Unexpected moves from a man whose only known photograph is more than forty years old and who has been even more reclusive than J.D. Salinger since arriving on the literary scene in the 1960s with the novel "V." FTP, name this American author, whose other works include "Slow Learner," "Vineland," "The Crying of Lot 49," and "Gravity's Rainbow."

10. This disease, caused by the organism Treponema pallidum, passes through three distinct stages when left untreated. The tertiary stage follows the first two by many years and consists of inflammatory lesions of the aorta, heart, and the posterior columns of the spinal cord, a condition known as tabes dorsalis. The primary stage, which follows infection by about three weeks, consists of a single firm, non-tender, raised lesion known as a chancre (SHANK-er).
