1. A resident of Nashville's Hermitage Hotel for many years, he was said to bet on almost anything, especially eating contests. Occassionally called by the nicknames "triple smart" and "dean of the green," this moniker is probably his most famous and well known. For ten points, name this inspiration to Jackie Gleason's character in The Hustler, whose real name is Rudolf Wanderone, Jr.

A: MINNESOTA FATS (prompt on Wanderone)

2. Unlike the job he's best known for, he's not being replaced by Jim Florio, Tom Kean, or Christine Todd Whitman. He's being ousted by Continental Airlines, which paid millions of dollars to have its name grace the arena currently named for him. For 10 points, name this man, namesake of the home of the Nets and Devils, and former governor of New Jersey.

A: Brendan BYRNE

3. This Western Pennsylvania town, about fifty miles out of Pittsburgh, is home of greatness and mediocrity. Greatness comes from being the home of golf legend Arnold Palmer. Mediocrity comes from being the home of Rolling Rock beer. For 10 points, name the town.

A: LATROBE

4. This royal family first gained power in 1921, and in 1925, after deposing the last Qajar (KAHAR) ruler, the first ruler named himself Reza Shah. When he was forced to abdicate in 1941 the son took power and launched programs of modernization but was overthrown in 1979. FTP, name this family, of whom Mohammed Reza Shah was the last leader of Iran before the revolution.

A: PAHLAVI

5. This novel set in 1956 England actually spends most of its time in memories of the 1930s, during which time the main character's professional drive blinds him to his employer's pro-Nazi stance. It also keeps him from realizing that he missed his chance for happiness with housekeeper Miss Kenton. FTP, name this novel by Kazuo Ishiguro that became a film starring Emma Thompson and Anthony Hopkins.

A: The REMAINS OF THE DAY

6. One might normally think that having 30 inches of intestine removed following a major automobile accident would be detrimental to an athlete's career. Astonishingly, this was not the case for a young man from Kiln, Mississippi, who set several passing records at the University of Southern Mississippi and went on to lead the NFL in passing yardage in the 1995 season. For 10 points, name this Green Bay Packers Quarterback and NFL MVP.

A: Brett FAVRE

7. It became a British colony in 1874, after years of European exploration, originally due to its bounty of sandalwood. This nation, independent since 1970, has Viti Levu and Vanua Levu as its major islands. FTP, name this South Pacific nation whose capital is Suva.

A: FIJI

8. Central Park in New York City is opened. Kappa Alpha opens the first

college fraternity house at Williams College. Professional baseball's National League is established. Johannes Brahms composes his first symphony. The US awards a patent to Alexander Graham Bell for the telephone. Democrat Samuel Tilden outpolls Republican Rutherford Hayes. For 10 points name this year, in which the Centennial of the United States was celebrated.

A: 1876

9. Spiral galaxies, like the Milky Way, are made up of a number of "arms". For a quick 10 points, name the arm of the Milky Way which Earth calls home, a name shared by the constellation also known as the Hunter.

A: ORION Arm

10. The human body is made up of a large number of elements. In a 150 pound individual, nitrogen accounts for approximately 4.5 pounds, hydrogen for about 15, and Carbon for 27. For 10 points, what element accounts for about 97.5 pounds of an average 150 pound individual, mostly found in the company of the hydrogen?

A: OXYGEN

11. It was built in 1792 on the site of a building that had burnt down. It then burnt to the ground in 1836. Its archives were later moved from a municipal building, which shortly thereafter burnt down. Given all the rebuilding, its not surprising that its name is Italian for "phoenix." For 10 points name this Venitian landmark opera house which will need an estimated \$310 million to once again rise from the ashes.

12. First and last name is the same. One was a 17th century poet known for his satire of human folly and Puritanism. The other was a 19th century novelist, also known for satires such as _Erewhon_ and _The Way of All Flesh_. For 10 points, give the common first and last name.

- 13. He was made a Brigadier General in charge of the Four Horses Brigade in 1777. In 1778, even though he lost at Germantown, he was tapped to become head of the new US Cavalry. From there he won at Little Egg Harbor and Minisink before suffering a fatal wound at the Battle of Savannah in 1779. For 10 points, name this "Father of the US Cavalry," who hailed from Poland. A: Casimir PULASKI
- 14. "The truth remains this--that the strong will do as they will, and the weak will accept what they must." As harsh as this may sound, these sentiments were expressed by the Athenian general who told the residents of a small island to submit to authority or be conquered, slain, or sold into slavery. For 10 points, name this dialogue recorded by Thucydides.

- 16. It became the 26th province of Indonesia in 1963. Michael

Rockefeller disappeared here in 1961 while looking for native art. 85 percent of its land is covered in rain forest. For 10 points, name this largest province of Indonesia, roughly the size of California, the western half of the island of New Guinea.

A: IRIAN JAYA

17. Granted its charted by the Congress dyring Lincoln's presidency, it is required to advise the federal government on scientific and technical matters. Currently led by Bruce Alberts, it may be most famous to Washington visitors because of the Albert Einstein statue outside its headquarters. For 10 points, name this prestigious body.

A: NATIONAL ACADEMY OF SCIENCES (prompt on NAS)

- 18. This term describes a polyphonic, unaccompanied choral composition based on a Latin sacred text. It originated around 1200, and comes from the French for "words." For a quick ten, what's the word? A: MOTET
- 19. According to a recent article in the New York Times, this Greek mathematician and philosopher is actually two people with the same name: one a Neoplatonist mathematician, the other a pagan priestess who was slaughtered by a Christian mob in a political struggle in Alexandria. For 10 points, who is it?

A: HYPATIA

20. This preacher's "Old Time Gospel Hour" has most recently hawked tapes accusing the White House of a conspiracy involving the death of Vincent Foster. Not a very educated view, considering he is the founder and president of Liberty University. For 10 points, name this preacher and nut job who is best known as founder of the Moral Majority.

A: Jerry FALWELL

21. Jason, after obtaining the Golden Fleece, arrives in Colchis with this woman as his wife. When he plans to dump her and marry the king's daughter, his wife undertakes a bloody revenge. She kills both the king and his daughter, and slaughters her and Jason's children for good measure. For 10 points name this woman and the play about her by Euripides.

22. When he saw his kids playing with a high-bouncing rubber ball, he thought to apply its name to the championship game that, not surprisingly, his team played in the first two times it was held.
