1. It is generally defined as a set with two operations, having the multiplicative structure of a monoid, but the additive structure of an Abelian group. If the multiplicative structure is actually also that of an Abelian group, it is called a field. Types include division and commutative. FTP, name this algebraic structure which shares its name with a small piece of jewelry.

Answer: Ring

2. Having its source in Lake Oswego, the painters of this river include Lloyd Mifflin, Thomas Doughty, and Jasper Cropsey. Its more scenic elements include the Starruca Viaduct but its less scenic elements include Three Mile Island. FTP, name this river that empties into the Chesapeake Bay.

Answer: Susquehanna River

3. Chronicling the lives of children born on August 15, 1947, this book describes children with various mystical powers including the protagonist, Saleem Sinai. It paints a rather bleak view of history, and of Indira Gandhi in particular. FTP, name this pessimistic novel by Salman Rushdie.

Answer: Midnight's Children

4. Born Maria Kalogeropoulos (ka-LOG-er-OP-uh-lis) in New York City, she moved to Athens at age 13. Her first major operatic appearance came five years later as Tosca. Encouraged by her mentor, Tullio Serafin at La Scala, she became famous for her bel canto roles. FTP, name this soprano, sometimes known as La Divi

Answer: Maria Callas

5. The second part of the 17th ecumenical council, it was the last church council to officially attempt to unify the Eastern and Western Churches. Originally called in Basel in 1431, it was moved in 1437 to Ferrara, Italy. In its final host city in Tuscany, it reached an agreement on unification which was ratified in 1439, but formally rejected in 1472. FTP, name this council which bears the names of its last two host cities.

Answer: Council of Ferrara-Florence

6. It is the common name for the cartilaginous fish of the superorder Batidoidimorpha (BAT-uh-DOYD-uh-morf). Characterized by their large pectoral fins, they are usually flat in appearance, ranging from a few centimeters to six meters in width. FTP, give this word which can be preceded by electric, sting, or manta.

Answer: Ray

7. Its first chairman was Martin Dies, Jr., who was succeeded by J. Parnell Thomas. Made a House committee in 1945, Richard Nixon gained prominence for his role in its investigation of Alger Hiss. Its name was changed in 1969 to the Committee on Internal Security before being abolished in 1975. FTP, name this congressional committee notorious for its communist witch hunts.

Answer: House Un-American Activities Committee

8. Most closely related to the Luchuan language, its relationship to other languages is unclear. Its original form had a very limited vocabulary, so it borrowed many words from other languages, including its word for bread from Portuguese. FTP, name this language whose written form includes 1850 Chinese kanji and two alphabets, the katakana and the hiragana.

Answer: Japanese

9. A mixed blood Laguna Indian, one of her collections of poems is called <u>Laguna Woman</u>. She also wrote the play <u>Lullaby</u> and the novel <u>Almanac of the Dead</u>. Her first, and probably best known, novel concerns the spiritual healing of Tayo through regaining some stolen cattle, and a liaison with the nature goddess, Ts'eh. FTP, name this the author of <u>Ceremony</u>.

Answer: Leslie Marmon Silko

10. He is also known as Hara and Mahadeva, the great god, and Nataraja is his most famous representation. Associated with a little drum, he represents change, flux, and destruction, though the latter generally represents the end of one cycle and the beginning of another. FTP, name this member of the Hindu triad, the husband of Kali and the god of destruction.

Answer: Shiva

11. One form of his law, J=FE (J equals sigma E) holds that current density is equal to the product of conductivity and electric field strength. The more familiar form states that the V-I plot is a straight line, an assumption which generally holds for metallic conductors at a constant temperature. FTP, name this German physicist who shares his name with the SI unit defined to be 1 volt divided by 1 amp.

Answer: Georg Simon Ohm

12. Educated at CCNY, he founded the periodical Camera Notes in 1905. With Edward Steichen, he founded and directed the Photo-Secession to help gain acceptance for photography as an art form. He was largely successful due to well-received exhibitions at their gallery at 291 Fifth Avenue. FTP, name him, the husband of Georgia O'Keeffe.

Answer: Alfred Stieglitz

13. This university won the Sears Trophy for the 1993-94 academic year for the most successful overall sports program. Its athletic stars included Sylvia Crawley and Mia Hamm, who led the women's basketball and soccer teams to national championships. Most, however, will remember such past names as Brad Daugherty, Sam Perkins, and Eric Montross. FTP, name this school, the home of Dean Smith.

Answer: UNC-Chapel Hill

14. The two original forms of this type of musical composition are "de camera" and "da chiesa." Its Italian proponents included Carissimi and Scarlatti, but it achieved its prominence in Germany. Defined to be a vocal work with instrumental accompaniment, it is often similar to a short oratorio, though generally less elaborate. FTP, name this form, often associated with J.S. Bach.

Answer: Cantata

15. The author asked for parts of this novel to be printed in eight different type colors to represent the different layers of the narrators' memories. Although the request was denied, this 1929 novel was still a radical experiment in form and technique. Three of the four sections are told in the first person, while the fourth is a third-person narrative focusing on the black cook Dilsey. FTP, name this Faulkner novel about the Compsons.

Answer: The Sound and the Fury

16. The author of <u>Human Immortality</u>, he advanced the idea of functionalism in psychology in his monumental <u>Principles of Psychology</u>. The brother of a novelist and the son of a Swedenborgian theologian, he was a lecturer at Harvard, Columbia, and Oxford. FTP, name this man, considered to be one of the founders of Pragmatism.

Answer: William James

17. Maybe this substance really isn't to blame. In a recent article in the Journal of the AMA, Dr. Mark Wolraich of Vanderbilt University contradicted studies from 1980 and 1986 on the cause of A.D.D. FTP, what carbohydrate long believed responsible for hyperactivity may actually be innocent?

Answer: Sugar

18. Telling the story of a German youth who fakes an epileptic seizure to avoid military service and take a job in a hotel, this Thomas Mann novel was written shortly before his death, leading to a suspiciously abrupt ending. At the hotel, the protagonist agrees to change places of a rich patron to take a trip around the world. FTP, name this novel about a man who specializes in pretending to be someone else.

Answer: The Confessions of Felix Krull: Confidence Man

19. Founded as the Collegiate School in Branford, CT, it was moved to its current location 17 years later. In 1861, it conferred the nation's first Ph.D., though it did not have its current name until 1887. FTP, name this university whose graduates include William Taft, Noah Webster, and Samuel F. B. Morse.

Answer: Yale University

20. With a sidereal period of 687 days and a gravity of roughly .38 times that on Earth, it is considered to be a possible location for human habitation with suitable terraforming. It currently has a thin carbon dioxide atmosphere, though it may have large water ice deposits beneath its surface. FTP, name this heavenly body whose geographic features include the Tharsis Bulge and Olympus Mons.

Answer: Mars
