A. MACARTHUR

2. This hydrocarbon is the third member of the Paraffin series and is separated in large quantities from natural gas, light crude oil, and oil refinery gases. It is commercially available in liquefied form or liquid petroleum gas. FTP, name this compound with chemical formula C_3H_8 .

A. PROPANE

3. It means "big paper" in Italian. It was originally a drawing that was used as a guide for a painting, but it has acquired its own meaning. FTP give the name of this humorous artform, which also denotes a short animated feature.

A. CARTOON

4. Born around 1590, he was elected governor of Plymouth Colony in 1621 and served in that post, except for a five year interlude, until his death. FTP, name this man best known for writing "The History of Plymouth Plantation."

A. William BRADFORD

5. Developed by Nicklaus Wirth in 1972, this computer programming language was meant to facilitate teaching and learning object-oriented programming. FTP, name this language, still first in most university computer science curricula, which shares its name with the inventor of the adding machine.

A. PASCAL

6. Its tree is the tulip poplar, its flower is the goldenrod, and its bird is the cardinal. FTP, name this state, the 15th to be admitted into the Union.

A. KENTUCKY

7. This discovery garnered Karl Landsteiner the 1930 Nobel Prize in physiology. FTP give the common term for these four main categories of hereditary antigens.

15. His works include *Aurora Dawn*, *Marjorie Morningstar*, and *The City Boy*. FTP, give the name of this author whose most recent work is *The Hope* and whose most famous works are *The Caine Mutiny* and *The Winds of War*.

A. Herman WOUK

16. His Roman name is Catamus, from which the archaic term for a pedophile's lover, catamite, is derived. In a lesser-known myth, he was taken by Zeus to be his lover. FTP, give the better-known Greek name of this mythological figure, also the name of the largest moon in our solar system.

A. GANYMEDE

17. This American physicist studied at the Universities of Gottingen and Berlin and joined the faculty of the University of Chicago, where, in 1909, he performed an experiment to determine the value of electric charge. He also obtained a precise value of Planck's constant, and won the 1923 Nobel Prize in Physics for his study of the photoelectric effect. FTP name this Nobel Laureate.
