in 1930. Association Football (or Soccer)
- 3. This type of football is a handling and kicking game. It has very few rules. It's played with 18 players per side on an oval field 180yd long and 150yd wide. The object is to score goals by kicking the ball between the opponent's goal posts for six points. Smaller posts are positioned to either side of the main goal if the ball goes through the smaller posts one point is scored. Australian Rules Football
