TOSSUPS

1. Dennis Rawlins, a Baltimore historian, claims that this person is receiving a lot of undeserved credit. The diaries Rawlins has been researching show that this man stopped 150 miles short of his goal because of engine trouble. For ten points, name this arctic explorer who may have not flown over the North Pole in 1926.

ANSWER: LCDR Richard _BYRD_

2. France was falling, and the British were retreating. For ten points, name the town where 340,000 troops escaped France in 1940, leaving behind most of their supplies and marking the beginning of the fall of France.

ANSWER: _DUNKIRK_

3. Patty, Shermy and Violet were three of the first five characters introduced in this comic strip, but they have since been "retired". However, this strip is more famous for the third character (a boy) and the fourth character (a dog). For ten points, name this comic strips whose original name was "L'il Folks".

ANSWER: _PEANUTS_

4. Knoxville: Summer of 1915, Vanessa, and Overture to The School for Scandal are some of the lesser known works of this American composer. For ten points, identify this songster whose most famous work is his Adagio for Strings.

ANSWER: Samuel _BARBER_

5. The Prisoner's Dilemma is a typical problem from this mathematical discipline concerned with information and outcomes, specifically the most advantageous ones. For ten points, name this field, which John von Neumann, who established its legitimacy in the 1920's and 30's, is typically credited as founding.

ANSWER: _GAME_ theory

6. This is either of the two layers of electrically charged particles held in orbits above the atmosphere by the magnetic field of the earth. For ten points, name this region on the outer layers of the thermosphere named for an American physicist.

ANSWER: _VAN ALLEN BELTS_

7. Born in North Carolina around 1917, this musician was brought to New York where he excelled in math and physics at Stuyvesant High School. He was one of the relatively few jazz musicians to make it to the cover of Time Magazine and his compositions include Well, You Needn't and Ruby, My Dear. FTP, name this pianist, whose life was explored in the documentary Straight, No Chaser.

ANSWER: Thelonious Sphere MONK

8. The original version of this device, forty years ago, used a high-pitched sound to transmit information, now they use infrared sensors. For ten points, what is the handheld device of which the average household now has four, just in case one slips into the couch.

ANSWER: _REMOTE CONTROL_

9. These three books of the Old Testament can be read as a sentence, as Lyle Lovett slyly implied when he used them as the title of his fourth album. FTP, name the Lovett album and you'll name in order the three books which immediately follow the Pentateuch.

ANSWER: _JOSHUA JUDGES RUTH_

10. He is first referred to in a 7th century Welsh story. The "Historia Regum Britanniae" was his first appearance in an English source and it spells out many popular myths associated with him, including those of his famous father and counselor-mage. For ten points, name this "Once and Future King" of England.

ANSWER: King _ARTHUR_

11. Everyone knows that Santa's Little Helper is the Simpson's dog, but, for a quick ten points, name the Simpsons cat.

ANSWER: SNOWBALL

12. "I would have become a geologist if Oscar had been a geologist." But Oscar Hammerstein II wasn't a geologist, he was a librettist, and so too became his youthful neighbor. FTP, name this co-author of "Getting Away With Murder", better known for his work as lyricist and composer for the musicals Anyone Can Whistle, Company, and Into the Woods.

ANSWER: Stephen_SONDHEIM_

13. Born in 1743 in Paris, this scientist held many important posts with the French Government. Some of his most significant works dealt with combustion, debunking the phlogiston theory, and proving the law of conservation of mass. For ten points, name this "Father of Chemistry," who lost his head in 1794.

ANSWER: Antoine _LAVOISIER_

14. As a boy he lost an eye due to an accident with a hunting knife, but he later played one year with the Denver Nuggets. Elected to Congress in 1961, he was one of the first mainstream Democrats to oppose the Vietnam war. FTP, name this Arizona native who authored the book "Too Funny to Be President" after finishing second to Carter in the 1976 New Hampshire primary.

