1. Examples of this French term include "Aeolian harp," "Octave," "Winter Wind," "Butterfly," "Black Key," "Ocean," "Cello," and "Revolutionary." These are all nicknames for pieces from, FTP, what genre composed by Frederic Chopin, named for the French word for "study."

A. ETUDE

2. This philosopher defined philosophy as the love of wisdom, theory as contemplation, and cosmos as order. He said that there are three kinds of lives: the acquisitive, the competitive and the contemplative, the last class being the best. FTP, name the man that noticed that the interval in an octave is 2 to 1 and who made the puzzling claim that "things are numbers."

A. PYTHAGORAS

3. Write down a list of the first n positive integers. Cross off the number one. Cross off all multiples of two, then all multiples of three. Since four is already crossed off, skip it and then mark off all the multiples of five. Continue until you get to the end of your list. FTP, by what process have you determined the prime numbers on your list?

A. SIEVE OF ERATOSTHENES

4. It started on March 23, 1862, at the Battle of Kernstown. May 8 saw action at McDowell, by Front Royal, Winchester, Cross Keys, and ending on June 9 at the Battle of Port Republic. FTP, identify the location of this campaign, which marked the highlight of Stonewall Jackson's career.

A. SHENANDOAH VALLEY campaign

5. They lived on the farther bank of Ocean, their names were Enyo, Pephredo, and Deino, and they were the sisters of the Gorgons. Sharing only one eye and one tooth between them, Perseus robbed them of these, and forced them to show him the way to their sisters. FTP, identify this trio of sisters, named for the color of their hair.

A. GRAEAE or GRAIAE

6. Without it, you would probably say "I beat a bet" instead of "I bite a beet." It slowly took place in England between the twelfth and sixteenth centuries. Under it, long

vowels came to be pronounced in a higher position in the mouth, and those at the top became diphthongs. FTP, name this English phonological phenomenon.

A. The GREAT VOWEL SHIFT

7. This company took the publishing world by storm in 1995, dominating the paperback best-seller lists in Great Britain. The concept was simple: reproduce great short works of literature in pocket-size books and sell them near the cashier for a dollar. FTP, identify the publishing house which celebrated its 60th anniversary by issuing its 60's series.

A. PENGUIN Books

8. Her real name is Annie. She is the daughter of a rich businessman from Schenectady, New York, but Winterbourne meets her in Vevey, Switzerland. Mrs. Walker is concerned that she runs around with Giovanelli, and her fears are realized in the worst way when this title character dies of the Roman fever. FTP, idenify this Henry James character.

A. DAISY MILLER

9. He was an All-American on Penn State's undefeated 1968 and 1969 teams. Then he became an All-Pro pass rusher with Cincinnati, becoming the 1971 Rookie of the Year. He left football at the top of his game in 1974 and hit the road as a singer-songwriter, opening for B.B. King and Emmylou Harris. FTP, who is this multi-talented composer of "Different Fields," an opera about football?

A. Mike REID

10. It's been slowing down recently, with average intevals of 77 minutes, compared with 62 minutes in 1950. Debris dropped in its cone has partially stopped it up, and local seismic activity has changed the flow of water. FTP, name this most famous geyser in Yellowstone National Park.

A. OLD FAITHFUL

11. The state fossil is the Tully Monster, the state dance is the square dance, the state insect is the monarch butterfly, and the state prairie grass is the Big Bluestem. FTP, identify this home of Lorraine Hansberry, Ray Bradbury, and Vachel Lindsay, whose state slogan is "Land of Lincoln."

A. ILLINOIS

12. In a note to the 1891 first edition, the author quotes St. Jerome, saying "if an offense come out of the truth, better is it that the offense come than the truth be concealed." FTP, name this now-classic novel by Thomas Hardy subtitled "A Pure Woman," telling the story of two characters whose names appear in the title, as well as Angel Clare.

A. TESS OF THE D'URBERVILLES

13. Lasting from 850 to 1150 AD, this period of Japanese history saw the transfer of the court from Nara to Kyoto. The Fujiwaras dominated the court, and works like the Kokinshu, Tale of Genji, and Pillow Book of Sei Shonagon were produced. FTP, identify this period, which translates roughly as "peace and ease."

A. HEIAN period

14. Lesser known agents in this organization included Agent 54, who was painted blue to death in "Bronzefinger" and Agent 8-and-a-half, who hid inside the bowling ball return in "Diamonds are a Spy's Best Friend". FTP, identify this intelligence organization, which also employed crack agents 99 and Agent 86, Maxwell Smart.

A. CONTROL

15. Ratified on August 20, 1842, one of its secondary provisions called for the US and Great Britain to cooperate in surpressing the African slave trade. FTP, name this treaty which fixed the boundary of Maine, named for the Secretary of State and his friend who negotiated it.

A. WEBSTER-ASHBURTON Treaty

16. Norman Mailer's Armies of the Night takes its name from this poem, which contains other memorable phrases like "And we are here as on a darkling plain." It begins with the line "The sea is calm tonight." FTP, name this Matthew Arnold poem, which is named for a place with white cliffs.

A. "DOVER BEACH"

17. For a quick ten points, what is the sum of all the angles between 0 and 2π whose sines and cosines are equal?

A. 3π OVER 2 radians or 270 degrees

18. Among its provisions were a shortening of the polling period from two weeks to two days, an extension of the franchise to tenant farmers and merchants based upon the value of their land or rent, a redistribution of Parliament seats to the big cities, and the elimination of many "rotten boroughs." FTP, name this bill passed by Parliament in 1832.

A. REFORM (Bill or Act)

19. His equation allows for the calculation of the index of diffraction for an arbitrary propagation direction, allowing us to calculate values for retarder plates and calcite crystals, for example. FTP, name this influential figure in optics and electromagnetic theory, who

confirmed Young's results in 1814 and established the wave theory of light.

A. Augustin Jean FRESNEL

20. He has been cited as a scientific "prophet without honor in his own country" because his work was largely unrecognized in America. European scientists were well aware of his work, however, and Maxwell referred constantly to his "On the Equilibrium of Heterogeneous Substances." FTP, identify this Yale professor, father of chemical thermodynamics, for whom a free energy is named.

A. Josiah Willard GIBBS

21. It helps explain the rare combinations of alleles which may be found in unusually high proportions on distant oceanic islands. A few individuals are separated from their place of origin and begin a new population. The alleles carried by these members gain new prominence, because now form a significant fraction of the gene pool. FTP, name this prinicple.

A. FOUNDER (principle or effect)

22. Duke Vincentio leaves Vienna, entrusting it to Angelo. He sentences Claudio to death for sleeping with his fiancee, Juliet. Later, Angelo is tricked by Claudio's sister Isabella into sleeping with his fiancee Mariana. The duke, who has been around all along in disguise, returns to make everything all right, FTP, in what dark comedy by Shakespeare?

A. MEASURE FOR MEASURE

23. It was written in Beethoven's last period, starts with a dotted rhythm, has four movements, lasts around forty-five minutes, has a large fugue in one of the movements, and ends with so called octave trills. FTP, give the nickname of this Sonata, considered to be the most difficult of all the Beethoven sonatas.
