1. He was born in 484 B.C in Halicarnassus and died in Thirii after being denied Athenian citizenship. His parents were Lyxes and Dryo, and his uncle Panyasis was executed as a conspirator during the Persian Wars. FTP, name this father of history, the author of <u>History of the Persian Wars</u>.

Answer: Herodotus

2. A dermatophyte infection, this medical condition can be treated with griseofulvin. A type of ringworm, it is caused by two species of the fungal genus Trichophyton. Known as tinea pedis to doctors, it normally begins between the 3rd and 4th toe, and can spread to cover the arch. FTP, name this disease which shares its name with a shoe chain.

Answer: Athlete's Foot

3. Romans viewed this city's plain between Pentland Hills and the Firth as strategic. It was granted a city charter in 1329 and its university has boasted such luminaries as James Thorman and Thomas Boswell. The entire city has been the subject of a 20th century revival, led in the twenties and thirties by nationalist poet Hugh MacDermid. FTP, name this town, the capital of Scotland.

Answer: Edinburgh

4. "Westward the course of empire takes its way." This man's utterance led to the naming of a town in California after him. However, his true fame derives from philosophical works such as Discourse Addressed to an Infidel Mathematician, in which he ridiculed Newton's fluxions, and The Dialogues of Hylas and Philonous, where he argued that matter exists only by being perceived. FTP, name this 18th-century British philosopher.

Answer: George Berkeley (BARK-lee)

5. This river starts in Piscataquis County in Maine and flows 140 miles until it enters the St. John's River in New Brunswick, Canada. The surrounding valley is rich in potatoes, and a dispute over this valley erupted in the 19th century between Britain and the United States. FTP, name this river which lent its name to the "war" ended by the Webster-Ashburton Treaty.

Answer: Aroostook River

6. The Schoolmistress, the Young Man Called John, the Landlady, the Poor Relation, and the Divinity Student are just some of the characters in this work. It first appeared in book form in 1858, and it consisted of imaginary conversations around a boarding-house table. FTP, name this novel by Oliver Wendell Holmes.

Answer: The Autocrat of the Breakfast Table

7. This group's greatest growth occurred in Murat's Kingdom of Naples, where it later played a key role in the 1820 revolt. In that same year it played a key role in the Spanish revolution of 1820 and the next year in the Piedmontese movement. The origin of its name has been ascribed to charcoal burners of Champagne, followers of St. Theobald. FTP, name this secret society, which provided the first patriotic inspirations for many Italian nationalists.

Answer: Carbonari

8. Take two resistors, one with a resistance of 2 ohms, the other with 3 ohms. FTP, what is their equivalent resistance when they are connected in parallel?

Answer: 1.2 or 6/5 ohms

9. It was established with funds given by Paul Mellon, who named it after a favorite vacation spot of Carl Jung. Originally given by the Library of Congress, it fell under the auspices of Yale University Library in 1950. The first one went to Ezra Pound for "The Pisan Cantos." FTP, name this award for achievement in American poetry.

Answer: Bollingen prize

10. Recent NCAA stars include Cary Kolat, T.J. Jaworsky, and Terry Brands. In the NCAA, recent top 20 polls have included Lock Haven, Clarion, and Oklahoma State, though the national championships have recently been dominated by Iowa. Other well known competitors in this sport have included Salman Khasimakov, Pat Smith, Dan Mayo, and Bruce Baumgartner. FTP, name this sport, recently associated with Team Foxcatcher.

Answer: Wrestling

11. The west pediment of this structure presents groups of two or three struggling figures, sometimes half-animal. The east pediment is static and strictly symmetrical, dominated by the god to whom it is dedicated. FTP, name this Phidias work, a Greek temple which housed one of the Seven Wonders of the Ancient World.

Answer: Temple of Zeus at Olympia

12. Reportedly, he decided to run for the position he currently holds during a dart game at a Chicago pub. He kept his conservative views quiet, and won based on the shortcomings of his opponent. In the House, he made headlines as the only Republican to vote against Newt Gingrich's budget. FTP, name this "accidental congressman," conqueror of Dan Rostenkowski.

Answer: Michael P. Flanagan

13. The original method of obtaining this element was reducing the chlorate with sodium. However, this process was expensive, so a French and American engineer independently announced a cheaper electrochemical process in 1886. In this the ore is mixed with cryolite at 980 degree Celsius and electrolyzed. FTP, name this element produced by the Hall-Heroult process with atomic number 13.

Answer: Aluminum

14. The son of Ares and Althaea, it was said that if a certain log on a fire burned, then this man would die. However, when he killed his two uncles in a rage, his mother burned the log and killed him. FTP, name this man who fell in love with Atalanta, best know for slaying the Caledonian Boar.

Answer: Meleager

15. This Roman province was founded in 146 B.C. Roughly the area around modern Tunisia, it was comprised of territory previously subject to Carthage, and grew prosperous under four centuries of Roman rule and colonization, producing an emperor and several prominent church fathers. FTP, name this province, whose name today corresponds to the entire continent on which it was located.

Answer: Africa

16. Settling in London in 1938, he destroyed his first two novels before publishing <u>Happy Valley</u> in 1939. After serving in the RAF during WWII, he published <u>The Living and the Dead</u> and <u>The Tree of Man</u>. His best known novel, <u>Voss</u>, concerns the attempt of a German man to cross Australia overland. FTP, name this winner of the 1973 Nobel Prize for literature.

Answer: Patrick White

17. He rose up from lowly origins in the service of Urzababa, the king of Kish. He conquered Uruk by defeating and capturing Lugalzaggisi. He built Akkad as the new seat of his dynasty, and his sons later consolidated the empire which he had begun. FTP, name this Akkadian, who was the first to organize Sumer and Akkad under a central government.

Answer: Sargon the Great

18. Of order Ciconiiformis and family Ciconiidae, there are 17 species of this type of bird. They live in open, often wet country worldwide, but usually not in North America. They are bulkier that other birds of their order, such as heron. FTP, name this bird, which has the longest nesting period of its order, but is often depicted bringing other types of babies.

Answer: Storks

19. Their system was extended when Francis Asbury came to America as a Wesleyan missionary. They flourished during the first half of the 19th century, and Peter Cartwright was one of their best known members. FTP, name these preachers, usually Methodists, who needed only a horse and a saddlebag to spread the gospel.

Answer: circuit riders

20. Born in Munich in 1895, he started the Gunther School for gymnastics, dance, and music in 1924. After studying under German composer Heinrich Kaminski, he created his best known work, a 1937 oratorio. He did other music, including a trilogy of "music dramas," Antigone, Oedipus der Tyrann, and Prometheus. FTP, name this German composer, whose Triofo de Afrodite is the last of a trilogy which starts with Carmina Burana.

Answer: Carl Orff
