Toss Ups

1. This art movement, which influenced the later movements of Dada and Surrealism, originated in Paris around 1907 and was a revolt against the sensual emotional styles of the previous era. Inspired by primitive art and the work of Cezanne, its practitioners used an analytical system in which three-dimensional subjects were fragmented and redefined from several different points of view. For ten points, name this art movement whose founders were Georges Braque and Pablo Picasso.

\_Cubism\_

2. One of the most significant ruins of this ancient settlement is a walled complex surrounding a carved sun-stone called "Intihuatana". It was abandoned for centuries until it was rediscovered by Hiram Bingham in 1911. For ten points, name this fortress city located in a high saddle between two Andean mountains about fifty miles from Cuzco, Peru.

\_Macchu Pichu\_

3. Because her mother boasted that she was more beautiful than the Nereids, Poseidon became angry enough to send a sea-monster against Ethiopia. An oracle declared that she must be sacrificed to the monster, so she was chained to a rock near Joppa. For ten points, name this daughter of Cepheus and Cassiopeia from classical mythology, who was saved by Perseus.

Andromeda

4. The U.S. Constitution lays out the essence of eminent domain, stating, "nor shall private property be taken for public use, without just compensation." For ten points, which amendment to the Constitution is this which also protects against double jeopardy and self-incrimination?

the \_Fifth\_ Amendment

5. Two American rivers share this common name. The first originates in Lake Traverse and flows north through Fargo and Winnipeg. The second flows through Shreveport, Louisiana after forming part of the border between Oklahoma and Texas. For ten points, give the common colorful name.

the \_Red\_ River

6. Britain, seeking to end restrictions on foreign trade, was the easy victor. By the Treaty of Nanking, Hong Kong was ceded to Britain and five ports were opened to British trade. For ten points, identify this war fought from 1839 to 1842, which was caused by the Chinese government's attempts to stop the illegal drug trade.

the First \_Opium\_ War

7. The name is the same. The first was one of the judges of Israel, who defeated the Midianites and refused the kingship because of his belief that God was the king of Israel. The second was a poor Florida man, whose poverty forced him to act as his own counsel when he was charged with a felony. In 1963, the U.S. Supreme Court overturned his conviction, ruling that the 6th and 14th amendments guaranteed him and others the right to free counsel. For ten points, give this name often found on the cover of a Bible.

\_Gideon\_

8. On May 7, 1975, a week after the fall of South Vietnam, President Ford announced the end of the Vietnam War. But, only one week later U.S. Marines were sent back to Indochina to rescue the crew of a U.S. freighter that had been seized by Cambodia. For ten points, name this freighter which prompted a swift return to Southeast Asia.

\_Mayaguez\_

9. For twelve years after the end of World War Two the unstable Fourth Republic of France struggled. The regime collapsed in 1958 when it was faced with a French army rebellion in Algeria. By popular demand, the French people sought a hero of both World Wars to lead their country out of its troubles. For ten points, name the general who was called out of retirement to become the first president of France's Fifth Republic.

Charles \_de Gaulle\_

10. "And all men kill the thing they love, by all let this be heard,  
Some do it with a bitter look, Some with a flattering word,  
The coward does it with a kiss, The brave man with a sword."

For ten points, identify the poem from which this stanza is taken, which was written while imprisoned on immorality charges, by the British author Oscar Wilde.

\_ "The Ballad of Reading Gaol" \_

11. In remarkably clear and precise prose, he presented a world at once real and dreamlike, in which modern people, burdened with guilt, isolation and anxiety make a futile search for personal salvation. His characters mirror his own unhappy life as an insurance agent who died young of tuberculosis. Among his symbolic novels are *The Castle*, *Amerika*, *The Trial*, and the short novel *The Metamorphosis*. For ten points, name this Prague-born author.. Kafka

Franz Kafka

12. If it is cooled below the lambda point, or 2.19 degrees Kelvin, this element gains an extremely high electrical conductivity; even more interestingly, it will begin to flow freely, even upward, with no measurable friction and viscosity. For ten points, which noble gas element has this property of superfluidity?

Helium

13. After signing with Warner Brothers in 1937 he played square romantic leads in some 50 films, mainly routine B productions. Among the highlights of his career were in *The Hasty Heart* and *Kings Row*, and he later became president of the Screen Actors Guild. Name this actor, better remembered as the host of "Death Valley Days" and for comedy films like *Bedtime for Bonzo*, who later tried his hand at politics.

Ronald \_Reagan\_

14. A Father of the Church and Doctor of the Church, his real name was Eusebius Hieronymus. After serving as secretary to Pope Damasus I, he began a new version of the Bible at the pope's request, revising his earlier translations of the Bible and translating additional portions from Hebrew. This became the basis for the new Latin Vulgate. For ten points, name this religious scholar.

Saint \_Jerome\_

15. It includes the quotations, "A foolish consistency is the hobgoblin of little minds", "society everywhere is in conspiracy against the manhood of every one of its members" and "nothing can bring you peace but yourself". Ftp, name this significant essay by the "Sage of Concord", Ralph Waldo Emerson.

\_ "Self-Reliance" \_

16. First published in *The Century* in 1882, this short story became widely popular because of its intriguing unresolved ending. FTP name this title piece of a later story collection by Frank Stockton, in which a commoner was given the choice of marrying a princess or being mauled by a ferocious feline.

The \_Lady or the Tiger\_

17. If I were to draw an indifference curve representing a typical person's preferences for right and left shoes, it would form a right angle. For ten points, what do economists call such a pair of goods whose cross-price elasticity of demand is negative, such as automobiles and gasoline or toothbrushes and toothpaste?

\_complements\_

18. This Greek play first performed in 411 BC takes place during the Athens-Sparta war. The title character is able to convince both the Athenian and Spartan women to join her in withholding their sexual favors from their husbands until the war is over. FTP, name the comic play by Aristophanes.

\_Lysistrata\_

19. Known as "The American Louis-Philippe", he ran for president in 1856, winning the popular vote only in Maryland for the American or Know-Nothing Party. For ten points, name this politician who had earlier gained the White House not through election but by the death of Zachary Taylor.

Millard Fillmore

20. This Italian composer had the unusual fortune to be born on a leap day: February 29, 1792. Among his works are The Bill of Marriage, Semiramide, and Cinderella. FTP name this composer of comic opera best known for The Barber of Seville.

Gioacchino (Antonio) Rossini

21. Annette, Yvonne and Cecile say they never told their late mother that they were abused by their father after the nine-year court battle which allowed them to live with their parents and not as wards of the state. But after 50 years of silence they decided it was time to make their case public. Annette, Yvonne, Cecile and two other sisters have been in the public eye since they were born in Corbeil, Ontario on May 29, 1934. For ten points, give the last name of these famous siblings.

Dionne quintuplets

22. The aqueous humor is the liquid in the space between the iris, part of the lens, and the cornea. For ten points, name the transparent, gelatin-like substance filling the large inner cavity of the eyeball, which helps keep the shape of the eyeball and protects the retina and its nerve endings.

vitreous humor

23. The oral contraceptive is commonly called "the pill." In 1990 a surgically implanted long-term contraceptive came on the market. For ten points, by what commercial name is this contraceptive, commonly placed in the upper arm, known?

Norplant

24. The vinegar fly or fruit fly is often used in the laboratory study of genetics because of its ten-day life cycle and large chromosomes. For ten points, give the genus and species of this insect.

Drosophila melanogaster

25. Some uninformed souls might guess that the atomic symbol for gold is Gd. But, of course, Au is the symbol for gold. For ten points, which element's symbol is Gd?
