1. She debuted in the 1970s as a one-year old adopted war orphan whose first words were "Big Mac," and who thought the raisins in her oatmeal were shrapnel. She reappeared occasionally as she grew up, eventually becoming a megababe computer programmer. FTP, identify this comic strip character who recently married Mike Doonesbury, and who shares her name with a 1901 novel set in India. ANSWER: KIM Rosenthal

2. The agent of this disease endemic in the tropics is an arbovirus of group B which multiplies in many animals, mosquitoes, and chick embryos. Symptoms include fever, headache, jaundice, and in its final stages internal hemorrhage and the characteristic "coffee ground" vomitus containing blood. FTP, identify this mosquito-borne disease that army physician William C. Gorgas succeeded in controlling as a prerequisite to constructing the Panama Canal.

ANSWER: YELLOW FEVER

3. Angry over this man's opposition to an international convention banning chemical weapons, British journalist John Carlin wrote recently that one day historians may draw fruitful comparisons between Caligula's naming his horse a consul of of Rome and the United States' allowing this man to become chairman of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee. FTP, identify the target of Carlin's ire, a right-wing North Carolinian.

ANSWER: Jesse HELMS

4. Hector Berlioz, John Stuart Mill, and Lord Peter Wimsey all have at least one thing in common -- that being that they all married women with the same first name. FTP, what is this name, also belonging to the wives of Professor Calvin Ellis Stowe and Ozzie Nelson?

ANSWER: HARRIET

- 5. Mt. Kazbek is the tallest peak in the republic of this name, and its second-largest city is Kutaisi. It was the last republic to join the Commonwealth of Independant States, joining in 1993. Brasstown Bald, not far from the Tennessee border, is the highest point in the state of this name, while its second-largest city is Columbus. FTP, what is this name, the only one shared by an independent nation and a U.S. state? ANSWER: GEORGIA
- 6. Dorothy Parker is said to have quipped that there were two things she could never understand exactly how they functioned: zippers, and -- this man, a successful financier and advisor to many U.S. presidents. FTP, identify this chairman of the War Industries Board during World War I, and U.S. Representative to the UN Atomic Energy Commission after World War II.

ANSWER: Bernard Mannes BARUCH

7. In 1983 it was designated the fourth major women's golf championship, thus

becoming the newest Grand Slam event, alongside the U.S. Women's Open, LPGA Championship, and the duMaurier Classic. Played at the Mission Hills Country Club in Rancho Mirage, California, it is sponsored by Nabisco. FTP, identify this golf tournament named for an entertainer once involved with Burt Reynolds. ANSWER: Nabisco DINAH SHORE Tournament

- 8. It is a dance in moderate triple time characterized chiefly by an accompaniment pattern consisting of a low bass note on the first beat and two chords in the middle register on the second and third beats. It developed, about 1800, from an Austrian peasant dance, the Laendler. Weber's "Invitation to the Dance" is an early example of this form in art music. FTP, name this romantic dance reaching heights of popularity in Vienna through the compositions of the two Johann Strausses.

 ANSWER: WALTZ
- 9. The study of these objects began in the 1960s after Anthony Hewish and his Cambridge students, attempting to record the scintillation effect on radio sources of electron clouds in the solar wind, observed a signal from an unexpected source. Eventually it became clear that what had been discovered was a rapidly spinning neutron star. FTP, what name do astronomers give to these types of neutron stars that produce not steady radiation but brief, sharp bursts of radio emission? ANSWER: **PULSARS**
- 1 0. There are reportedly some 30,000 of them in Germany, and they have been banned from civil service jobs in Bavaria. The U.S. State Department has denounced Germany for conducting a "campaign of harassment and intimidation" against them, and in January of this year an "Open Letter to Helmut Kohl," signed by 34 prominent Hollywood figures, likened the German government's attitude toward this group to Nazi persecution of the Jews. FTP, what is this group of people whose members include John Travolta and Tom Cruise?

 ANSWER: SCIENTOLOGISTS (accept: SCIENTOLOGY: prompt on "L. Bon

11. Her 1991 novel *The Infinite Plan* differs from most of her work because it is set in the United States. Her writing generally combines the magical realist tradition with portrayals of South American politics. FTP, name this Chilean author of *The Stories of Eva Luna*, and *The House of the Spirits*, who fled to Venezuela in 1973 following the assassination of her uncle.

