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TOSSUPS—University of Texas at Austin A/Wichita State II

1. Organisms of this phylum have amoebocytes, free living cells which move through the mesohyl (read: "mezoheel") collecting and digesting food and distributing nutrients. The amoebocytes also assemble skeletal fibers, which in some species are called spicules. Choanocytes, or collar cells, set up a current which pushes water out of the osculum and draws it in through the porocytes. FTP, identify this phylum, the only animal phylum in the parazoa branch of the kingdom, whose members are, contrary to what the ancient Greeks thought, not plants but animals.

ANS: Porifera or sponges

2. He was an outstanding dramatist, and his style influenced the realistic, or verismo, school of opera in the later 19th century. His own operas include 1863 work Les pêcheurs de perles (The Pearl Fishers), the 1867 work La jolie fille de Perth (Fair Maid of Perth), and the 1872 work Djamileh. FTP, identify this French composer whose other compositions include his 1855 Symphony number 1 in C, and his most famous opera, Carmen.

Answer: Georges Bizet

3. They are all spherical and - like their larger, more complex cousins (represented by different letters) - they have a capacity of no more than two. However, they are unique in that the corresponding sublevel can have only one of them. FTP, identify this type of atomic orbital, which is the only one present in the first energy level.

ANS: "s orbital" or "s subshell" (accept "s sublevel" before the word "sublevel" is reached in the question)

4. Born in modern-day Iran in 1919, this author moved to Rhodesia at age five and lived in Africa for many years. In 1949 she moved to London, and the next year her first novel, The Grass is Signing, was published. FTP, name this author of African Stories, Children of Violence, and The Golden Notebooks.

ANS: Doris Lessing

5. Based on Alonzo Church's lambda calculus, it was developed in the late 1950's and the early 1960's by John McCarthy. This makes it the second oldest computer programming language in relatively- widespread use today. (The oldest is Fortran.) FTP, name this language, which is a favorite of artificial intelligence researchers.

ANS: Lisp

6. In 1877, this city became the first-and only-city in the United States to fall to a Communist coup when ethnic German labor unions staged a general strike on July 22. The city remains a strong labor city, with strong unions and an old industrial base. Most of those industries are now leaving-starting with Brown Shoe, Purina, the Monsanto breakup-most recently the sale of McDonnell Douglas to Boeing. The beer franchise, however, seems safe-Anheuser Busch isn't going anywhere soon. Name this midwestern city, home to the Rams, Blues, and Cardinals.

7. According to Tinseltown legend, this actress was discovered at the soda fountain of Schwab's Drugstore in Hollywood. She was subsequently promoted by the studios as "the Sweater Girl" and appeared in a number of dramatic pictures, most notably in The Postman Always Rings Twice (1946) and Peyton Place (1957). Name this actress, who was scandalized by the 1959 murder of her boyfriend, Mafia associate Johnny Stompanato, by her daughter, Cheryl Crane.

8: During the summer of 1819, this future U.S. statesman became engaged to Anne Coleman, 23 years old, of Lancaster, Pennsylvania. The engagement did not last, however. Following a quarrel, Miss Coleman broke off the relationship and died, possibly of suicide, at the Philadelphia home of a relative in December 1819. Following the death of his beloved, he wrote, "I have lost the only earthly object of my affections." In an attempt to alleviate his grief, he ran for a seat in the U.S. Congress in 1820 as a Federalist. He later switched to the Democratic party and served as Secretary of State under James K. Polk, Minister to Great Britain under Franklin Pierce, and the 15th U.S. President. FTP this politician, who never married and holds the distinction of being the U.S.' only bachelor Chief Executive.

9. If you ever need to know how to think about God or how to read a book, he's your man - or so the perhaps presumtuous titles of two of his works (namely, How to Think About God, and How to Read a Book) would indicate. FTP, name this editor of Great Books of the Western World and Encyclopaedia Britannica.

- 10. He was born in 1919 and raised in the depression-era South. He was a Golden Gloves bantamweight champion in high school, and later became the protégé of Jim Folsom a populist Alabama governor who was a racial moderate. However, following a defeat by a Klan-backed segregationist in the 1958 Alabama gubernatorial campaign, this politician changed his stance to one of strong racial separation. His 1963 inaugural speech in Montgomery called for "segregation now, segregation tomorrow, and segregation forever." He refused to allow black students to enroll at the University of Alabama, and "stood in the schoolhouse door" to block their arrival. FTP name this governor, who dominated Alabama politics for nearly 3 decades, and who died at 79 in September 1998.

