1. The first, formed by Massachusetts in 1764, was intended to encourage united opposition to Britain's stiffening of customs enforcement and prohibition of American paper money. The second notified other colonies of New York's actions in resisting the Stamp Act. In 1772, a new one was formed in Boston upon the announcement that Massachusetts' judges would be paid by the King rather than the colony. FTP, what were these organizations designed to aid communication among the American colonies?

Answer: Committees of Correspondence

2. This English novelist turned to literature after he met Joseph Conrad on a voyage, writing his earliest works under the pseudonym John Sinjohn. His plays include <u>Bit O' Love, Mob,</u> and <u>The Silver Box</u>, but he is best known for a series of novels concerning a large upper-middle-class London family whom he wrote about in <u>The White Monkey</u>. FTP identify this winner of the 1932 Nobel Prize in Literature.

Answer: John Galsworthy

3. This phenomenon was hinted at in 1900, when Moses Gomberg was forced to conclude that he had a single carbon atom with three rings attached, which he called triphenylmethyl. Since only three valences of the central carbon were used, the fourth was hanging loose a so-called "free radical." The solution to the problem was proposed by Linus Pauling, and states that electron waves were smeared out over a relatively extended region. FTP, name this theory by which chemical bonds are simultaneously double and single.

Answer: Resonance

4. Hector Berlioz composed his <u>Harold in Italy</u> for this man to play the viola solo, but he never did. His best known compositions include a violin concerto known as "The Bell" and 24 caprices for solo violin. FTP, name this man, who employed scordatura, double and triple stops, harmonics, and left-hand pizzicato to become the greatest violin virtuoso of the 19th century.

Answer: Niccolo Paganini

5. In directing 1952's "Moulin Rouge", he used a color scheme based on Toulouse-Latrec's paintings and showed his ability at literary adaptation, directing 1951's "The Red Badge of Courage" and 1956's "Moby Dick". For 10 points, identify this vaudeville actor, champion boxer, painter, and actor whose other successful films include "Prizzi's Honor", "The Dead", and "The Treasure of the Sierra Madre".

Answer: John Huston

6. It was born on April 30, 1948 in Bogota, but is now headquartered in Washington, D.C. Upholding the Rio Treaty of 1947, its first major action was to censure the Nicaraguan Anastasio Somoza for aiding an attempt to overthrow the Costa Rican government. The creation of the Alliance for Progress was its step to foster economic development. FTP, identify this successor body to the Pan-American Union.

Answer: Organization of American States (prompt on "OAS")

7. If the external magnetic field is small, the correction to the energy as a result of this effect is proportional to the Bohr magneton, the Lande g-factor, and the external field. If the external magnetic field is large, then the effect is known as the Paschen-Back effect, and the energy correction depends on the fine-structure contribution. FTP, what is this effect, named after its Dutch discoverer?

Answer: Zeeman effect

8. Adolph Weinman used this poet's wife Elsie as the model for the Mercury dime in 1916. His collections include <u>The Auroras of Autumn</u>, <u>Parts of a World</u>, <u>Owl's Clover</u>, and <u>The Man With the Blue Guitar</u>. FTP, who is this American poet of "Sunday Morning," "Hibiscus on the Sleeping Shores," and "The Emperor of Ice Cream"?

Answer: Wallace Stevens

9. The ideal "Enlightened Despot", he instituted limited religious toleration, a single land tax, and a system of welfare. Attempts to make German the official language provoked a Magyar rebellion, and his policy also failed during the War of the Bavarian Succession. His brother Leopold II later revoked many of his reforms. FTP, name this son of Maria Theresa, who ruled the Holy Roman Empire from 1765 to 1790.

Answer: Joseph II

10. In 1949, it became Canada's 10th province. Lying to the north of the French possessions of St. Pierre and Miquelon, its cities include Gander, St. Anthony, and Corner Brook, while some of its main geographical features include Churchill Falls, Goose Bay, and the Grand Banks fishing range. FTP, what is this province whose capital is St. John's and which includes Labrador?

Answer: Newfoundland

11. He married a Diaghilev ballerina, Lydia Lopokova. He explored the logical relationships between calling something "highly probable" and calling it "a justifiable induction" in his 1931 <u>Treatise of Probability</u>. A member of the Bloomsbury group, he was encouraged by South African premiere Jan Smuts to write <u>The Economic Consequences of the Peace</u>. FTP, who is this economist most famous for the <u>General Theory of Employment, Interest, and Money</u>.

Answer: John Maynard Keynes

12. This German studied medicine at Heidelberg before turning to chemistry, becoming a professor at Gottingen in 1836. He discovered calcium carbide, isolated beryllium and yttrium, and in 1828, synthesized urea from ammonium cyanate, becoming the first person to synthesize organic compounds from inorganic material. FTP, who was this founder of the science of organic chemistry?