ANSWER: Isabel ALLENDE

1 2. Following glowing reports by navigators Philip Amadas and Arthur Barlowe, a colonizing expedition under Sir Richard Grenville and Sir Ralph Lane was sent to this island, but returned the following year. Another group was then dispatched under the leadership of John White. Forced to return to England for supplies, White came back to the island only to find that his colony had vanished. FTP, give the North Carolina island location of this lost colony sponsored by Sir Walter Raleigh.

ANSWER: ROANOKE Island

13. Published posthumously in 1677, it consists of five parts: Concerning God; On the Nature and Origin of the Mind; Concerning the Origin and Nature of the Emotions; Of Human Bondage, or the Strength of the Emotions; and Of the Power of the Intellect, or of Human Freedom. Presented as a deductive system in the manner of Euclid, it opens with definitions and axioms followed by a series of theorems building upon what came before. FTP, what is the one-word title of this most famous work of Baruch Spinoza?

ANSWER: ETHICS

- 1 4. It is an enzyme occuring in both plants and animals, and types may be classed as either saccharifying or dextrinizing. In humans the highest concentrations are found in pancreatic juices or in saliva, where it is also known as ptyalin. FTP, identify this enzyme, whose function is to hydrolize starches, glycogen, and dextrin.

 ANSWER: AMYLASE, or DIASTASE [prompt if "ptyalin" is answered]
- 15. The Yankees' Whitey Ford is the all-time leader in games pitched in the World Series, with 22 appearances over 11 different series. This man is second in the list with 16 pitching appearances in only 3 series, and a World Series record six saves. For 10 points, name this former Oakland A, who later won the 1981 American League Most Valuable Player award while pitching for the Milwaukee Brewers and probably most famous for his handlebar mustache.

ANSWER: Rollie FINGERS

1 6. A departure from the author's more introspective works, this fanciful novel sold spectacularly, and ended her financial worries. Essentially a portrait of Vita Sackville-West, and of several generations of the Sackville family, it also parodies the changing styles of English literature and explores issues of androgyny. FTP, identify this Virginia Woolf work in which the main character lives through centuries of English history, sometimes as a man, sometimes as a woman.

ANSWER: ORLANDO

17. Harry Nilsson, Laura Nyro, Randy Newman, Elton John, and Hoyt Axton were all vaulted from relative obscurity to acclaim after this group recorded hit renditions of their songs. Their lead singers were Danny Hutton, Chuck Negron, and Cory Wells. Their name came from Australian outback slang for a very icy evening. FTP, name this rock group who had Billboard #1 singles three times in the early 1970s, with "Mama Told Me (Not to Come)", "Black & White", and "Joy to the World."

ANSWER: THREE DOG NIGHT

18. In 1879 he published *Defence of Philosophic Doubt*, a plea for intellectual liberty in the face of what he saw as the increasing dogmatism of science. In 1915 he delivered the Gifford lectures on the topic "Theism and Humanism." In between, he spent four years as Prime Minister of Great Britain. FTP, identify this man who, as Lloyd George's foreign secretary in 1917 promised British support for a Jewish homeland in Palestine.

ANSWER: Arthur James BALFOUR

1 9. It was a sit-com running from 1968 to 1971 on NBC, and is remembered more for its casting than for its content. Lloyd Nolan appeared regularly as Dr. Morton Chegley, but it was the starring role of singer Diahann Carroll that made the series noteworthy. FTP, give the one-word title of this first show to star an African-American female in a prestige role in her own series--a name shared by a very different 1977 movie starring Jane Fonda and Vanessa Redgrave.

ANSWER: "JULIA"

20. "He isn't evil," wrote journalist Zeev Chafets earlier this year, "he's simply a guy with Cadillac ambitions and a Volkswagen character." This came after it was revealed that police were investigating a possible deal he may have struck with Aryeh Deri, head of the ultra-orthodox Shas party, to appoint Roni Bar-On attorney general in exchange for support on Hebron troop deployment--after which Bar-On would offer Deri a favorable plea bargain on corruption charges. FTP, name this prime minister shaken by recent scandal charges.