- 11. It is made of colored woolen thread worked on canvas or linen cloth 70 meters long by 49.5 centimeters wide. It contains 1512 figures in 72 scenes, with identifying Latin inscriptions. The border is of foliage, fantastic animals, and hunting scenes. FTP, identify this needlework panorama which represents the invasion and conquest of England by William the Conqueror.

 Answer: Bayeux Tapestry
- 12. On his first expedition to Ireland in 1185, it is reported that an English nobleman laughed at the beards of the Irish chieftains when they came to pay their homage. While being invested as Duke of Normandy in 1199, he "giggled" and "gossiped" so much that he dropped the ceremonial lance. He has also been implicated by subsequent historians in the 1203 murder of his nephew and fellow claimant to the English throne, Prince Arthur. He finally assumed the English throne following the battle of Chalus (SHA-LOO) in 1199, when his brother, King Richard I, was killed. His reign was disastrous, culminating with the 1215 signing of the Magna Carta. Name this English king, considered by historians to be on of England's most incompetent rulers.
- 13. He was born on October 8, 1890 in Columbus, Ohio of immigrant parents. He left school at 13 and worked at an assortment of odd jobs before becoming a race car driver during the early days of the automobile. However, he gained

his greatest fame for his heroics during World War I, in which he was known as America's greatest air ace. In the years following the war, he introduced his own automobile (which failed) and became head of Eastern Air Lines. Name this prolific American, who died in 1973.

ANS: Eddie Rickenbacker

14. Her numerous personal tragedies include the death of her mother, Julia, who died when she was only 13. Her father, Leslie Stephen, a well respected man of letters, died when she was 22. She and her sister, Vanessa, suffered sexual abuse at the hands of their stepbrother, George Duckworth. FTP name this author, known for her association with the Bloomsbury Group and such inventive and impressionistic works as Mrs. Dalloway and To the Lighthouse.

ANS: Virginia _Woolf_

- 15. The major work of this communist (1871- 1919) is The Accumulation of Capital, in which the author attempts to supplement Marx through the promotion of a precise economic argument for the eventual collapse of capitalism. With fiery oratory and support for violence and revolution, she founded the Spartacus League, which was the forerunner to the German Communist Party. Name this revolutionary, who was murdered, along with friend and Spartacus co-founder Karl Liebknecht, while under German police custody in 1919.

- 16. He uses personal reflections on his own mixed African, English, and Dutch heritage to demonstrate the variety of cultural influences in Caribbean society. His writing paints Caribbean life in beautiful detail, mixing English with such folk languages as Creole. His books of poems include Another Life, Sea Grapes, The Star-Apple Kingdom, The Fortunate Traveller, Midsummer, The Arkansas Testament, and Omeros. FTP, identify this West Indian poet and playwright, who won the Nobel Prize for literature in 1992.

- 17. Examples include diatomic oxygen with ozone and graphite with diamond. FTP, name the term for compounds in which the same element in the same state of matter exists in multiple different forms.

- 18. His philosophy specifies that justice can be achieved by distributing the most advantages to the least advantaged within a society. The distribution of advantages is to be determined through a hypothetical construct, called the veil of ignorance, in which people are unaware of their own standing within the society and thus try to distribute rights and privileges without bias. Identify this American philosopher who is associated with the ideas of distributive justice and the original position and published A Theory of Justice in 1971.

ANS: John Rawls

19. He was once the Minister of Culture of the nation he now leads, and following the 1979 revolution he was considered to be a moderate. In 1992 he was removed from his minister's post, considered to be too conservative by Nateq-Nouri, the conservative cleric whom he defeated in the presidential election in May, 1997. FTP, identify this world leader, who during his election was endorsed by his predecessor, Hashemi Rafsanjani, to become President of Iran.

20. Southern politics of the time disapproved of his close friendship with James Buchanan, but he was eventually elected thirteenth vice president of the United States. Unfortunately, he took the Oath of Office in Havana, became ill before returning to the United States, and died at his Alabama home without ever having set foot in Washington as vice president.
