answer: MOVE

2. On "Friends," aside from the apartments of Monica, Rachel, Chandler, and Joey, most of the action takes place here. For 10 points—name the coffee shop where Rachel works and the friends hang out.

answer: Central Perk

3. "The pawns are the soul of the game" was the quote he chose to illustrate his chess philosophy. His book "L'analyse du jeu des Echecs" was the first modern chess manual in that it attempted to instruct the reader in strategy rather than dazzle with flamboyance. For 10 points, name this chess author and musical impresario.

answer: Francois Andre Danican Philidor

4. Though retired, this tennis star returned for a 19th Wimbledon title in 1995, after she and Jonathan Stark won the mixed-doubles title. She had also intended to play women's doubles with Steffi Graf, but Graf pulled out. For 10 points—name this 38-year-old who has now won 56 Grand Slam titles.

answer: Martina Navratilova

5. It is a cyclical metabolic pathway occurring in the matrix of the mitochondria of plants and animals. It participates in aerobic cellular respiration and breaks down acetyl groups to CO₂. For 10 points—name this pathway also known as the citric acid cycle.

answer: Krebs cycle (citric acid cycle OK for early buzz)

6. Born Petrus Sabbatius he succeeded to the throne after his uncle and ruled from 527-565 AD, developing a system of justice which bears his name. For 10 points—name this Byzantine emperor.

answer: Justinian I

7. Born in 1870 in Kiev, this choreographer and accomplished dancer created, among other works, "Le Sacre de Printemps" and L'Apres-Midi d'un Faune" for the Ballets Russes under Diaghilev. For 10 points—name this man whose later death was largely due to a mental illness and hastened, according to some, by his wife Romola's exploitation of this illness.

answer: Vaslav Nijinsky

8. The main character, George, goes through somewhat of a mid-life crisis as he begins to question the dictated order of society in the Floral Heights housing community in the small town of Zenith. For 10 points—name this 20th Century novel by Sinclair Lewis

answer: Babbitt

9. This is an Italian island located in the Tyrrhenian Sea. Its highest point is Monte Capanne and its chief city is Portoferraio. For 10 points—name this island, most famous as the scene of a Napoleon exile.

answer: Elba

10. Full lifetime employment may be a thing of the past in this country, as up to 800,000 people—one-fifth of its total workforce—may be laid off in a restructuring scheme announced in May 1995 by Minister of Labor and Social Security, Salvador Valdés. For 10 points—name this country reeling from the loss of billions of dollars of aid from the former USSR.

answer: Cuba

11. After becoming a U.S. citizen in 1850, he amassed a large fortune in the next 13 years through usurious banking and Crimean War profiteering. After studying photos of possible candidate wives, he selected a 17-year-old to help him in his studies of the sites mentioned in Homer's writings. For 10 points—name this archeologist known for his excavations of Troy and Mycenae.

answer: Heinrich Schliemann

12. She was not 18 or 19, but was 10 to 12; she was not svelte, but robust; and was never romantically involved with John Smith, who was probably in his 30s when they met in 1607. For 10 points—name this Native American butchered by Disney.

answer: Pocohontas

13. In plants, this substance is considered to be one of five plant hormones and is used in fruit ripening. In other industries this gas can be used for welding or cutting of materials. For 10 points—name this substance with the chemical formula C_2H_4 .

answer: Ethylene or Ethene

14. Born in Andalusia in 1892, gypsy tales influence his poems and plays. He wrote "La Casa de Bernarda Alba" and "Blood Wedding." For 10 points—name this author murdered by the Nationalists in the Spanish Civil War.

answer: Federico Garcia-Lorca prompt on partial last name

15. Its author's belief—an expression of 18th century liberalism—that liberty "is inseparable from order" in his country or other parts of Europe was the driving force behind, For 10 points— which ^{Edward} Thomas Burke essay, which provoked Thomas Paine's reply in "The Rights of Man?"

answer: "Reflections On the Revolution in France"

16. In 1983 he resigned from Microsoft, citing poor health, but has since rejoined the Board of Directors. Earlier in 1975, with his high school friend Bill Gates, he founded the company. For 10 points—name this computer genius.

answer: Paul Allen

17. This amphibious bipedal species is appears in "Star Wars: Return of the Jedi" in the form of Admiral Ackbar. They physically resemble squid, and use the Italian word for this food in part of their name. For ten points name Admiral Ackbar's species.

answer: Mon Calamari prompt on partial answer

18. J. Cruquet was the jockey, but—for 10 points—which horse beat Run Dirty Run in the Kentucky Derby and Belmont Stakes and Iron Constitution in the Preakness to win the 1977 Triple Crown.

answer: Seattle Slew

19. In late December 1995, Jeff Getty AIDS patient received a bone marrow transplant from this animal with hopes that the animal's immunity to the HIV virus would create a new immune system for him. For 10 points—name this large, powerful, ground-living monkey of the genus *Papio* or *Chaeropithecus*.

