TOSSUPS

After accusations of heresy and embezzlement it was dissolved by Philip IV of France and hundreds of members were burnt at the stake. For ten points, name them.

5. From a Latin word that meant first "pregnant animal" and later "womb," this word denotes the place where something is generated, contained, and/or developed. For ten points, name this word used of, among other things, the rock that a fossil or gemstone is found embedded in; the band of formative cells in your nails and teeth; an industrial mold; and, in mathematics, a rectangular array of elements.