ANSWER: Mo_UDALL_

15. As the speed of a fluid increases, the pressure inside the fluid, or exerted by the fluid, decreases. The physical law which states this is also responsible for the explanation of lift, which allows airplanes to fly. FTP, name this law, stated by a member of a famed mathematical family.

ANSWER: _BERNOULLI'S_ Law

16. This orchestra was first led by Emil Oberhoffer from 1903 to 1922 and was later briefly led by Eugene Ormandy. Known for premiering new works, in more recent years it has been led by Dimitri Mitropoulos and Neville Marriner. FTP, name this symphony current conducted by Edo de Waart, which was formerly known as the Minneapolis Symphony Orchestra.

ANSWER: _MINNESOTA_ Orchestra

17. Born in Garrard County, Kentucky in 1846, later in life, she lived in Kansas. It was there that she became a "jail evangelist" for the WCTU and concluded that alcoholism and crime were connected. FTP, name this crusader, later rejected by the WCTU, who turned to vaudville to promote her cause, after her campaign of "hatchetation."

ANSWER: Carry Amelia _NATION_

18. This company recently broke a 48-year-old industry-wide advertising agreement. The advertisement in question aired on only one station, a Corpus Christi NBC affiliate. It shows two dogs, Obedience School graduates, one bearing a newspaper, the other a purple-velvet pouch with a bottle inside. FTP, identify this company, makers of Crown Royal whiskey.

ANSWER: SEAGRAM

19. Known formerly as Stalin Peak and Garmo Peak, this was (when the Soviet Union existed) the tallest mountain in the USSR. Now it is the tallest mountain in Tajikistan, at just under 25,000 feet. FTP, identify this mountain which takes its current name from the form of government in the former Soviet Union.

ANSWER: _COMMUNISM_ Peak

20. Guy Carleton was largely responsible for the terms of this Act, passed by the British Parliament in 1774. It recognized the Roman Catholic church, French civil law, and the seigneurial (sig-nyur-ee-uhl) land-tenure system in Canada. FTP, identify this Act, designed to preserve French Canadian loyalty and considered Intolerable by the neighboring American colonies.

ANSWER: _QUEBEC_ Act

21. He was ordained in 1954 and served as assistant pastor of a Chicago church while earning a Ph.D. in sociology from the University of Chicago. Later a University of Arizona professor, he has written non-fiction such as "The American Catholic: A Social Portrait" as well as fiction. FTP, identify this controversial author of "The Cardinal Sins" and "Thy Brother's Wife."

ANSWER: Andrew M. _GREELEY_

22. In antiquity parts of this nation were ruled by the Phoenicians, Carthaginians, Greeks, Romans, Vandals, and Byzantines. It remained part of the Ottoman empire from the 16th century until Italy colonized it in 1911. FTP, name this country, whose national flag has fewer colors than any other in the United Nations.

ANSWER: _LIBYA_ (one, solid field of green)

23. The Private Life of the Master Race, Mother Courage and Her Children, Trommeln in der Nacht, Mann ist Mann, and the Three Penny Opera are some of this German's dramatist's works. For ten points, name him.

ANSWER: Bertolt _BRECHT_

24. Born in Rosario, Argentina, he received a medical degree from the University of Buenos Aires in 1953. While there he became convinced that only violent revolution could cure social ills, so he joined Castro's revolt. After helping steer Cuba toward Communism, he went to Bolivia, where he was captured and killed in 1969. For ten points, name this famed revolutionary.

ANSWER : Ernesto "Che" _GUEVARA_

25. It is rumored that during the 1930s, students stole his head and played a game of Rugby Football with it. This may be part of the reason why today, when his mummified body is wheeled in for votes by the board of

King's College, the other governors look not at a wax replica of his skull. Still, he serves as an excellent example of maximizing utility. FTP, name this precursor of John Stuart Mill and author of "A Fragment on Government"

ANSWER: Jeremy _BENTHAM_

26. Norway, Sweden, Burma, Austria, Peru, and Egypt. These are the countries of the men who have held this post, showing the commitment of the organization to regional diversity in the people it honors. The office is awarded on the recommendation of the Security Council and by the General Assembly. For ten points, name this office.
