1. At a party once, a guest bet he could make this man say more than 3 words at one time. The subject's response: "You lose." For ten points, name this man famous for a 6 word quote, "The business of America is business," and the only President sworn in by his own father.

A: Calvin Coolidge

2. In the 1940's, he invented the air crib-- and air conditioned, germ free, soundproof box in which a child would spend the first two years of his life. In works like Beyond Freedom and Dignity and The Behavior of Organisms, he championed the behavioral school of psychology. For ten points, name this psychologist best known for the book Walden Two and another famous box that bears his name.

A: Burrhus Frederick Skinner

3. This country's flag is blue featuring a yellow sun. Part of ~~both Europe and Asia~~, it is a former member of the USSR. It is best known for the Baikonur Cosmodrome, where most manned Russian space missions start. For ten points name this country whose capital is Alma-ata.

A: Kazakhstan

4. Born Chloe Anthony Wofford, she used her childhood in midwestern steel towns as material for her first two novels, The Bluest Eye and Sula. She modernized an Uncle Remus tale in her Tar Baby and in 1987 won the Pulitzer Prize for Beloved. For ten points, name this African American Nobel laureate.

A: Toni Morrison

5. Onset is traditionally late in life, but it may strike a victim in his or her 20s. First symptoms include shuffling feet and slurred speech, but contrary to popular belief, mental faculties are not impaired. For ten points, identify this neurologic disease resulting from a dopamine deficiency characterized by an uncontrollable tremor.

A: Parkinson's Disease

✓ 6. In chronology, it's the seventh month of the French revolutionary calendar, starting around the time of the vernal equinox. In biology, it means "of or in the earliest stage of development." In literature, it's an Emile Zola novel about coal mine workers. For ten points, give this 8 letter word.

A: germinal

R 7. Canadian DJ Pierre Brassard posed as this man in late October to get Queen Elizabeth to talk on the radio for 17 minutes on Canadian independence. He took power in November 1993 on behalf of the Liberal party. For ten points, name this Canadian prime minister who succeeded Kim Campbell.

A: Jean Chretien

Q 8. Charlemagne and William the Conqueror were two of the few people in medieval Europe who were; most Egyptian pharaohs were too, as were many Civil War Soldiers whose bodies had a long way to go before burial. For ten points, name this process in which a corpse is chemically treated to delay composition.

A: Embalming

✓ 9. This Quaker and Swarthmore graduate passed the Pennsylvania bar in 1893 and served in Congress from 1909--1915. He became alien property custodian at the start of World War I, and in 1919, President Wilson made him attorney general. For ten points, name this man who used his post to terrorize suspected radicals in his infamous raids.

A: A. Mitchell Palmer

✓ 10. Born in 1471, he was called the "prince of German artists." He would have been a goldsmith like his father but he discovered a talent for drawing. From Nuremberg he did paintings but became attracted to engravings and woodcuts, allowing a far greater audience to view his work. For ten points, name this artist of copper engravings "Knight, Death, and Devil" and "Apocalypse."

A: Albrecht Durer

✓ 11. A World War I soldier, he wrote of the evils of war in a technically experimental style. His poems included "Anthem for Doomed Youth" and "Strange Meeting." For ten points, identify this poet killed in 1918, a week before armistice best known for the poem "Dulce et Decorum Est."

A: Wilfred Owen

12. About 500 miles off the southeastern coast of Asia, it borders the Celebes, Sulu, and South China Seas. Leyte, Panay, Negros, and Cebu are some of its islands, but the 2 largest are Mindanao and Luzon. For ten points, name this country whose capital is Manila.

A: Philippines

13. This 20th Century American physicist performed important experiments involving the photoelectric effect, and worked on the experimental determination of Planck's constant. However, that's not why he won the 1923 Nobel prize. For ten points, name this man who measured the charge of an electron as a discrete value with his oil drop experiment.

A: Robert Millikan

14. In Howard Stern's new book, he claims that this man's makeup began melting in the sun as he met with Howard in Manhattan. The idea behind the meeting was to rehabilitate the image of this man, accused of sexually abusing young boys. For ten points, name this pop star who may have married Lisa-Marie Presley for the same reason.

A: Michael Jackson

15. A 1921 graduate of the Russian Academy of Opera and Ballet, he joined Diaghilev's Ballet Russe in 1924 after leaving the Kirov Ballet. In his career, he wrote over 200 ballets, the majority during his tenure with the New York City Ballet, including Pastorale, Cotillion, and Orpheus. For ten points, name this Russian American dancer and choreographer.

A: George Balanchine

16. Only one fossil of the species *Eoanthropus dawsoni* has ever been found, consisting of skull fragments. This presumed ancestor to humans was found in 1912 England, and was a subject of controversy for the next 4 decades. For ten points, give the more common name of this fossil proved in 1953 to be a hoax.

A: Pittdown man

17. New Atlantis, Oceana, Erewhon, the City of the Sun, Walden II and the Garden of Eden are all literary examples of an ideal society. For ten points, give the word meaning "no place" in Greek, made most famous by Saint Thomas More in 1516.

A: Utopia

18. In 1939, Hitler appointed him successor to the leadership of the Reich, but in 1943, he was relieved of all duties and offices, after his job performance declined due to morphine addiction and criticism of his defense against Allied air raids. For ten points, name this director of the Gestapo and the Luftwaffe.

A: Hermann Goering

19. This NFL player recently had his college number retired. He's not allowed to wear his number 2 in the pros, however, since he's a full time cornerback and part-time wide receiver. For ten points, name this Florida State alumnus who has worn number 21 with the Falcons, 49ers, and now the Cowboys.

A: "Neon" Deion Sanders

20. The core of this Cambridge intellectual group were the 2 daughters of Sir Leslie Stephen. Other members included E.M. Forster, Roger Fry, and John Maynard Keynes. FTP, name this collective group founded in 1904 by Virginia Woolf and her sister Vanessa which was named by its ridiculers.

21. Stratum basale, stratum spinosum, stratum granulosum, stratum lucidum, and stratum corneum. For ten points, these are the principal layers of what deratin producing protective largest organ of the body in terms of surface area?

23. They separate the Pacific ocean from the Sea of Okhotsk, and are islands of volcanic origin. They extend from the Kamchatka peninsula, Russia to Hokkaido, Japan. In 1875, Japan gained control of the islands by seceding Sakhalin island to the Russians. However, the ownership of, for ten points, what islands has been disputed since the end of World War II?

24. He was an unsuccessful performer in the 40's, but it wasn't until he opened a restaurant in 1951 that he began to explore calypso music, recording songs like "Jamaica Farewell," "Brown-Skin Girl" and "Matilda." For ten points, identify this singer-actor best known for "The Banana Boat Song."

The English one is the 8 key on the telephone and it is typed with the left index finger on a standard keyboard. This star, about the only exception to this rule, is a member of a triple star system and orbits its companions every million years. For ten points, name this star located 4.3 light years from the Earth.
