1. A. HUNGARY

2. First published in September, 1843, it had the lofty goal "to take part in 'a severe contest between intelligence, which presses forward, and an unworthy, timid ignorance obstructing our progress.'" Its regular columns include Lexington and Bagehot, and it has sections entitled "American Survey," "Asia," "International," "Europe," and "Britain." FTP, name this weekly British news magazine.

A. The ECONOMIST

3. The sequestered receiver sits with translucent ping-pong ball halves taped over his eyes, listening to white noise. The sender sits in another room concentrating on a visual stimulus. Then the receiver attempts to describe the imagery and associations experienced during the session. FTP, name this parapsychological procedure, named from the German for "total field."

A. GANZFELD

4. Born in 1770 in Stuttgart, he was greatly influenced by the future philosopher Schelling and the future poet Holderlin. His most important works are *Philosophy of Right*, *Encyclopedia of the Philosophical Science*, and *The Phenomenology of Mind*. FTP, name this famous German idealist and arch-rationalist, famous for his dialectic.

A. Georg Wilhelm Friedrich HEGEL

5. Luciano Pavarotti described it as, "architecturally, the most beautiful theatre in Italy." *Rigoletto*, in 1851, and *La Traviata*, in 1853, are among the popular operas by Verdi whose opening nights were staged there. FTP, name this recently destroyed Venetian opera house, whose name ironically comes from the Italian for "the phoenix."

A. La [FENICE : fay-NEE-say]

6. A secondary component of this plant's distilled oils, allicin, has strong anti-bacterial properties. Perhaps this explains its popularity among pseudopharmacopia. FTP, name

this plant, *Allium sativum*, whose strong scented bulb appears in cooking, medicine, and East European folklore.

A. GARLIC

7. This American humorist and lecturer, whose real name was Charles Farrar Browne, had a marked influence on Mark Twain. Among his most popular sketches are "Babes in the Woods" and "Among the Mormons." FTP, name this contributor to both "Vanity Fair" and "Punch."

A. Artemus WARD

8. In cardiopulmonary resuscitation, you locate this small bone with the fingers and measure up to apply pressure over the heart. Taken from the Greek for "sword-shaped," this bone is the lowermost, [cartilaginous : KAHR-ti-LAJ-i-nus] segment of the sternum. FTP, name this bone.

17. Nicknamed "The Sage of Poetry," this friend of Li Po drew from civil war experiences and personal suffering in his writings. FTP, name this minor government official and T'ang lyric poet.

18. Masterpiece, Dealer's Choice, Sorry, Clue, and Monopoly are all games made, FTP by what company?
