1. A man and his wife want to buy Christmas presents for each other, but neither has enough money. So, each sells off the one possession they most prize, to buy a present that would go perfectly with the possession the other had just sold. FTP, this is the plot of what famous story by O. Henry, which takes its name from the Epiphany?

ANSWER: The _GIFT OF THE MAGI_ (prompt on O. Henry)

2. This actor had an uncredited appearance in "Spy Hard". A graduate of the University of Ottawa, he also had an uncredited appearance as a Man in Black on The X-Files. FTP, name this man, far better known as the host of Classic Concentration and Jeopardy!

ANSWER: Alex _TREBEK_

3. It took four months to negotiate this treaty, named for a town in what is now Poland. In this treaty, Russia acknowledged the independence--or more accurately, loss--of Finland, Poland, the Ukraine, and the Baltic Republics. FTP, name this 1918 treaty which marked Russia's exit from World War I.

ANSWER: Treaty of _BREST-LITOVSK_

4. He received a Ph.D. in engineering for a thesis on the meshing of gears--only the second science Ph.D. granted in the US. From 1866 to 1869 he studied math and physics in Paris and Berlin, and once stated "Mathematics is a language". FTP, name this Yale professor whose name is associated with free energy.

5. In Jainism, it is the term for moral virtue. In Buddhism, it is the universal doctrine proclaimed by Buddha. In Hinduism, this term refers to the religious and moral law governing individuals which is one of the four ends of life. FTP, give this common term, which shares its name with Jenny Elfman's character on a new TV series on ABC.

6. When the United States was formed, most states ceded all unsettled chartered lands to the federal government. However, until 1800, Connecticut claimed this region, over which it nearly went to war with Pennsylvania. FTP, name this region of Ohio, whose name was given to a Cleveland university.

7. It can describe a second-order differential equation that is equal to zero; it also describes first-order differential equations that can be expressed in terms of y over x. This term is more commonly used in chemistry to denote matter that is of constant composition. FTP, name this term, which also describes processed milk.
