TOSSUP 1 They were first observed and mentioned by the British physicist William H. Wollaston in 1802, but not named for him. 25,000 of them appear in the sun's spectrum. A star contains a given element if these appear in the star's spectrum in the same positions as in that element's emission spectrum. FTP, name these lines.

Answer: _FRAUNHOFER_ Lines

TOSSUP 2 So popular were his engravings that he was forced to defend himself by promoting an act that gave artists copyright over their works and outlawed piracy. His series include _Marriage a la Mode_, and _The Industrious and Idle Apprentice_, but he is best known for the 1735 series, _The Rake's Progress_. FTP, name this painter of _O the Roast Beef of Old England_.

ANSWER: William _HOGARTH_

TOSSUP 3 William Carlos Williams once wrote "So much depends/upon/a red wheel/barrow." An actor, however, recently recast this poem into a haiku, beginning "So much depends upon a red Speedo". Name this actor FTP, who stars opposite Gillian Anderson on "The X-Files".

ANSWER: David _DUCHOVNY_ [prompt on red "Speedo" on early buzz]

TOSSUP 4 Although this two-word phrase sounds like something that might be found during a blue light special, it refers to the rate of interest that member banks are charged when they borrow money through the Federal Reserve System. FTP, identify this economics term.

Answer: _DISCOUNT RATE_

TOSSUP 5 Between 6 and 14 feet in height, 73 miles long, and 8 feet across. To the north was a 9-foot-deep, 27-foot-wide ditch, to the south a protected road 20 feet wide. FTP, name this structure, completed in 122 AD, designed to protect Roman Britain from attack by the Picts.

ANSWER: _HADRIAN'S WALL_

TOSSUP 6 Even as the fall of communism created a rise in circulation, the Paris-based daily newspaper "Our Word" ceased publication in 1996. Thus marked the passing of the last daily newspaper printed in this language. For 10 points, what language did this paper, better known as "Unzer Wort," {OON-zayre VAHRT} use in publication?

Answer: _YIDDISH_

TOSSUP 7 "Pow-tee-weet!" So ends this novel, based on the experiences of a 'pillar of salt' during the fire-bombing of Dresden. It is told through the eyes of Billy Pilgrim, a man "come unstuck in time". FTP, identify this Kurt Vonnegut Jr. novel which visits the planet Tralfamadore.

ANSWER: _SLAUGHTERHOUSE FIVE_

TOSSUP 8 An unexpected power surge, from 200 megawatts to 24 gigawatts, took place in under 4 seconds, leading to a temperature increase of 200 degrees C. The resulting pressure increase destroyed the cooling system, leading to the release of large quantities of iodine-131 and other radioactive isotopes. We didn't learn the full extent of the accident until several days after the April 26, 1986 disaster at, FTP what Soviet power plant?

ANSWER: _CHERNOBYL_ [chuhr-NO-bill or chair-no-BEEL]

TOSSUP 9 When this man's slave ran away in 1792 and was caught, he set his slave free and then hired him. Virginia-born and known for his Constitutional work rather than for disdain for slavery, he was Secretary of State when the Louisiana Purchase was made. FTP, what President led the United States into the War of 1812?

ANSWER: James _MADISON_

TOSSUP 10 Army and Notre Dame in 1946. Notre Dame and Michigan State in 1965. Brigham Young and San Diego State in 1991. Florida State and Florida in 1994. Overtime, introduced by the NCAA last season, would have prevented, FTP, what football outcome?

Answer: _TIE_ games (accept any reasonable equivalent)

TOSSUP 11 His "Vespers" or "All-Night Vigil" contains settings of the "Nunc dimittis", "Gloria", and other Latin hymns. One melody from his "Piano Concerto No. 2" was plagiarized for the song "Full Moon and Empty Arms". Name this Russian who died in Hollywood in 1943 FTP, the composer of "Paganini Rhapsody".

ANSWER: Sergei Vasilyevich _RACHMANINOFF_

TOSSUP 12 He broke off the engagement to his fiancee in 1841, fearing she might lack common philosophic interests. Opting instead for a life of seclusion and writing, he published many of his books under pseudonyms. Identify, FTP, this unwitting founder of Christian existentialism, the author of "The Sickness unto Death," "Fear and Trembling," and "Either/Or."

ANSWER: Soren Aabye KIERKEGAARD

TOSSUP 13 Born in 1799, this poet died in a duel in 1837. He is known for such poems as "The Poet" and "Ya Vas Loo-beel" (phonetic) or "I loved you." Name, FTP, this Russian author of several novels later made into operas, including "The Queen of Spades", "Eugene Onegin", and, "Boris Godunov".

ANSWER: Alexander Sergeevich _PUSHKIN_

TOSSUP 14 While two House Democrats voted against the reprimand for House Speaker Newt Gingrich because they felt the fine wasn't large enough, it was still the largest fine ever imposed by the House on a current member. For 10 points, how much was Newt asked to pay for his ethical hanky-panky?

Answer: _\$300,000_ (NOTE: This is NOT a "hose" -- if there were any chance for the question to ask about the two House Democrats, it would have begun "Warning: Two answers required.)

TOSSUP 15 This nation's only university, the National Autonomous University, will celebrate its sesquicentennial this year. Its main cities are Choluteca, La Ceiba, San Pedro Sula, and Tegucigalpa, its capital. FTP, name this Central American country.