Answer: Friedrich Wohler

13. Reacting against persecutions and false messiahs in Poland, this movement was founded by Baal-Shem-Tov. It spread quickly, but was pronounced heretical by Talmudists in 1781. Emphasizing a return to traditional values, it rejects academic formalism and argues that purity of heart is more pleasing to God than learning. FTP, identify this Jewish sect often found in isolated U.S. communities.

Answer: Hasidism

14. A whisk broom, symbolizing domestic care, hangs on a bedpost finial, which is a tiny statue of Saint Margaret, the patron saint of childbirth. Oranges lie on a chest to the left, and a chandelier with a single candle burning symbolizes the omnivoyant eye of God. Medallions surround a small mirror on the back wall, in which two persons can be seen in the doorway, in addition to the principal couple. FTP, this is a partial description of which 1434 double portait by Jan van Eyck?

Answer: Giovanni Arnolfini and His Bride or The Arnolfini Wedding (accept equivalents)

15. He lectured at universities in Oxford and Paris, using as his textbook Peter Lombard's <u>Sentences</u>. In 1303, he was exiled from Paris for refusing to support Philip IV of France against Pope Boniface VIII. A supportor of the doctrine of the Immaculate Conception, he is known as "Doctor Subtilis." His writings include <u>On the First Principle</u> and <u>Quodlibet Questions</u>. FTP, name this Schoolman whose followers were known as the Dunces.

Answer: John Duns Scotus

16. It was preceded by the election of Abraham Lincoln and by a declaration of President Buchanan to the effect that the federal government had no right to coerce a seceding state into submission. It restored the Missouri Compromise line of 36 degrees 30 minutes, and guaranteed that future constitutional amendments could not change the three-fifths clause of the Constitution. FTP, name this bill proposed by a Kentucky Whig, rejected in March of 1861.

Answer: The <u>Crittenden Compromise</u>

17. Balthazar murders Andrea and then seeks the hand of Bel-Imperia, Andrea's lover, in marriage. She slights him for Horatio, so Balthazar murders him with the help of Lorenzo. Hieronimo, the father of Horatio, contrives a play in which the guilty parties suffer very real deaths. FTP, identify this 1587 Thomas Kyd play which influenced Shakespeare's Hamlet.

Answer: The Spanish Tragedy

18. It happened in the month of Boedromion, and there was an eclipse of the moon eleven days before it. Plutarch says that the name of this battle means "the house of the camel." It is said that Parmenio looked out over the plain between the Niphates river and Gordyraean mountains and saw the whole plain agleam with the watch-fires of the Persians. FTP, name this battle of October 1, 331 B.C., in which Darius III lost to Alexander for the last time.

Answer: Gaugamela or Arbela

19. Ian Gibbons showed that a protein called dyenin (die-uh-nin) found in these subcellular organelles can extract energy from ATP. When all the dyenin is extracted, the microtubule doublets are left armless, but reappear when the dyenin is restored. FTP, what are these organelles that exhibit a 9 plus 2 microtubule arrangement and are shorter and more numerous than flagella?

Answer: cilia

20. The main character of this novel is an fat, unctuous swindler whose only talent is flattery. The novel follows him as he makes friends with the landowners Manilov, Sobakevich, Korobochka, and Plyushkin, who are unaware that he, Chichikov, has already been in trouble for shady deals. His plan is to pay these owners a small sum of money for their serfs, who have died since the last census. FTP, name this novel by Nikolay Gogol.

Answer: Dead Souls

21. He wrote, "Under every stone lurks a politician" in his play "Thesmophoriazusae" (Thez moe four ee ah ZOUS eye), which attacked Euripides, though his most quoted line is surely the onomatopoetic "brek-ke-ke-kex, ko-ak, ko-ak." His favorite victim was the demagogue Cleon, whom he attacked in The Knights. FTP, name this playwright, the author of The Clouds.

Answer: Aristophanes

22. Only firing in a flat, straight line, this weapon was often used in conjuction with grappling hooks on ships. Known to the Greeks as a "Mangonel", this weapon resembled a giant crossbow. It required a great deal of force to fire and the bow often snapped, causing the weapon to be fired on its own crew. FTP, identify this seige engine which lent its name to the study of projectiles.

Answer: ballista (do not accept "ballistic")

23. Born in Trinidad of Hindu parents, this novelist published <u>The Mystic Masseur</u> before making his name with <u>A House for Mr. Biswas</u>. <u>A Bend in the River</u> is a political satire set in Africa, and he won the Booker Prize for <u>In a Free State</u>, a collection of short stories. FTP, who is this man who explored his Indian heritage in works like <u>An Area of Darkness</u> and <u>The Middle Passage</u>?

Answer: Vidiadhar Surajprasad Naipaul
