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- 1. A 15th century artist, a 20th century American author, and an ex-member of Led Zeppelin have something in common. Yes, Hieronymus Bosch, Katharine Anne Porter, and Robert Plant. FTP give the shared title of a painting, a story, and a song by the aforementioned trio.

 ANSWER: Ship of Fools
- 2. The major subfamily of this protein is made up of two heavy chains and four light chains. It was first discovered in skeletal muscle where its interaction with another protein is essential in muscle contraction and relaxation. FTP identify this protein that binds actin.

 ANSWER: Myosin

3. The official national apology referred to "great damage and suffering" caused by "aggression and colonial rule." FTP identify the nation whose Primer Minister Muriyama gave the aforementioned speech apologizing for past deeds.

ANSWER: Japan (ask for more if Muriyama is given early)

4. This turn of the 19th century French composer wrote 40 etudes for the violin but is probably best remembered for a sonata he didn't write but was rather named after him. FTP name this man who is associated with Beethoven's *Sonata No. 9* in A for Violin and Piano.

ANSWER: Rodolphe Kreutzer

- 5. He wrote the scientific work On the Theory of Colors in which he blasted Newtonian principles, proving that he should have stuck to literature. FTP name this German better known for The Sorrows of Young Werther and Faust. ANSWER: Johann Wolfgang von Goethe
- 6. He is a gunfighter, a ship's captain, a famous surgeon, and a World War II flying ace, all while working for the Pierce Publishing Company. His greatest adventure occurs when he gets involved in a plot to steal the Dutch Crown Jewels and unlike his previous accomplishments, this one is real. FTP name this title character played by Danny Kaye, based on a James Thurber short story. ANSWER: Walter Mitty
- 7. The title character is known as Old Ben to those who are pursuing him but the story isn't really about him. The story also features Sam Feathers, Boon Hogganbeck, Major de Spain, and a few assorted Compsons. FTP identify this William Faulkner novelette that is loosely centered around a hunting expedition.

ANSWER: The Bear

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- 8. Some of his theories derived from observations made visiting a pin factory, and his major work perhaps was the second most important piece of literature published in 1776. FTP identify this economist who propounded the "invisible hand" in his An Inquiry into the Nature and Causes of the Wealth of Nations. ANSWER: Adam Smith
- 9. He was brieflyemployed by Thomas Edison but he quit to devote himself exclusively to experimental research. He never won a Nobel Prize although his scientific achievents certainly warranted it. FTP identify this Croatian-born scientist who invented the first practical alternating current motor. ANSWER: Nikola Tesla
- 10. He quelled uprisings in Pannonia and Dalmatia and took vengeance upon the German who earlier defeated Varus at Teutoburger Wald, after he was adopted by Augustus as heir. FTP identify this man who ruled Rome from 14 to 37 A.D. and shares his name with the middle name of Captain James Kirk. ANSWER: Tiberius Claudius Nero
- 11. When the Nobel Prize committee informed him of his award he responded "I think you've got the wrong number." I guess he felt that the embryology of Drosophila melanogaster was not worthy of such distinction. FTP name this man, who nevertheless won the 1995 Nobel Prize in Physiology/Medicine. ANSWER: Paul Weischaus
- 12. He once said "The earth as the paradise of the gods, that is what I want to paint". His teacher, Charles Gleyre, also taught Claude Monet. FTP name this Impressionist painter of *Le Moulin de la Galette*, whose son was a famour director. ANSWER: Pierre Auguste Renoir
- 13. At Duke he was a first-string safety, punt and kickoff returner, and starting quarterback. He was drafted by Philadelphia fourth round in 1961, but was traded three years later to the team he wound end his career with. FTP identify this Hall of Fame Washington Redskin quarterback.

