1. He began his career as an actor with the Theatre Guild, and in 1931 helped to found the Group Theatre, which later produced his best-known plays. He is best known for the socialist and proletarian themes which underlie much of his work. For ten points, who was this American playwright and screenwriter, author of Awake and Sing and Waiting for Lefty?

Answer: Clifford Odets

2. His foremost achievement was to adapt the artistic principles of the Italian Renaissance to northern tastes. A gifted draftsman, he produced a vast number of woodcuts and engravings; his techniques were equally well suited to his interests in realistic detail and visionary fantasy. For ten points, name this German artist, born in Nuremberg in 1471, whose works include the Passion of Christ and a set of woodcuts of the Apocalypse.

Answer: Albrecht Dürer

3. When photons of sufficient energy strike a metal, they liberate electrons whose maximum kinetic energy is equal to the energy of the photons less a characteristic quantity called the work function. This sentence summarizes, for ten points, what physical principle first explained in 1905 by Albert Einstein?

Answer: Photoelectric effect

4. He was born in 1868 and earned a Ph.D. from Harvard before taking a teaching position in economics and history at Atlanta University. An early advocate of full and immediate equality for blacks, he eventually moved from promotion of pan-Africanism to membership in the Communist party and emigration to Ghana. For ten points, who was this American civil rights leader, a cofounder of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People?

Answer: W. E. B. Du Bois

5. Its guiding premise is that control of the money supply is the primary, if not only, determinant of a nation's economic health. Adherents of this school believe that management of the money supply to produce credit ease or restraint is the chief factor influencing inflation or deflation; they dismiss Keynesian fiscal intervention as ineffective in regulating market performance. For ten points, name this economic school championed by Milton Friedman.

Answer: monetarism

6. He was an unsuccessful novelist before a friend suggested he try his hand at theater; his first literary notice came, however, as a London music critic. Unable to have his works produced at home, he sought a reading audience with his first collection in 1898, Plays Pleasant and Unpleasant. By the outbreak of the first World War, his fame was sufficiently assured to protect him from the unpopularity caused by his criticism of British wartime policy. For ten points, who was this Nobel-winning Irish playwright, author of Androcles and the Lion, Arms and the Man, and Pygmalion?

Answer: George Bernard Shaw

7. The prophecies within it were compiled and arranged by the prophet's companion Baruch, and they include warnings against Gentile nations and several well-known Messianic passages. Its overall message is a summons to moral reform, both personal and social, backed by threats of doom. For ten points, name this Old Testament book of the Bible, the second of the Major Prophets.

Answer: Jeremiah (or Jeremias)

8. He was active among the forces which forced the Provisions of Oxford on an unwilling Henry III in 1258. When the king annulled the Provisions three years later, he became a leader in the subsequent baronial revolt, winning a significant victory over the king at the battle of Lewes. In 1265, he called a great Parliament, summoning representatives from the boroughs in addition to the country's knights in an attempt to build popular support. For ten points, name this earl of Leicester and English revolutionary who was eventually killed by royalist forces at the battle of Evesham.

Answer: Simon de Montfort

9. It exists in two official forms: the bokmaal (or riksmaal) dialect, used in the cities, by the professional classes, and in literature; and the landsmaal (or nynorsk) dialect, a recent standardization of rural dialects which is mostly used in outlying areas, but also notably in the city of Bergen. For ten points, name this Scandinavian language.

Answer: Norwegian

10. The story takes place on Sullivan's Island off the South Carolina coast. William Le Grand accidentally discovers a cipher message which describes the location of buried treasure. Following its directions, he drops the accompanying beetle figurine through the eye of a skull and unearths a fortune in pirate gold. For ten points, what is this 1843 short story by Edgar Allan Poe?

Answer: The Gold Bug

11. The last name's the same: She is a chemist and crystallographer, born in 1910, who determined the structure of vitamin B_{12} and other compounds involved in pernicious anemia. He is a biophysicist, born in 1914, who analyzed the electrical and chemical processes which operate in nerve-cell discharges. For ten points, give the common last name of this pair of Nobel laureates, she for chemistry in 1964 and he for physiology in 1963.

