Tossups for 1996 Wahoo War of the Minds Round 15

1. Two gunmen enter a small-town lunchroom, where they announce their plans to murder an ex-prizefighter living in town. Nick Adams, a customer in the lunchroom, goes to warn Ole Andreson. However, Andreson stoically decides to meet his death. FTP, name this short story by Ernest Hemingway.

Answer: The Killers

2. The son of a music-hall entertainer turned designer of garden gnomes, this Brit quit school at sixteen to work as a laborer. Becoming a banker, he rose to a senior position at Standard Chartered Bank. Elected to Parliament in 1979, he became Chancellor of the Exchequer in 1989. FTP, name this successor of Margaret Thatcher.

Answer: John Major

3. These appear in the tunicates only in the larval form, but they appear in the adult form of the lancelet. In vertebrate animals, it is replaced during embryological development with the vertebral column. It is a stiff but flexible rod that provides an attachment site for muscles. FTP, name this biological construct that is found in some form of any animal in the phylum containing the human species.

Answer: Notochord

4. His artistic theory is contained in On My Way, a collection of essays and poems. Born in Alsace, he studied in Paris, exhibiting in the second Blaue Reiter exhibition. FTP, name this artist, who collaborated with his wife Sophie, a Surrealist who co-founded Dada and became known for collages of colored paper.

Answer: Jean (Hans) Arp

5. Although he seemed to be the model of the successful executive, it was discovered that he was bankrupt after he disappeared at sea in 1913. Born in Paris, his 1889 paper "The theory and construction of an economical heat engine" proposed an efficient system in which ignition would result spontaneously on compression of a fresh air mix. FTP, name this inventor, who with Krupp's backing developed the engine bearing his name.

Answer: Rudolph Diesel

6. A promising mathematician, he published a treatise on integral calculus before entering the army. An aide-de-camp to the marquis de Montcalm during the Seven Years' War, he founded a colony in the Falkland Islands at his own expense in 1764. FTP, name this French explorer, who sailed around the world on the frigate La Boudeuse, the namesake of the largest of the Solomon Islands.

Answer: Louis de Bougainville

7. In 83 B.C. he was appointed propraetor of Hither Spain, but two years later Sulla drove him out of Spain. In 80, he lead a revolt of the Lusitanians, and a year later he took over Hither Spain as well as part of Gaul. In 77, the Roman senate conferred a special command upon Pompey, who eventually defeated this man's army. FTP, name this traitor, assassinated by Perperna.

Answer: Quintus Sertorius

8. His law states that "Whenever A annoys or injures B on the pretense of saving or improving X, A is a scoundrel." Born in 1880 this man, in addition to being a moral theologian, was a reporter, columnist, magazine editor and a literary critic. His study of American English was published in three volumes as The American Language. FTP, name this man whose other works include Newspaper Days, In Defense of Women, and Prejudices.

Answer: H.L. Mencken

9. This letter represents the upper asymptote of a population growth curve, a value known as the maximum carrying capacity. In crowded conditions, where this value is approached, natural selection favors individuals who invest their resources in the survival of the individual and their offspring. FTP, what kind of "strategist" are these species?

Answer: k

10. March 21, 1844. This was the guaranteed date that Christ would come. When he didn't come, the date was changed to October 22, 1844. When Christ did not come this day, it was called "The Great Disappointment," and members of this sect met to figure out why. They reasoned that their book of life would have to be revised, and that Christians were celebrating the sabbath on the wrong day -- Saturday was the proper day to rest. FTP, name this religion which grew out of the teachings of William Miller in 1844.

Answer: Seventh-Day Adventists

11. During his reign, he worked to expand the commerce of France and to heal the nation's wounds. A Protestant leader, he converted back to Catholicism to gain the throne, and his assassination in 1610 plunged France back into chaos. FTP, name this French king who issued the Edict of Nantes.

Answer: Henry IV

12. Born Eleanora Fagan in 1915, her 1935 recordings with pianist Teddy Wilson brought her fame, and she went on to tour with Count Basie's Orchestra and the white Artie Shaw Band. Arrested for heroin possession in 1947, she continued to make records which reflect physical deterioration, but deep emotion, until her death in 1959. FTP, name this legend, whose autobiography is Lady Sings the Blues.

Answer: Billie Holiday

13. Subtitled *The Mistakes of the Night*, it features Miss Constance Neville, George Hastings and Charles Marlow. The young hero, only comfortable with serving girls, is tricked into believing that the Hardcastle home is a village inn. Posing as a barmaid, Kate is able to win his heart. FTP, name this play by Oliver Goldsmith.

Answer: She Stoops to Conquer

14. Few were surprised that this school's women's team made the Sweet 16, coached by Marsha Sharpe and led by Miche Atkins. However, following the graduation of Mark Davis, the men's team did not have lofty expectations, yet Coach James Dickey's team has made the Sweet 16 as well, led by backboard-shattering Darvin Ham and Jason Sasser. FTP, name this school, whose best-known athlete is Sheryl Swoopes.

Answer: Texas Tech

15. According to the spin-statistics theorem, they must have half-integer spin. Their wave functions are antisymmetric, with respect to exchange, leading to the Pauli Exclusion Principle. FTP, name this class of particles which includes electrons, protons, and neutrons, named for an Italian physicist.

Answer: Fermions

16. After <u>Sea Pictures</u> was featured at the Royal Philharmonic, his reputation as a composer grew rapidly with the two symphonies, a cello concerto, and <u>Falstaff</u>. Born in 1857, <u>Dream of Gerontius</u> made him popular two years after his most famous work premiered. FTP, name this British composer, best known for <u>Enigma Variations</u>, whose <u>Pompand Circumstance</u> is a staple of graduations.

Answer: Edward Elgar

17. In this battle, the French lost only 8000 men to the enemy's 27,000. An attempt to turn the French flank failed, leading to the defeat of the allies' left and center; subsequently, their right was surrounded and driven in disorder across a frozen lake, where many perished. FTP, name this battle, in which the Austrian and Russian troops under Kutuzov were soundly defeated by Napoleon on December 2, 1805.

Answer: Austerlitz (prompt on "Three Emperors")

18. Political pundits have decided that this tenet applies to media coverage, as scandal coverage will overshadow the real issues. The original meaning applied to another social science when it was formulated by an English merchant during the 16th century. FTP, name this law which verbosely says that when debased money is in concurrent circulation with high-valued money, the good money will disappear.

Answer: Gresham's law

19. Imprisoned for his agitation against landlords, this member of Parliament was released after issuing a no-rent manifesto. He then formed an alliance with Gladstone, who introduced his 1886 Home Rule Bill. Ruined by his affair with the married Catherine O'Shea, he died in 1891. FTP, name this leader of the Irish Parliamentary Party, known as the uncrowned king of Ireland.

Answer: Charles Stuart Parnell

20. First published in French in 1984, this novel follows the relationships of two couples. Tomas, a respected surgeon, tries to settle down with the bartender Terza, while Sabrina has an affair with Franz, a married professor. FTP, name this novel of life in Prague, written by Milan Kundera.

Answer: The Unbearable Lightness of Being
