1. The Boll weevil first appears in Texas, the first American gasoline-powered car is built, George W. Ferris invents the Ferris Wheel, immigrants begin landing at Ellis Island, a violent strike breaks out among steel workers in Homestead, Pennsylvania, and James Weaver becomes the first Populist candidate for the presidency of the United States. FTP, in what year did all the following events occur?

Answer: 1892

2. While investigating the source of interference on short wave radio telephone transmissions, he detected a weak source of static that appeared to be outside the solar system but did not pursue his work further, leaving it to Grote Reber to construct the first radio-telescope in 1937. For 10 points, identify this Oklahoma-born engineer after whom the unit of radio emission strength is named.

Answer: Karl Jansky

3. One of the finest lyric poets associated with the court of Landgrave Herrman of Thuringia, it is he who convinces Tannhauser to enter the minnesinger competition in Wagner's opera. FTP, name this author whose Parzival is one of the earliest in the Arthurian canon.

Answer: Wolfram von Eschenbach

4. Conflicts over oil revenues finally dissolved the 1990 coalition government, throwing this nation back into civil war between the fundamentalist north and the south, which in 1967 became the first Arab Marxist state. FTP, name this divided nation bordering the Gulf of Aden.

Answer: Yemen

5. Discovered by researchers at the University of California in 1955, it was produced by bombarding einsteinium with helium ions. FTP, identify this element, number 101, named for the Russian chemist who perfected the Periodic Table.

Answer: Mendelevium

6. Based upon the presumption that as unemployment decreases, the increasing demand for labor will cause higher prices, it states that the rate of price increase is directly related to worker productivity. FTP, name this statistical relationship or the economist who theorized it.

Answer: Phillips Curve

7. The most recently discovered large members of this class of animals hail from the Vietnamese region of Vu Quang and are named the giant munjac and the quant khem. The class includes about 19 extinct orders and 19 living orders including some 4000 plus species. For 10 points, identify this class of animals divided into three groups: metatheria, eutheria, and monotremata.

Answer: Mammals

8. He wrote a series of travel letters to the Boston Advertiser that were revised and published after his return to America as Venetian Life. After this success, he went to work for the Atlantic, where he became editor in 1871. For 10 points, name this American author of such works as Their Wedding Journey, A Modern Instance, and The Rise of Silas Lapham.

Answer: William Dean Howells

9. Based on a Nikolai Leskov short story with a libretto by A.G. Preis, this Shostakovich opera tells the story of a woman who murders her husband and father-in-law. It was pulled in 1936 after Stalinist denunciation and replaced with a second adaptation entitled Katerina Ismailova. FTP, name this piece, Dmitri Shostakovich's second and final opera.

Answer: Lady MacBeth of Mtsensk or Minsk

10. Judicial "conservatives" who object to the Supreme Court as an agent of social change often point to this case, the first in which the court allowed the admission of social science data. FTP, name this 1908 case, argued for the plaintiff by future justice Louis Brandeis, in which the court upheld state regulated limits on women's labor.

Answer: Muller v. Oregon

11. After studying in Paris for five years, this Philadelphia-born artist returned home, teaching at the Pennsylvania Academy of Fine Arts from 1870-86 when he was forced to resign because of his insistence on using live nude models. FTP, name this artist whose paintings include "The Biglon Brothers," "The Chess Players," and "The Gross Clinic."

Answer: Thomas Eakins

12. Originally consisting of a darkened chamber into which light is admitted through a convex lens, it allowed 17th and 18th century artists to trace nature scenes onto a canvas. By the 19th century, it was reduced to a box fitted with a lens and a mirror placed on a tripod. FTP, name this optical apparatus whose name comes from the latin for "dark chamber."

Answer: Camera Obscura

13. He attended England's famous Rugby School under headmaster Thomas Arnold, an experience which he used in his writing. In Rugby, Tennessee he detailed his failed attempt to settle poor English boys in the rural U.S. FTP, name this man, best remembered for Tom Brown's School Days and Tom Brown at Oxford.

Answer: Thomas Hughes

14. While the Vendidad section, which details the religion's laws, was written later, the Gathas, which include the prayer to Ahura Mazda, is generally ascribed to Zoroaster, himself. FTP, name this book, the "bible" of Zoroastrians and Parsees.

Answer: Zend-Avesta or Avesta

15. In his 1617 Rabdologiae, he described a method of multiplication using rods with numbers marked on them; by placing the "bones" side by side, the product could be obtained by reading across. FTP, name this Scottish mathematician who is credited with inventing logarithms in his 1614 Canonis Descriptio.

Answer: John Napier

16. There is oil beneath the streets of Paris, but, to get to it, the syndicate must displace the common people who live on said streets. In the end, the free souls of Paris win out over the syndicate with the help of Countess Aurelia in, for 10 points, what play by Jean Giraudoux?

Answer: The Madwoman of Chaillot

17. While a civil engineer for the state of Pennsylvania, he devised a method for the manufacture of wire cable which he used to construct suspension bridges over the Allegheny and Niagara rivers. He died in an accident only months after taking on his greatest project. FTP, name this man whose son, Washington, completed construction on the Brooklyn Bridge.

Answer: John Augustus Roebling

18. Born into a ranching family in Madera, California, he served in the Marine Corps before attending film school at U.S.C. First gaining success on TV, creating the series Rifleman and The Westerner, quarrels with producer Martin Ranshoff during the shooting of Major Dundee almost wrecked his film career before it had gotten started. FTP, name this film maker, who, after scripting The Glory Guys and Villa Rides, raised excessive violence to an art form in such films as Straw Dogs and The Wild Bunch.

Answer: Sam Peckinpah

19. Following the success of Lady Frederick, four of his plays ran in London in 1908. During World War I, he returned to the land of his birth as an ambulance driver then as a secret agent, on which he based his Ashenden series. For 10 points, identify this English writer of Cakes and Ale, The Razor's Edge, and Of Human Bondage.

Answer: W. Somerset Maugham

20. Taking their name from that of a castle belonging to the Hohenstaufen Holy Roman Emperor Frederick II, they supported the empire in its conflicts with the papacy. FTP, name this political faction dominated by the Colonna family, which struggled with the pro-papal Orsinni family for control of Rome for nearly three centuries.

Answer: Ghibellines

21. An outstanding sculptor, as evidenced by his bronze relief "Nymph of the Fontainebleau" and the free-standing "Perseus with the Head of Medusa," he was best known as the goldsmith of work such as the saltcellar created for Francis I. FTP, name this sculptor remembered today as much for his Autobiography as for his art.

Answer: Benvenuto Cellini

22. "Diamonds and Toads," "Hop O' My Thumb," "Riquet with Tuft," and "Blue Beard" are among the lesser known tales from his 1687 collection Tales of the Past. FTP, name this author who also penned the classics "The Sleeping Beauty," "Red Riding Hood," "Cinderella," and "Puss in Boots."