Answer: Hodgkin, Dorothy Mary Crowfoot and Sir Alan Lloyd

12. It exists in a range of sizes, from soprano to grand bass; it is unusual in that none of the members of the family are transposing instruments. Popular during the Renaissance and Baroque periods, it fell from favor due to its lack of dynamic range and difficult intonation, enjoying a rebirth only in the early twentieth century. Among its chief performers and proponents today are Marianne Verbruggen and Michaela Petri. For ten points, name this end-blown fipple flute, a member of the woodwind family.

Answer: Recorder

- 13. It rises as the Za Qu in Tibet and flows generally south through China, then circuitously across or along the borders of Burma, Laos, Thailand, and Cambodia. For ten points, what is this Southeast Asian river which eventually flows into the South China Sea in a vast, fertile delta near Ho Chi Minh City in Vietnam? Answer: Mekong River
- 14. He was married four times; one of his books is entitled Is Modern Marriage a Failure? He ran an experimental school called Beacon Hill which was severely criticized, and an application to teach at the City College of New York was withdrawn because it was felt that his teachings were immoral. His pacifist views led to his imprisonment in England during World War I, and his concerns about nuclear war were described in Common Sense and Nuclear Warfare and Has Man A Future? For ten points, name this iconoclastic British philosopher, author of A History of Western Philosophy and coauthor of Principia Mathematica.

Answer: Bertrand Russell

15. Cerium, praseodymium, neodymium, promethium, samarium, europium, gadolinium, terbium, dysprosium, holmium, erbium, thulium, ytterbium, and lutetium are the members, for ten points, of what series of chemical elements?

Answer: Lanthanide series

16. Born in 1874, this schoolteacher became a writer of juvenile fiction almost by accident after being asked to write a serial for a Sunday School paper. The novel which resulted from this assignment became enormously popular and eventually engendered six sequels. For ten points, who was this Canadian author who drew on memories of her Prince Edward Island childhood to write Anne of Green Gables?

Answer: Lucy Maud Montgomery

17. His discovery of the parallax of 61 Cygni, announced in 1838, was the first authenticated measurement of a star's distance from the earth; he determined the positions and relative motions of over 50,000 stars. For ten points, who was his German astronomer and mathematician who gave his name to a set of mathematical functions that he developed?

Answer: Friedrich Wilhelm Bessel

18. The unpopularity of his political views forced him to hide for a time in the sewers of Paris, where he exacerbated a skin condition that required frequent treatment in warm baths. What French revolutionary, for ten points, was the famous victim of Girondist sympathizer and assassin Charlotte Corday?

Answer: Jean Paul Marat

19. She was shut away in a brass tower by her father, King Acrisius, because the oracle told him that he would be killed by her son. The king's plans were foiled, however, when Zeus came to her in the form of a golden shower and made her the mother of the hero Perseus. For ten points, name this mythological figure.

Answer: Danaë

- 20. By maintaining strict party discipline and rewarding its adherents through the spoils system, it became one of America's first effective political machines. After 1842, however, it split into two factions, the Barnburners and the Hunkers. For ten points, what was this informal Democratic political organization founded in 1820 by Martin Van Buren and others, named for the New York city in which it was based? Answer: the Albany Regency
- 21. The name's the same: One is a city on the Lehigh River, founded by Moravian Church members, and today a major steelmaking center and the home of Lehigh University; the other is a town on the West Bank of the Jordan, the setting of the biblical Book of Ruth and the traditional site of the birth of Jesus. For ten points, what is the common name?

Answer: Bethlehem

23. He was born in 1862. Before turning to writing, he had studied medicine and psychiatry, which accounts in part for his ability to probe his characters in depth. His works are notable both for their stylistic experimentation and their vigorously amoral attitude toward erotic situations, both traits characteristic of Viennese literature in his time. For ten points, name this Austrian author of Light o' Love, La Ronde, and Leutnant Gustl.