answer: baboon prompt on scientific names on early buzz

20. This light phenomenon occurs when a light beam enters a new medium of higher or lower density than its original medium. The phenomenon is controlled and used to human advantage by lenses like the human retina or vision control devices. For 10 points—give the scientific name associated with this “bending” of light.

answer: refraction

21. \$300 million of them still exist in storage, though agreements with the Postal Service and transit groups should get them into circulation in the next few years. For 10 points—name this coin which was introduced in 1979.

answer: Susan B. Anthony dollar or coin (prompt on \$1 coin)

22. Born in 1866 near Guangzhou, in 1892 he received a medical degree in Hong Kong and practiced in that city. He later became the first president of the Chinese Republic, founded the Kuomintang, and passed leadership of his revolutionary government on to Chang Kai-Shek. For 10 points—name him.

answer: Sun Yat-Sen

This American Puritan writer came to the “new world” in 1668 but his poems about God and duty are still being found today, some stuffed in book bindings in the Harvard Library. For 10 points—name this author of “Huswifery” and “Upon What Base?”

answer: Edward Taylor

24. He spent his last years as head of the Bureau of Weights and Measures before his death in 1907, but he is best known for his early conception of the Periodic Table of Elements, in which he left spaces for not-yet-discovered elements like germanium. For 10 points—name this Russian chemist.

answer: Dimitri Mendeleev

25. The highest mountain in this system is Toubkal at almost 14,000 feet. Most of its inhabitants are Berbers and Arabs. The system ranges from Tunisia in the east to Morocco in the west. For 10 points—name these mountains, named for a Titan who also names a reference book.

answer: ATLAS

26. This Italian Baroque artist, architect, and sculptor was born in Naples in 1598, and is known by art historians for his startling realism and drama. Both these features are evident in one of his most famous sculptures, The Ecstasy of St. Theresa, found in the Santa Maria della Vittoria in Rome. For ten points name him.

answer: Giovanni Lorenzo Bernini

27. In 1979, he was sentenced to 15 years in a Chinese prison. In 1993, 6 months before his term was to expire, he was released, an apparent PR move to help Beijing's chances of landing the 2000 Summer Olympics. But Sidney got the games instead, so China sentenced—for 10 points—what man to 14 more years in prison?

answer: Wei Jingsheng

28. It teaches that human beings are immortal spirits called thetans and practices a ritual known as auditing, the purpose of which is to free the thetan from engrams, or past painful experiences. Counting among its followers Kirstie Alley and Tom Cruise. For 10 points—name this Los Angeles-based religious movement founded by L. Ron Hubbard.

Answer: Church of Scientology (prompt on "dianetics")

29. Nixon visits China, the last U.S. combat troops officially leave Vietnam, "The Godfather" wins Best Picture, George Wallace is shot, and the Watergate burglars are arrested, all—for 10 points—in what year?

answer: 1972

30. Nobody knows his name, but his number is JS/07/M/378. According to the poem about him, there was no official complaint about him; he was practically a saint. For 10 points—name him and you will have named the W.H. Auden poem.

answer: "The Unknown Citizen"

31. This variety of rock is generally grey, but can be found in blue, green, purplish, or red hues, which facilitates its use in paving and building, as do its flat, sheetlike characteristics. Formed under relatively low temperatures and pressures, it breaks in planes of cleavage perpendicular to its layers of formation. For 10 points—name shale's metamorphic cousin.

answer: slate

32. One of four great festivals of ancient Greece, they were held at Delphi every eighth year to celebrate Apollo's slaying of the python there. After 582 BC, these dramatic, poetic, musical, athletic and equestrian contests continued until 424 AD. For 10 points—name them.

answer: the Pythian games

30 POINT BONUS

1. A new type of cartridge was introduced in 1857, made of paper greased with animal fat, which had to be bitten before being loaded. Muslim soldiers, believing the fat to be from pigs, refused to use the cartridge. For 15 points each:

A. what rebellion ensued?

answer: Sepoy Rebellion

- B. What empire came to an end after its leader was exiled at the end of the Sepoy Rebellion?

answer: Moghul Empire

2. Name the fictional journalist 30-20-10:

A. Accounts of his birth vary, but he was first reliably noted in the 1930's on a farm in Kansas. His first name is his mother's maiden name.

B. According to a 1970's movie about his life, his father died of a heart attack when he was in high school, but according to a current TV show, he's still alive.

C. The newspaper he worked for is called the Daily Planet.

answer: Clark Kent

3. For 10 points each—answer the following questions about Mexican politics.

A. The party which has ruled Mexico for 67 years.

answer: PRI (accept Institutional Revolutionary Party)

B. Mexico's President of just over 1 year.

answer: Ernesto Zedillo Ponce de Leon

4. Name the objects found in outer space, 30-20-10.
- A. The surfaces of these objects are made of iron. Most of the inside is a superfluid with no viscosity, and it isn't known yet what their cores should be like.
 - B. When these objects have a magnetic field and are spinning, they are called pulsars.
 - C. Having a mass comparable to that of the sun, but usually only about 6 miles in radius, they are thought to form when the core of a star collapses during a supernova.

answer: NEUTRON STARS (prompt if "pulsar" is answered after the 30-point clue).
