  Answer: Battle of ISSUS
- 3. Often regarded by Muslim scholars as the second highest authority for the source of Islamic law next to the Koran, this collection of sayings attributed to the Prophet Muhammad is often translated into English as traditions.

Answer: HADITH

4. An Old Testament prophet of the Old Kingdom, he preached a message of forgiveness for Israel that was reflected in his marriage to the "impure" woman, Gomer.

Answer: HOSEA

5. Dostoevsky is quoted in saying of him, "We have all come from under his 'Overcoat'." For 10 points, name the author to whom he was referring.