 ANSWER: Christian Adolph "Sonny" Jurgensen III
- 14. Hercules killed the Nemean Lion and the Lernean Hydra. Bellerophon the Chimera, and Oedipus the deathSphinx. These events probably pissed off the mother of all these creatures. FTP identify this beleagured widow of Typhon. ANSWER: Echidna (Note: Prompt for more, if Typhon is answered early)
- 15. According to Ghostbuster Ray Stantz the coming of Gozer is the biggest interdimensional event since this blast. FTP identify this 1908 event which rocked Siberia to the core.

ANSWER: Tunguska Event/Blast

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16. John Spenkelenk was reprieved for seven years but eventually electrocuted involuntarily. Gary Gilmore was executed voluntarily. Both events occurred as a result of state laws bypassing restrictions of this 1972 Supreme Court decision. FTP name this case which illegalized the death penalty.

ANSWER: Furman v Georgia

- 17. He founded the journal "Mir Iskusstva" which translates as "The World of Art". He also commissioned music for de Falla's *The Three-Cornered Hat*, Ravel's *Daphnis and Chloe*, and Stravinsky's *Firebird*. - 18. The margin was only 9000 out of a total of 1.6 million. The issue is divorce and it is a highly charged controversy in this primarily Catholic nation. FTP identify this country, headed by Prime Minister John Bruton.

 ANSWER: Ireland (Note: if "divorce" is given early, prompt for more info)
- 19. He was knighted in 1929 and made president of the Indian Academy of Sciences in 1934. Earlier, he taught physics at the University of Calcutta. FTP, name this scientist who discovered the effect describing the phenomenon of light passing through transparent substances, winner of the 1930 Nobel Prize. ANSWER: Sir Chandrasekhara Venkata Raman
- 20. Its sequels are *Peder Seier* (translated as *Peder Victorious*) and *Den Signede Dag* (*Their Father's God*). The work itself is actually a combination of the novels *I de Dage* (*In These Days*) and *Riket Grundlaegges* (*The Kingdom is Founded*). FTP name this compilation of Ole Rolvaag.

 ANSWER: Giants of the Earth or Giants in the Earth
- 21. His last name was Roussimoff and he was from Nice, France. He graced the silver screen as Fezzik in *The Princess Bride* but is best remembered as a dominating force in the World Wrestling Federation. FTP identify this 7 foot 5 inch 523 pound wrestler and actor.

ANSWER: Andre the Giant

22. Born with the surname Macie, this Royal Society fellow published 18 papers in Annals of Philosophy. He bequeathed his fortune to his nephew; if said nephew were to die without heir the money would go to the U.S. government to found an institution in his name. FTP name him. ANSWER: James Smithson

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- 23. At a hotel room in New York City, he fell and broke four ribs as well as bruising his shoulder. Not too bad when you consider what has happened to other televangelists in other hotel rooms. FTP identify this preacher who spent the holidays resting at his home in Montreat, North Carolina. ANSWER: Billy Graham
- 24. American occupation troops were withdrawn in 1921 following failure to raitfy the Treaty of Versaillies. France essentially regulated the region and, as one would expect, they began retreating in 1925 and were fully withdrawn by 1930. FTP identify this industrially important region that was annexed by Hitler in 1935.

ANSWER: Rhineland (Ask for more infor if Saar Basin is given)

- 25. He opposed the return to service of Commodore James Barron who challenged him to a duel and killed him. Prior to this he distinguished himself in the War of 1812 and against the Barbary Pirates in 1815. FTP identify this man who proclaimed "Our country! In her intercourse with foreign nations may she always be in the right; but our country, right or wrong!" ANSWER: Stephen Decatur
- 26. It was built as a tomb for Arjumand Banu whose nickname translates as "ornament of the palace." It overlooks the Yamuna river and was constructed between 1632 and 1648 by the fifth emperor of the Mogul dynasty, Shah Jahan. FTP identify this structure located in Agra, India. ANSWER: Taj Mahal
- 27. He was born around 460 B.C. in Abdera, Thrace. He studied under Leucippus, whose system he developed. Both Epicurus and Lucretius were his disciples. His theories were a departure from the earlier Ionic philosophers who held that matter is composed of particles that differ qualitatively.