ANSWER: Benjamin NETANYAHU (accept "Bibi")

21. He spent twenty years as an economic adviser to the British National Coal Board before writing the 1973 book which made him famous and whose title became a catch-phrase to the conservation movement. His thesis was that societies should cease to seek economic growth through industries which are socially and environmentally destructive, and that bigger is not necessarily better. FTP, identify this German-born economist, the author of *Small is Beautiful*.

ANSWER: Ernst F. SCHUMACHER

- 22. In his own lifetime he was accused of imitating nature at the expense of ideal beauty, and criticized for his use of lower class models in his religious scenes. Yet his strong chiaroscuro technique of partially illuminating figures against a dark background was immediately adopted by his contemporaries, and his artistic influence was enormous. FTP, identify this Italian, forced to flee Rome in 1606 after killing a man in a duel, the painter of "Supper at Emmaus" and "The Calling of St. Matthew." ANSWER: Michelangelo Merisi da CARAVAGGIO
- 23. San Antonio is a city in Texas. Santiago and Concepcion are cities in Chile. Trinidad is an island in the West Indies. And Victoria is many things: a lake, an Australian state, and several cities. But these were also the names of five ships that sailed west from the Spanish port of Sanlucar de Barrameda on September 20, 1519, under the command of this man. FTP, name this Portuguese navigator who claimed the Philippines for Spain.

ANSWER: Ferdinand MAGELLAN (or Fernao de Magahaes, or Fernando de Magallanes)

24. 2900 Lebanon Road, Nashville, Tennesse, 37214 is the address of this

organization of travelling business and professional men, as given in the front of a book I found in my motel room the morning this question was written. FTP, identify this group begun in the fall of 1898 when the Lord impressed the idea upon two strangers who met in a Wisconsin hotel.

ANSWER: The GIDEONS International (accept: GIDEON Bible)

25. The son of Eos and Astraeus or Cephalus, in Greek mythology he was the personification of the morning star, and his name meant "light-bringer." The name was later applied to an element discovered about 1674 by Hennig Brand of Hamburg, an alchemist who prepared it from urine. FTP, identify this extremely toxic substance which ignites spontaneously when exposed to air, and which may take either a white or more stable red form.

ANSWER: PHOSPHORUS

- 26. In 1843 he won the Newdigate prize with a poem on Cromwell, and in 1857 was appointed professor of poetry at Oxford. His father Thomas is associated with the term "muscular Christianity," and was the prominent headmaster of Rugby school. FTP, who was this Victorian author of poems such as "Thyrsis" and "The Scholar Gypsy"? ANSWER: Matthew ARNOLD
- 27. She was born Laura Mountney in Wales in 1925, but became internationally known under her married name. Her business started by providing wallpapers with 19th century patterns and motifs, but after becoming a mother she began experimenting with designing clothes. FTP, identify this woman who died in 1985 but whose chain of boutiques continues to champion a romantic style and the use of cotton and other natural fabrics.

ANSWER: Laura ASHLEY

28. Bull Ring, in this city's center, is the site of its oldest market. Other points of interest are the University of Aston and the cathedral of St. Chad, the first Roman Catholic cathedral built in England after the Reformation. Famous residents have included Cardinal Newman, Joseph Priestley--whose home here was burned by a mob in 1791--and Joseph Chamberlain, who served as mayor in the 1870s. FTP, name this West Midlands city, Britain's second-largest.

ANSWER: BIRMINGHAM

29. This five-letter name belonged to the fifth Safavid shah of Persia, known as "the Great," as well as to the head of the Algerian government in exile before independence from France, and to a maternal uncle of Mohammed from which a dynasty of caliphs traced descent. FTP, give this name which might also be the plural form of the name of a major Swedish rock group of the 1970s.

ANSWER: ABBAS

30. He becomes mayor of several Italian cities, vice-shah of Oran, and caliph of Baghdad--all while remaining a U.S. Army lieutenant and mess officer. An unscrupulous black marketeer, he even rents planes to the German airforce which are

then used to bomb his own base. FTP, name this corrupt character from Joseph Heller's "Catch-22."

ANSWER: MIIO MINDERBINDER [prompt on "Milo"]
