1) One of these was established in 1233 to combat the Albigensians. Another one was established in 1542 to combat Protestantism. For 10 points, name this tribunal of the Catholic Church, whose notorious Spanish variety was headed by Tomas de Torquemada.

Answer: Inquisitions

2) He delivered the 1988 commencement address at Emory, and, for the 1996-97 school year, will serve as a visiting professor at Emory's Candler School of Theology. For 10 points, name this first black Anglican dean of Johannesberg, and winner of the Nobel Peace Prize in 1984.

Answer: Desmond Tutu

3) Inspired by St. Bernard, they were formed by Hugh de Payens to protect pilgrims on voyages to the Holy Land. For 10 points, name this order, this first eastern order of military knighthood, whose headquarters were near the ruins of the Temple of Solomon.

Answer: Knights Templars or the Templars

4) Her last two husbands—Reo Fortune and Gregory Bateson—had the same line of work as this early feminist, whose books include Male and Female, and Sex and Temperament, and whose autobiography is Blackberry Winter. For 10 points, name this anthropologist, and author of "Coming of Age in Samoa."

ANSWER: Margaret Mead

5) Known in the United States as mifepristone, its use is typically supplemented with misoprostol pills. For 10 points, give the name of this pill, whose initials stand for its manufacturer, Roussel Uclaf, and which has led to controversy for its ability to induce abortions.

Answer: RU-486

6) His resume might read as follows: Eagle Scout, Rhodes Scholar, chair of the Senate Agriculture Committee, chair of the Foreign Relations committee, and mayor of Indianapolis. For 10 points, name this Republican Presidential candidate and senator from Indiana.

Answer: Richard Lugar

7) A collection of Viking chieftans gathered in an open-air assembly in 930 A.D., forming what would become the world's oldest surviving parliament—the Althing. For 10 points, name this country, whose prime minister in 1995 is David Oddsson, and whose capital is Reykjavik.

Answer: Iceland

8) His father, a German-Jewish surgeon, discarded medical illustration, which he then recovered and collected, going on to become the curator of rare books at the Berlin St. Arts Museum. For 10 points, name this archivist, whose famous photo archives were purchased in 1995 by Microsoft's Bill Gates.

Answer: Otto Bettman (the Bettman archives)

9) Political leader Lamar D. Smith is shot. Both the Village Voice and the National Review begin publication. Malenkov resigns. The AFL and the CIO merge. For 10 points, name the year which also saw the first and only World Series championship brought to Brooklyn.

Answer: 1955

10) He already wrote a play of two men obsessed with Maria Callas called "The Lisbon Traviata," yet in 1995 released another play involving Callas entitled "Master Class." For 10 points, name this playwright whose play won the 1995 Best Play Tony, entitled "Love! Valour! Compassion!"

answer: Terence McNally

11) This scientist's books include "Biology and Knowledge," "Genetic Epistomology," and "The Development of Thought." His theory states that growth always follows in four sequential stages: sensorimotor, preoperational, concrete operational, and formal operational. For 10 points, name this Swiss psychologist who studied the development of children.

answer: Jean Piaget

12) Their major leaders included Lucius Priscus and Luscius Superbus, while their major cities included Arezzo, Caere, Tarquinii and Veii. For 10 points, name this highest civilization before the coming of Rome, located in present-day Italy.

answer: Etruscans

13) In 1970, he became the first living artist to be awarded an exhibition in the White House, whose works include Invisible Girl. For 10 points, name this contemporary American artist, 240 works of whom was discovered in 1986, all featuring his Pennsylvanian neighbor Helga Testorf.

Answer: Andrew Wyeth

14) Not since his 1978 play Betrayal has a full length play of his been opened. In 1995, Jason Robards and Blythe Danner star in his work "Moonlight." For 10 points, name this playwright of "No Man's Land," "Old Times," and "The Birthday Party."

ANSWER: Harold Pinter

15) In this country, activist Ken Saro-Wiwa, the head of the Movement for the Survival of the Ogoni people, was sentenced to death in October 1995 by General Sani Abacha. For 10 points, name this African country, the 1995 recipient of "scam"-ful commentary by Colin Powell, whose capital is Abuja.

Answer: Nigeria

16) He was the voice of the Grinch in "The Grinch that Stole Christmas." Born William Henry Pratt, he appeared on Broadway in stage versions of "Arsenic and Old Lace." For 10 points, name this actor, better known for his classic film role as Frankenstein's monster.

Answer: Boris Karloff

17) This poem glorified the victory of the Briton, James Thomas Brudenell, the seventh earl of Cardigan, at the Battle of Balaclava on October 25, 1854. For 10 points, name this Tennyson poem, some of which reads: "Half a league, half a league onward/ Into the valley, rode the Six Hundred."

Answer: The Charge of the Light Brigade

18. Occupationally, he is an environmental artist, as demonstrated by some of works, like a huge curtain built across Colorado canyon. For 10 points, name this Bulgarian-born artist, who, in 1995, with his wife Jeanne-Claude, wrapped the Reichstag.

ANSWER: Christo Javacheff

19) He won a 1992 Tony for his role in Two Trains Running, and wrote his first play in 8 days, in which he also stars as Mike Leon. The play is entitled Riff Raff. For 10 points, name this actor, who earned a 1993 Academy Award nomination for "What's Love Got To Do With It?"

Answer: Lawrence Fishburne

20) A teletype scroll of his was auctioned in 1995 for a price of \$1 million. The scroll was used for the writing of a novel written during a three-week long amphetamine binge. For 10 points, name this creator of Sal Paradise in his beat-novel On The Road.

Answer: Jack Kerouac

21) Turn-of-the-century European botanists Carl Erich Correns, Hugo Marie DeVries, and Enrich Tschermak von Seysenegg obtained results similar to his work, thereby vindicating the results—for 10 points—of what 19th-century geneticist and Austrian monk?

Answer: Gregor Mendel

22) On November 1, 1946, this city's first major professional basketball team—the BAA's Huskies—beat the New York Knicks 68 to 66 in the franchise's first game. The Huskies folded after a year, and so—for 10 points—what city hasn't had a major pro basketball team until the emergence in 1995 of the Raptors?

Answer: Toronto

23) Its first president was Senator Andrew Jackson White, and its resident faculty included Louis Agassiz and James Russell Lowell. For 10 points, name this university, named for the man who was for a long time the largest stockholder in Western Union, which is primarily located in Ithaca.

24) For 10 points, name the Division I-A school which boasts America's highest graduation rate for its football players, and whose home games are played in South Bend.

Answer: University of Notre Dame

25) Dasypus novemcinctus, they comprise 20 species of the order Dasypodidae, and sometimes give birth as long as two years after mating. For 10 points, name this creature which boasts a shell comprising some 2500 bony plates, and whose name is Spanish for "little armored thing."

Answer: Avon (Albee was the first Avon lady)

29) Israeli scientists in 1995 confirmed that it is responsible for damage done to red sea coral formations in the Gulf of Aqaba. For 10 points, name this famous and still-active volcano located in the Philippines.

ANSWER: Mount Pinatubo

30) A family of landowners and warriors named Gonzaga conquered it in 1382, and ruled it for 400 years. It is also the capital of Italy's Mantova province, surrounded on three sides by the Mincio River. For 10 points, name this city, known as the setting of "Rigoletto" and the place where Romeo went to buy poison.
