1. He did not speak too highly of his brother Perses, especially after this brother influenced their local magistrate to decide on his behalf in an inheritance dispute. FTP, name this 8th century BC Boeotian farmer and author of the didactic poem "Works and Days".

ANSWER: _HESIOD_
2. There have been three films made with this title, all derived ultimately from the 1932 movie "What Price Hollywood?" The 1937 version starred Fredric March and Janet Gaynor, the 1976 version starred Kris Kristofferson and Barbra Streisand, while the most famous version, that of 1954, starred James Mason and Judy Garland. FTP, give the common title for these stories about entertainment careers headed in different directions.

ANSWER: _A STAR IS BORN_
3. This state capital is located on the West Fork of the White River. In addition to being the largest city in its state, it is the seat of Marion County. FTP, identify this city which numbers among its famous natives Jane Pauley, Steve McQueen, Kurt Vonnegut, Jr., David Letterman, and Booth Tarkington.

4. The year he set the single season scoring record with 176 points, he did it with 15 touchdowns, 15 field goals, and 15 extra point conversions. 5. It is caused by a deficiency of Vitamin B12, either in the diet or through failure of the parietal cells of the stomach to secrete intrinsic factor, which is necessary for the absorption of B12. 6. 7. Wade Morrison created it in Waco, Texas in 1885, and named it for a man who had run Morrison out of town back in Virginia for romancing his daughter. It was formerly advertised with the slogan, "Drink a bite to eat at 10, 2, and 4 o'clock." FTP, name this still popular soft drink.

8. He was never a soldier, but he did have experience of three wars in other capacities. As a Red Cross worker he was in fact the first American wounded in Italy in World War I. FTP, identify this civilian correspondent during World War II and the Spanish Civil War, the author of "Men Without Women" and "A Moveable Feast".

ANSWER: Ernest _HEMINGWAY_
9. He served as sailing master of the "Resolution" on James Cook's last expedition. In 1808 he was imprisoned by army mutineers in the so-called Rum Rebellion, but by 1814 he had been promoted to vice admiral. FTP, name this naval officer best remembered for an earlier ill-fated command aboard the H.M.S. Bounty.

ANSWER: William _BLIGH_
10. They are a religious community concentrated in the Maharashtra and Gujarat states of India, but are descended from 7th and 8th century refugees from Iran. They use the ancient Pahlavi scriptures and remain faithful to much of the traditional Zoroastrian dogma. FTP, identify this religious group of India whose very name means "Persian."

ANSWER: _PARSI_s (or _PARSEE_s_)
11. His Nobel Prize was for the study of sub-atomic particles, but this University of California professor became noted for other scientific speculations as well before his death in 1988. He received publicity for devising a method to x-ray the Great Pyramid to look for undiscovered chambers, but is perhaps best known now for his idea that a comet or meteor collision may have caused the massextinction 65 million years ago. FTP, name this Nobel physics laureate of 1968.

12. This word can mean a share or interest, a bet, or a prize. In the Mormon Church it refers to a district made up of a number of wards. It can refer to something used to mark a boundary, support a plant, or secure a tent. FTP, what is this word also associated with execution by burning?

13. He influenced much of Europe through his editions of classical authors and his own writings in Latin. Those writings included "Adagia", translated into English as "Adages" or "Proverbs", "Institutio principis christiani", translated as "The Education of a Christian Prince", and "Enchiridion militis christiani," or "Manual of the Christian Knight." FTP, name this author of "Moriae encomium", translated into English as "The Praise of Folly".

16. A lawsuit for adultery brought against him by Theodore Tilton was the scandal of 1875 -- a long trial ended inconclusively enough for his friends to declare him vindicated. Long the pastor at Plymouth Presbyterian Church in Brooklyn, he was noted for his eloquence and his liberalism. FTP, identify this man whose other well-known family members included sisters Catherine and Harriet, and father Lyman.

17. Two days before the assassination of Robert Kennedy in California, this man was shot in New York. The attempted assassin, Valerie Solanas, had already received some notoriety as the founder of SCUM -the Society for Cutting Up Men -- but the shooting gave her more than another 15 minutes of fame. FTP, name the victim, shot in his art studio known as "The Factory."

18. Large populations, random mating, no migration, and no mutation. These are the conditions assumed by this principle and formula for determining the stability of a gene pool. This is startling given the drug's notoriously tragic history. FTP, name this drug sold in Europe and elsewhere in the late 1950s as a treatment for nausea during pregnancy, and which was then blamed for an estimated seven to twelve thousand birth defects worldwide.