ANSWER: _HONDURAS_

TOSSUP 16 He succeeded his father, Louis VIII, in 1226, but as he was only of age 11, his mother, Blanche of Castille, acted as regent. In 1248 he led a crusade, but was taken prisoner in Egypt by the Moslems. FTP, who was this only sainted King of France?

ANSWER: _LOUIS IX_

TOSSUP 17 "The skill . . . with which the old man and lads support the serpents and keep them up to their work have been justly regarded as one of the noblest . . . illustrations of the mastery of human intelligence over brute inertia." This is a description of, FTP, what famous work depicting the death of a priest who warned the Trojans not to accept the infamous horse?

ANSWER: _LAOCOON_ [lah-OH-koe-uhn] [NOTE: The quote is from Ambrose Bierce's "The Devil's Dictionary".]

TOSSUP 18 Playwright Edward Albee, ballerina Maria Tallchief, actor Jack Lemmon, country singer Johnny Cash, and jazz musician Benny Carter are the most recent recipients of, for 10 points, what award named for a former President?

Answer: The _KENNEDY CENTER_ Honors [prompt on "Kennedy"]

TOSSUP 19 This German author died in 1837 at age 23. His three plays, "Danton's Death", "Wozzeck" [WOTZ-eck], and "Leonce and Lena" were not performed until 1895. Name this playwright, who shares his name, FTP, with a funnel you probably used in a chemistry lab.

ANSWER: Georg _BUECHNER_ [BYOO-kner]

TOSSUP 20 Due to a delayed release of their new album, this group's most recent tour began in New Haven, CT in November. They got their start in the San Francisco Bay area and enjoyed phenomenal success with their 1994 debut album. FTP, identify this group that hopes that "Recovering the Satellites" will prove as rewarding as "August and Everything After".

ANSWER: _COUNTING CROWS_

TOSSUP 21 They were blamed for most of the Cultural Revolution's excesses, and were accused in 1976 of fomenting a coup against the Chinese government after the deaths of Mao Zedong and Zhou Enlai. Consisting of Jiang Qing, Wang Hongwen, Yao Wenyuan, Zhang Chunqiao, FTP, what is the more common name of this infamous group?

ANSWER: The _GANG OF FOUR_

TOSSUP 22 This psychological disorder, which has no known medical cause, is characterized by disordered thought and communication, and bizarre behavior. It exists in disorganized, catatonic, paranoid, and undifferentiated types. Contrary to popular belief, FTP, what disorder is NOT the equivalent of a "split personality"?

ANSWER: _SCHIZOPHRENIA_

TOSSUP 23 Also known as "temperate shrubland", these are relatively dry areas found near water, such as along parts of California or the Mediterranean Ocean. FTP, what biome gets little or no rain during the summer and is subject to frequent burning?

Answer: _CHAPARRAL_

TOSSUP 23 "Whereas, the Federal Bilingual Education Act... mandates that local educational agencies 'build their capacities to establish, implement and sustain programs of instruction for children and youth of limited English proficiency." So stated the Board of Education of what city when it recognized "Ebonics" as a language?

Answer: _OAKLAND_, California [Also Accept: _EBONICS_ up to "Board of Education"]

TOSSUP 24 Despite his involvement in the construction of the Golden Calf, he was appointed high priest and made head of the Levites. Prior to the exodus from Egypt, he was a spokesman to the Pharaoh. He died before his people reached Canaan. FTP, who is best known for being Moses's brother?

ANSWER: _AARON_

TOSSUP 25 The nuclear membrane has disappeared. Microtubules move each duplicated chromosome to the midline; spindles from the two poles interact. This is a description of FTP what stage of mitosis which follows prophase?

ANSWER: _METAPHASE_ [prompt on "mitosis" if given before the word "stage"]

TOSSUP 26 Jump to the left, then step to the right. Put your hands on your hips, then do a pelvic thrust. If you do, then you're doing part of what dance, FTP, which was featured in _The Rocky Horror Picture Show_?

ANSWER: the TIME WARP

TOSSUP 27 Speaking to a Women's Club gathering in Wheeling, West Virginia, on February 7, 1950, he charged that the State Department employed at least 205 known Communists. FTP, what Wisconsin Senator went on to dominate hearings held by the House Un-American Activities Committee?

Answer: _J_oseph _MCCARTHY_ (Do NOT accept "Eugene McCarthy")

TOSSUP 28 TWO ANSWERS REQUIRED. They both played first base for the Toronto Blue Jays in the late 1980s, but one was traded to San Diego, the other shipped to Japan. They reunited in the 1996 World Series. FTP, what sluggers are nicknamed "Crime Dog" and "Big Daddy"?

Answers: Fred _MCGRIFF_ and Cecil _FIELDER_

TOSSUP 29 Robert Greene described him, in "A Groatsworth of Wit Bought With A Million of Repentance", as "an upstart crow, beautified by feathers, that supposes he is as well able to bombast out of a blank verse as the best of you." FTP, what playwright was so condemned in 1592?

Answer: William _SHAKESPEARE_

TOSSUP 30 Delaware, north. Florida, west. Idaho, north. Maryland, west. Minnesota, east. Nebraska, west. Oklahoma, west. This describes the directions of protrusion of, FTP, what political-geographic features?

Answers: _PANHANDLE_s
