1. Snowfalls occur only every four years in the mountains of Mexico, but this winter's cold snap may have caused the deaths of 20 million members of this well-loved species. For 10 points -- name these brightly-colored, migratory butterflies.

Ans: Monarch Butterflies or Danaus Plexippus

2. According to columnist Molly Ivins, the title of this British film had its trailing "III" cut off because of fears that American audiences would think they'd missed parts I and II. For 10 points -- name this film whose plot chronicled the descent into insanity of a British king.

Ans: The Madness of King George (III)

3. Many historians call this river a "glorified ditch", and it is not nearly as impressive as the stigma it carries. It is located in northern Italy, and at the time of the Roman empire, no military unit was allowed to cross over it without permission from the Roman Government. For 10 points -- name this river, which Julius Caesar crossed anyway.

Ans: Rubicon

4. His good friend Bassanio is in love, and to help him court his love he borrows money from a Jewish moneylender. Bassanio's love is Portia, the moneylender is Shylock, and he is -- for 10 points -- what Shakespearean title character?

Ans: The Merchant of Venice or Antonio

5. Like most kids, he got an allowance for chores, but you would figure he would have gotten a lot more than a quarter. His ad blitz in New Hampshire has lead him to a distant second in the latest primary polls, and his estimated worth is 439 million. For 10 points -- name this GOP presidential hopeful whose net worth was determined in the Feb. 5 edition of a magazine that bears his name.

Ans: Steve Forbes

6. He refused to teach composition because he feared it would adversely affect his own composing. Some of these works include 1904's "Kossuth Symphony" and 1916's "The Wooden Prince". World War II caused him to move to the U.S. from Hungary, and he died in this country in 1945. For 10 points -- name this composer of "Bluebeard's Castle".

Ans: Bela Bartok

7. A meander is separated from the main stream of a river. Erosion of the banks, and deposition of solid material, makes the loop wider and eventually cuts off a curved portion of the river, forming a distinctive type of short-lived lake. For 10 points -- with or without incident, name this type of curved lake.

Ans: Oxbow

8. This team has the NBA's best winning percentage over the last seven years and its biggest star recently said he "was getting weak in his late career" in response to a question about him missing games due to a toe injury. For 10 points -- name this basketball team whose coach, Paul Westphal, was fired in January to make way for the man he replaced, Cotton Fitzsimmons.

Ans: Phoenix Suns

9. Less forgiving than Woodrow Wilson, this man wanted a peace treaty that would punish Germany and would compensate France for its losses. He presided at the peace conference after World War I, which produced the Treaty of Versailles. For 10 points -- name this Frenchman, the premier of France at the end of World War I and afterward.

Ans: Georges Clemenceau

10. His favorite T-shirt bore a quotation by Thomas Jefferson, "The tree of liberty must be refreshed from time to time with the blood of patriots and tyrants." His mother abandoned the family when he was a child, and his high school classmates voted this quite boy "most talkative". For 10 points -- name this Army veteran now accused of bombing the Federal Building in Oklahoma City.

Ans: Timothy J. McVeigh

11. An ex-football player, he is ordained as a minister, but is soon fired for his perpetual drunkenness. He then takes up with a band of fraudulent evangelists, including Sharon Falconer, whom he seduces. For 10 points -- name this man, and you name the title of a satire of the clergy by Sinclair Lewis.

Ans: Elmer Gantry

12. This company has found itself in a little bit of trouble lately. While its arcade division cannot go wrong, its home division has been floundering, and its CD add-on was a failure, as was the 32X. For 10 points -- name this company that hopes Virtua Cop, World Series Baseball, and Virtua Fighter 2 will help its Saturn system.

Ans: Sega

13. Although this family is not known for producing astronomers, three moon craters are named for family members. One of them, Sklodowska (sklo-DOV-ska), bears the maiden name of the family matriarch. For 10 points -- name this prominent family of science.

Ans: Curie

14. It was built by Phillip II of Spain at the foot of the Sierra de Guadarrama. Originally a monastery, this granite structure's design is classical and was probably finished about 1584. For 10 points -- name this building 30 miles northwest of Madrid that is now an art museum.

Ans: El Escorial

15. He was honored with the title of "Tusitala", or "Teller of

Tales", by the Samoan people with whom he spent the last years of his life. For 10 points -- name this Scotsman and author of such works as An Island Voyage, The Silverado Squatters, and The Master of Ballantrae.

Ans: Robert Louis Stevenson

16. In the late 1950s, he once said to a group of Western diplomats, "I never had any proper schooling. When you were in the nursery, I was herding cows for two kopeks. And yet here we are, and I can run rings around you all." For 10 points -- name this Soviet premier legendary for his ability to keep a good beat with his footwear.

Ans: Nikita Khrushchev

17. Accused of being a top Mexican drug trafficker and one of the FBI's most wanted, this man was recently arrested in Mexico and will be deported to Houston. For 10 points -- name this man, the first international drug trafficker listed on the FBI's ten most wanted list and target of an extensive manhunt after the FBI offered a \$2-million bounty for his arrest.

18. 315 miles long, it begins by flowing out of Lake Tear-of-the-Clouds in the Adirondacks. It meanders southwest into Saratoga County where it turns east. From there, the river passes by the Catskills and the Palisades, and ends in New York Bay. For 10 points -- name this river named for an English explorer.

Ans: Hudson River

19. In a somewhat ironic twist of fate, he had to return to England in 1743 due to the debt he accumulated loaning money to colonists. For 10 points -- name this Englishman who had originally helped England rid its prisons of debtors by establishing the colony of Georgia.

Ans: James Oglethorpe

20. He was forced to declare bankruptcy at one point due to the investment failure of a typesetting machine, but got back on his feet with a world lecture tour. For 10 points -- name this whitesuited American whose voyage on the Quaker City was immortalized in his work The Innocents Abroad.

Ans: Mark Twain or Samuel Langhorne Clemens

21. This man has a pediatric wing named in his honor at the Martin Luther King Jr. hospital in Los Angeles. This oscar-winning actor played a doctor on the TV series St. Elsewhere and he is very involved in LA area children's groups. For 10 points -- name this actor, who went toe-to-toe with Gene Hackman in the submarine thriller <u>Crimson Tide</u>.

Ans: Denzel Washington

22. He is now playing for the Florida Beachdogs of the CBA, but he also played ten seasons in the NBA with the likes of Miami, Philadelphia, Golden State, and Washington. Although he likes to

shoot a surprisingly accurate 3-point shot, he made his mark by ranking seventh all time in blocked shots. For 10 points -- name this 7-foot 7-inch rail thin center from the Sudan.

23. In 1970, while serving a 10-year sentence for possession of two marijuana joints, this man was sprung from a California prison by his third wife with the help of the Weather Underground. He is now giving interviews describing his adventurous approach to his own terminal illness. For 10 points -- name this 75-year-old psychedelic explorer.
