Tossups by Johns Hopkins A for 1995 Princeton

- This man was one of the most ambitious monarchs of the Old Regime. However, he led his nation into rapid decline after greatly overextending himself into the Baltic. FTP name this monarch of Sweden from 1697 to 1718. Answer: Charles XII
- 2. This protein is produced naturally when insulin stimulates fat cells. It is thought to bind to hypothalamus cells and make them stop the production of neuropeptide Y, thus increasing the rate of metabolism. There was widespread excitement in July when this protein was found to cause dramatic weight loss in rats. FTP identify this supposed magic bullet in the fight against obesity.

Answer: leptin

3. In a 1939 letter to the Princeton Review, he made a convincing case that John Keats was the greatest poet ever to write in English. Hardly surprising, then, that the title of his second-to-last novel is lifted from Keats's Ode to a Nightingale. FTP name this author of Tender is the Night.
